# **OUR WORSHIP TODAY**

The festival of All Saints occurs just as the landscape in the northern hemisphere heralds the dying of plants and the quiet of winter rest. In like manner, the readings and liturgy of this day call us to rejoice in all the saints: those who have died and now rest in Christ, those who live now, and those yet to come.

The Christian church celebrates "greatness" in a markedly different way than our world. Jesus calls blessed those who are meek, grieving, peaceful, and merciful, and we claim "sainthood" for anyone who has died with Christ in the waters of baptism. The Christian community speaks honestly about human frailty and mortality. At the same time, we confess our faith in the risen Lord, in the communion of saints, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting.

This morning we remember by name 22 saints of St. John's who have died since All Saints Sunday 2020. Some were commended to God here with the community gathered; others by necessity were laid to rest with only a few family present. Among them were pastors and professors, homemakers and teachers, beloved parents and siblings. They were sinners and saints at the same time, claimed by God in the waters of baptism and redeemed by Christ's promises.

Today we give thanks for them, and for all the beloved dead we bring on our hearts, and remember God's promise to us that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus.



# **Ministry Moment from the Stewardship Board**

The Stewardship Board has put together some brief stories to share with the congregation. The following is this week's Ministry Moment:

We know well the strong and palpable emotion that music can stir within. A favorite hymn can waken sacred memories buried deep or lift us when we are weary. Nathan Proctor noted that although the rhythm of his week remained unchanged during the pandemic shutdown, his job had a different focus. He shared, "Selecting music for each Sunday was driven by what music people like to sing and what people know very well; loved and well-known hymns were selected with this in mind." Nathan felt the livestream services that allowed people to watch from anywhere (his parents in lowa, for example, or former members who've moved away) helped to keep us together. As he looks back on the "before," he reflects that "seeing so many people at services and for coffee hour: those experiences are so much more precious" from this vantage.
