





Today is Quilt Sunday

The pews are draped with quilts that are ready to be shipped to Lutheran World Relief, Global Health Ministries, or given to local places of need. LWR has expanded its quilt and kit ministry to disaster areas in the United States. Last year LWR shipped 114,000 quilts to 12 states impacted by floods, hurricanes, and wildfires, in addition to 200,000 quilts shipped internationally. In 2025, St. John's donated 245 quilts. Each quilt costs about \$10, in addition to the many donated supplies. Your donations of cash or checks on quilt Sunday will help cover these expenses. The auction will end at 10:45 a.m. Two quilts will be auctioned. The winners may choose a quilt from the pews and take it home after the second service.**

Our selection for this year's Lenten Book Read is Richard Rohr's *The Tears of Things: Prophetic Wisdom for an Age of Outrage* (2024). 
