Alleluia! Christ Is Risen!

Our worship today is filled with alleluias. Absent during Lent, this word—this shout of praise—returns, and we will sing it, say it, read it, hear it many times today and all through the Easter season. Down through the ages and across the world, this unique expression of praise to God has united believers in every language, without the need for translation.



RESPONDING TO GOD'S WORD

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.






Communion will be received standing at stations in the front of sanctuary; ushers will direct you forward.


