



Lenten Book Read 2023—Just Mercy

The Lenten Book Read for 2023 is *Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption* by Bryan Stevenson. This book tells the story of a young lawyer who founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need, the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. Books can be purchased for \$8.00 in the Commons between services and you will have the opportunity to sign up for a discussion time that will fit your schedule. Discussions will begin the week of February 19 and continue for four weeks. Times will be on Sundays between services, Wednesdays at 4:30 p.m. (before Wednesday Night Meals), and a Zoom discussion (date and time yet to be determined). Facilitators are needed for these groups as well. A guide will be provided to facilitators to help with the discussions.

PEEL Project—Openings Available

PEEL Project is where 10–12 people gather together for a weekend to learn about photography, poetry, and each other. St. John's did one PEEL event last spring. It was a deepening and eye-

opening experience to slow down and intentionally connect with another person we didn't know well before. Would you like to participate?
