From Our Pastors...

Dear friends in Christ,

"The history of a congregation, a church, is a history of people touched by eternity, but it is also a history of people touched by space and time, by a *particular* space and a *particular* time, by space and time that inevitably change." So begins the Foreword to Edna Hong's *The Book of a Century*, the history of the first 100 years of St. John's Lutheran Church.

This particular moment in time - as the end of 2018 brushes shoulders with the beginning of 2019 - is significant for me. You see, on December 30, 2018, Trinity Lutheran Church in Blooming Prairie - a church adorning the country side of rural Minnesota for 144 years and one of the first churches I had the honor of serving as pastor, will close its doors. It is both sad and necessary. There is so much ministry and life that was born out of that congregation. Trinity served its particular time and particular space, for which I can only give thanks. I think of the tiny Christmas tree covered in mittens and hats each year given to warm the bodies of those enduring a cold winter in the community. I think of the annual Aebleskiver fundraising dinners that gave back to the community and kept this church's ministry alive a little longer. I think of the 10 people of God, trucking through the snow, to Ella Benson's house on Christmas morning, to sing carols to this 94-year-old who couldn't make it to church. To have served a small part of Trinity's long history is one of the greatest gifts.

But then on January 1, 2019, St. John's will turn the corner into our 150th Anniversary year of ministry. What an exciting time for us! To be part of a church that is celebrating 150 years is humbling. I think of all that has come before us, leading to this moment. I think of all that will come after us, and how we are playing a small, yet significant, part of a future moment that will be. I am eager for the four unique ways we will be marking and celebrating this milestone throughout the year and the ways our five benevolence projects will send us out into the community in new ways. I give thanks for the strong pulse of St. John's congregation and the ways you all bring abundant life and ministry and care to this place, and I cannot wait to see what we can do together, with the Spirit of God, in the years ahead.

It is a strange intersection to watch a church look back on its long and faithful history and close its doors, while at the same time watch another church look back on its long and faithful history and to be opening doors to new opportunities for ministry in the years ahead.

Churches are, indeed, a living organism that serve God in a particular place at particular time, and they too expire into the good care of God, trusting that God will do a new thing. Let us not forget that many of the churches to whom the Apostle Paul wrote have also closed their doors, yet the people of God have carried on.

Dear people of St. John's, we are part of something much bigger than ourselves. We are part of the body of Christ, the universal Church. It began before us and it will last beyond us. For this particular moment in time, we are called to carry on.

Stephen Ministry: Loneliness, January Blues, and Digital Detox

"But if we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another...". *John 1:7*

Loneliness is sometimes described as the soul feeling isolated from meaningful human connections. Psychologists define loneliness as a subjective, unpleasant experience that occurs when the desired level of meaningful social contact is less than what is available. It is sobering to realize that even though we live in a time when we can connect to just about anyone, anywhere, we are lonelier than ever. The prevalence of loneliness is increasing and the association between loneliness and ill health is now clear.

Many of us can relate to seasons of loneliness, and January is often pegged as the loneliest month of the year. In fact "Blue Monday" (which this year falls on January 14, also the namesake of our local coffee shop), is known as the loneliest day of the year. The magic of Christmas disappears as the decorations come down and family and friends scatter and return to their daily routines. The days can be dark, cold, and dreary, and we may be forced to spend more time indoors, isolated from others.

If you are feeling especially lonely you are not alone. Research has shown that the greatest antidote to loneliness is reaching out to others: volunteering, joining a book study, inviting someone to coffee (at Blue Monday, perhaps?), finding a sense of meaning with some kind of self-transcending goal. If you sense that your digital devices are causing greater loneliness, here are some suggestions:

8 Ways to Ease Your Use of Digital Devices

- 1. Create a time log. Use it to help you be aware of how much time you spend looking at your devices and how many times a day you look.
- 2. Be aware of how you feel when you are talking to another person who answers her phone during your conversation.
- 3. Recognize how conditioned you are to check for updates. Is the Facebook, What's App, Instagram, or other update you are receiving really giving you news?
- 4. Consider your multitasking habits. Observe yourself multitasking between a task and your device. Notice how you get distracted. Are you as effective?
- 5. Force yourself to focus. Explore for yourself how much more work you can get done if you are unavailable by phone, email, or text between 9-11 a.m. Notice how much more productive you are.
- 6. Unplug for one day. Try an experiment with your family where you go an entire day without any digital devices. How lost do you feel without them? Turn your phone off.
- 7. Give yourself unstructured time.
- 8. Do not allow digital devices to become babysitters. Kids who spend more time with digital devices have higher levels of Attention Deficit Disorder.

