



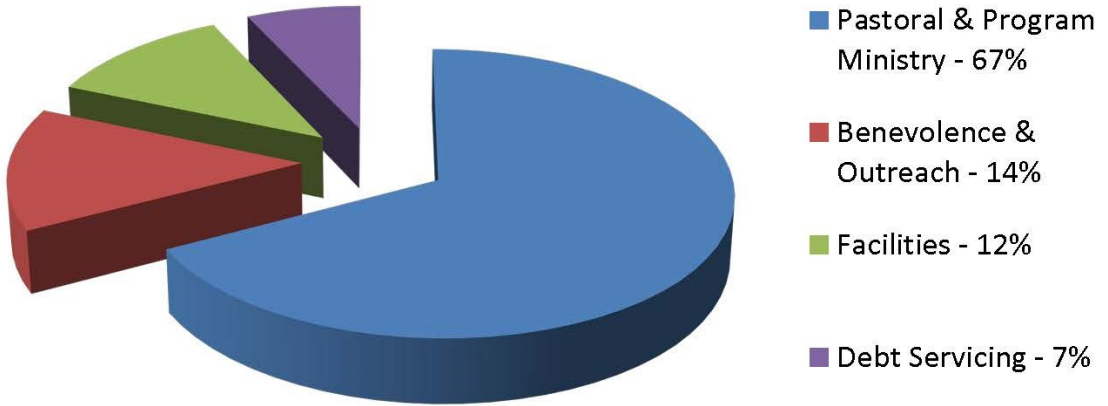
"Giving is not hard for me. I know we shouldn't give because we feel like we are getting something back, but I really feel like I receive much more than I give."

How Our Gifts Support Our Ministry



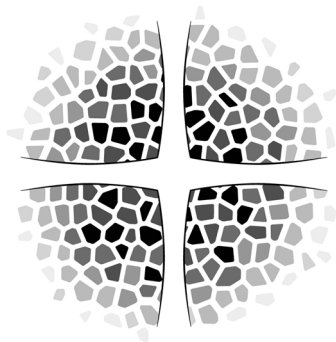
Estimated Ministry Cost in 2017 - \$991,248
