



## **GREEK & VOCABULARY:**

John 9:3 ἀπεκρίθη Ἰησοῦς οὕτε οὖτος ἥμαρτεν οὕτε οἱ γονεῖς αὐτοῦ ἀλλ' ἵνα φανερωθῆ τὰ ἔργα τοῦ θεοῦ ἐν αὐτῷ. Literal English: Answered Jesus neither this sinned nor the parents of him but that should be displayed the works of God in him. "A more accurate translation would be 'Neither this man nor his parents sinned. But in order that God's works might be revealed in him it is necessary for us to work the works of the one who sent me ...' This translation conclusively affirms that, at least in this case, there is no connection between sickness and sin (but see 5:14). Therefore, Jesus must do the work of God and heal the man." [1]