The Library at St. John's From the Adult Ministry & Education Board By Genevieve Quarberg

If you look for the Bible in our library, you will find many copies, many versions (translations), most of which will look like very long, forbidding books. You could find many reasons <u>not</u> to even open one ... its size, the unpronounceable words, the long, boring, repetitious or dull parts, even the familiar parts. In *Wishful thinking, A Theological ABC*, Frederick Buechner has this to say about the Bible: (excerpts)

"In short, one way to describe the Bible, written by many different men over a period of three thousand years and more, would be to say that it is a disorderly collection of sixty-odd books which are often tedious, barbaric, obscure, and teem with contradictions and inconsistencies. It is a swarming compost of a book, an Irish stew of poetry and propaganda, law and legalism, myth and murk, history and hysteria. Over the centuries it has become hopelessly associated with tub-thumbing evangelism and dreary piety, with superannuated superstition and blue-nosed moralizing with ecclesiastical authoritarianism and crippling literalism.

And yet...

And yet just because it is a book about both the sublime and the unspeakable, it is a book also about life the way it really is. It is a book about people who at one and the same time can be both believing and unbelieving, innocent and guilty, crusaders and crooks, full of hope and full of despair. In other words it is a book about us.

And it is also a book about God. If it is not about the God we believe in, then it is about the God we do not believe in. One way or another the story we find in the bible is our own story.

What follows are some practical suggestion how to read the Bible without tears. Or maybe with them.

- **1.** Don't start at the beginning and try to plow your way straight through to the end.
- 2. ...try a Bible commentary which gives the date and historical background of each book, explains the special circumstances which it was written to meet, and verse by verse tries to illumine the meaning of the difficult section.
- 3. ...try an unfamiliar English version...or one in a familiar foreign language

The Word of God speaks out of the depths of an almost unimaginable past into the depths of ourselves."

Hand-in Hand... A New Giving Opportunity to Mission

Over the years, the Southeastern Minnesota Synod has shared deep relationships with our companion synods of IELCO (the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia) and the ELCT-CD (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania – Central Diocese). People of this synod have traveled to walk on their soil and our companions have traveled to walk on ours. We travel hand-in-hand with each other on our journeys of life and faith. In Christ, we are one.

After deep conversation between our synod and mission partners, the Hand-in-Hand initiative was designed. Hand-inHand provides an opportunity for congregations of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod to partner in health, education and entrepreneurial ministries in ways that make a significant impact on people's lives.

The synod has published a Hand-in-Hand Brochure that describes 6 projects. In December, St. John's Benevolence & Social Concerns Board sent \$1000 to support 3 of the 6 projects: (1) Dispensary Project in Tanzania, (2) lambi Agricultural Project in Tanzania, and (3) Family Reunification on the US border. Individuals are also invited to contribute.

From Bread for the World

Excerpts from a David Beckmann letter to BFW Members...



Bread for the World joins our nation in honoring the life and legacy of President George H.W. Bush.

President Bush negotiated the end of the Cold War, and Bread for the World helped bring the benefits of that shift to the Horn of Africa.

Bread for the World's 1990 Offering of Letters focused on the Horn of Africa Recovery and Food Security Act. Sharon Pauling, Bread for the World Africa policy analyst back then, helped craft the bill and Bread members and churches sent tens of thousands of letters about it to their members of Congress.

The Horn of Africa Recovery and Food Security Act reoriented U.S. policy in the Horn from Cold War purposes to the promotion of development, peace and democracy. President Bush signed the bill into law and his administration followed up.

I visited Addis Ababa in the spring of 1991, just before the end of a civil war in Ethiopia. The country had long been ruled by a harsh military dictatorship. Rebel forces led by Meles Zenawi were camped just 60 kilometers north of Addis. The U.S. State Department helped negotiate a peaceful transition of power and the rebels were able to enter the capital city without violence.

The Horn of Africa Recovery and Food Security Act also allowed USAID to begin assistance to the new Ethiopian government immediately. The Meles government turned out to be exceptionally effective in reducing poverty and they launched the beginnings of democracy at state and local levels - for the very first time in Ethiopia's long history.

On Monday (December 3) I watched from our office window as the hearse carrying the body of the former president made its way to the Capitol. What came to my mind was his leadership in ending the Cold War, and how Bread for the World members and churches helped his administration seize that opportunity to set the stage for dramatic progress against hunger and poverty in Ethiopia.
