



OUR WORSHIP TODAY

This morning our text from the Gospel of Mark tells of Jesus, in a boat with his disciples, speaking to the wind and waves and calming a great storm. As we worship, we begin by acknowledging the deep wisdom held in the spiritual that says "I've been in de storm so long." While unrest, constant news updates, and broken relationships surround us, we too feel the storm raging all around. The second part to the prelude, by twentieth-century French composer Jean Langlais, offers a glimpse of peace as the long sustained tones of the organ allow us time for breath and stillness. When we sing the opening hymn, we sing the hope-filled words of God to ourselves and to one another, "Fear not, I am with you, oh, be not dismayed, for I am your God and will still give you aid." May we offer words of peace to our neighbors not knowing all the storms they are living in each day.


