REVELATION UNVEILED: Chapter 4; The Throne ROOM of GOD

here begins John's vision of heaven and God's judgments.

Throughout the rest of the Revelation, God will give John (& us) glimpses of what is going on around the throne of God. Some commentators refer to them as interludes or intermissions. It's a way of saying, "Meanwhile." And letting us participate in the celebrations in heaven, welcoming those who have come out of the great suffering on earth.

So, Meanwhile, what does God show us? The throne room! God is revealed as light and color, sight and sound, Twenty-four Elders (representing all who have served God), the Seven Spirits (representing the holy Spirit), and four earth creatures (representing all earth's living things) are safe in God's presence; all are welcome around the throne of God and with the Trinity: the Love of God, the Lamb of God, and the Power of God.

God shows us all that battling against Satan and the forces of evil is God's work. The Lamb has conquered and is responsible for the restoration of the earth. We are not called to battle with weapons of war. Our work is to stand with Jesus and stand against Satan in all forms: idol worship, collusion with power & wealth, corruption, sexual sins against others, policies that rob people of their livelihood, etc.

## REVELATION UNVEILED: Chapter 4; The Throne ROOM of GOD

"What a source of comport to know that one of the Marks of heaven is that it is not a place where our differences are marked by separation as it is in this life... There is not the feeling that we must recess to our enclaves of denominations, but the Old Testament sits with the members of the New [Testament] and that all creatures finally see their unity in God the Father and in the Son, Jesus our lord" [1]

"Although Revelation is usually seen as a book of destruction, God's fundamental identity is that of Creator. This scene anticipates the outcome of the book, where God's purposes culminate in New Creation. The words "holy, holy" and the images of casting down crowns by heaven's glassy sea have inspired many of the hymns we use in worship. Revelation functions rightly when it invites us into worship too—which we do as we add our voices to the song."[2]
