While we do not always agree, we choose to walk and grow in faith together, believing that God creates diversity, and loves and welcomes us.




Second Reading — Romans 6:12-23

¹²Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. ¹³No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. ¹⁴For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

¹⁵What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! ¹⁶Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? ¹⁷But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, ¹⁸and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. ¹⁹I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

²⁰When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. ²¹So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. ²²But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. ²³For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.



Our Worship Today

In our gospel text, we hear about hospitality and welcome as Jesus instructs the disciples as they embark upon their new ministry. Christians, then and now, continue this teaching as we look for ways to welcome the stranger or share with those who are in need. The idea of welcome is so important that we wear name tags and think about signage in our church building so that anyone new to our community hopefully feels our hospitality. But what does hospitality look like now in this season of physical isolation? In the opening hymn, how can we sing "all are welcome in this place" when we can't be inside this building together? Where, now, is "this place?" Maybe a gift in this time is discovering that when we sing, memory and imagination are side by side. Even if we can't be together, we remember an embrace of welcome from the past and dream toward what the future will feel like. In the Hymn of the Day, we are reminded in a text by John Bell that God is the ultimate Welcomer, and through grace has poured out the gifts of peace, love, and hope so generously to us. While we may not be within the church walls, these gifts are ours to share in every place we find ourselves.

- Many prayer shawls made by our knitters were distributed to members who are on lockdown

- Our Sunday School's **Blessing Box** is seeing a high level of both donations and people receiving these blessings. Nonperishable foods, cleaning supplies, feminine hygiene supplies, and toilet paper are especially welcome donations.
- The **Red Cross** still needs blood, maybe now more than ever. Go to the Red Cross website at www.redcross.com if you are eligible to donate. Drives are still happening locally.
- The Community Action Center is preparing for a deluge of needs. The quickest way to help is to donate financially. The CAC can make those gifts go further than your own grocery store donations. They are also building their volunteer base. For more information visit their website.
- Local businesses, especially the ones that are usually social hangouts, are trying to quickly pivot to serve you in different ways. Take advantage of all those take-out and delivery options. And if you can't use them now, buy a gift card that you can use in the future.
- Relief Efforts for the Neighborhoods of Minneapolis and St. Paul that have experienced fire and destruction are popping up in many places locally. St. John's will continue to listen for how to help our cities' partners. Our sister congregation Holy Trinity Lutheran on Lake Street has been at the center of relief.
