





She has also appeared on CNN, BBC, SkyNews, and NPR. Courageous Conversations is free and open to the public. Pastor Denker lives with her husband, Ben, and two sons in Minneapolis, where she is a sought-after speaker on Christian nationalism and its theological and cultural roots.
