





#### Lutheranism 101 Class

## Today, 12:15–1:45 p.m., Fireside Room

Are you new to Lutheranism and wondering why we do some things in a certain way or why we talk so much about grace? Maybe you have some language or phrase that feels like "insider Lutheran speak" and you're wondering what that all means. Or maybe you've been a Lutheran your whole life but still have some questions about how we read the bible or what it means to be a saint and a sinner (at the same time!). Pastors Pam and Jonathan would like to invite any and all people who are curious about what it means to be a Lutheran to their *Lutheranism 101* class after the second service. We will meet in the Fireside Room and spend time learning and asking questions together. All are welcome!

## St. John's Forum: Exploring the Bible with Interfaith Sensitivity with Jason Ripley Next Sunday, May 5, 9:45–10:30 a.m., Sanctuary

This session follows up on a question introduced last fall: "Is the New Testament anti-Jewish?" Special attention will be given to Paul's letter to the Romans, addressed to a mixed community of Gentile and Jewish followers of Jesus in the center of the Roman empire, facing challenges across religious, cultural, social, and political issues. We will explore how Paul engages the questions "Has God abandoned the Jewish people—and what might the implications be for Gentile followers? Can Jewish followers of Jesus still keep the Torah commandments? Must Gentiles? Does following Jesus entail rejecting Judaism?" Jason Ripley is currently chair of the religion department at St. Olaf. A New Testament scholar specializing in the Gospel of John, he teaches courses on biblical interpretation and regularly leads students on study-abroad programs. His publications address topics of religious violence, gender, and reinterpretation of the Hebrew Bible in early Judaism. He has been attending St. John's since 2020.

Dr. Samuel Lotegeluaki is our speaker this month.
