

From Our Pastors...

Dear Friends in Christ.

One of the joys of this fall season has been getting to spend a little more time with our high school youth. For Confirmation this fall, Pastor Pam, Emmanuel, and I have been rotating around which groups we get spend time with on Wednesday evenings. As a result, I got to spend 4 weeks in a row with some of our high schoolers (and 4 more in January!).

During one of our youth group gatherings, I asked, "What does it mean to belong?"

"It means to feel like you can be yourself and you don't have to worry about what others think of you," one of our high schoolers replied.

"Is there a place in your life where you feel like you belong these days?" I asked.

"Here. At church." Other youth were nodding in agreement.

My heart swelled with joy. But I'll admit, I was a little surprised. In a day and age when a record number of teens and young adults are foregoing any kind of organized religion, researchers are wondering where they will find meaning and connection and belonging in their life. Knowing that these youth are in the prime demographic of those who are choosing not to go to church, to hear that they feel like St. John's is a place where they belong is no small thing.

Author of Searching For Sunday, the late Rachel Held Evans has said that in an age of abundant information, people are not going to church for more information. We have all the information we need at our finger tips. Rather, people are looking for a place where we are reminded that we belong to God and we belong to each other. A place where we can be ourselves. The beauty of the Church, and other religious communities, is that it creates community out of people we would not normally choose to be with in community. Where else can you find four generations spending time together in the same space?

I am not naïve enough to think that everyone feels like they belong here. Belonging is a tricky thing at times. Tribes and subgroups can form in any community, and can isolate and ostracize people.

But the work of the church is to imitate Christ by tearing down the barriers and repairing the breaches between us. Being the body of Christ is making sure there is room at the table for the person standing at the door. From my vantage point, I see that culture of belonging growing at St. John's and my heart swells with joy.

I hope that you feel like you belong here, because you do. In the name of Christ, you belong here. I hope that in this new year, you might consider stepping out and taking a risk to see that it's true. In doing so, maybe you'll discover that you help to create a belonging community too. Introduce yourself to a new person at least once a month. Attend the Monday Manna and Mercy Bible Study at noon. Join a Lenten Book Read group in February, where we will be reading *Searching For Sunday*, by Rachel Held Evans. Volunteer on a month you are not

Creation Care Forum: The Real Dirt (Sanctuary)

Ben Doherty of Open Hands Farm and Dave Legvold of Legvold Farms will present their view of what each farming operation holds as its responsibility to the earth and to the community. Open Hands Farm is a Community Supported Agriculture endeavor that provides organically grown produce to a large variety of customers. Legvold Farms is a commodity production operation that works to build soil through practices that preserve soil nutrients, enhance biological systems, and assure clean water. Both farms serve as research and education centers. Open Hands Farm is regarded as an exemplary, environmentally friendly supplier of wholesome foods to the community. Legvold Farms is a Minnesota Agricultural Water Quality Certified farm as awarded by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture. Both Ben and Dave believe that though they have very different farming operations, they share many of the same creation care goals. Both farmers enjoy the opportunity to share the joys of farming, share equipment, and appreciate each other as good neighbors.





Library Words... From the Adult Ministry & Education Board By Genevieve Quarberg

Picture books aren't only for children; they are also for adults who love to read to children. This month the display wall will show books that speak of people's many ways of thinking about and worshipping God.

In God's Name, written by Sandy Eisenberg Sasso and illustrated by Phoebe Stone is a joyful picture of the search for God by many different people. The Miracle Child told by Elizabeth Laird with Abba Aregawi Wolde Gabriel is an Ethiopian story of a miracle child who fed the hungry and healed the sick during a great famine in Ethiopia. Shaker Boy by Mary Lyn Ray and illustrated by Jeanette Winter is the story of a young boy brought to live with the Shakers where he lived his whole life. There are three books out of the Jewish tradition. A Picture Book of Jewish Holidays by David Adler, illustrated by Linda Heller, is a simple telling of holidays we hear of, but don't know. Passover by Miriam Nerlove concentrates on one of those holidays. It took fifty years for Isaac Millman to tell his story of being hidden as a "sick" child in a hospital by his mother who was taken away to be killed. Hidden Child is a serious book, meant for children who can understand and ask questions. Celebrating Ramadan by Diane Hoyt-Goldsmith with photographs by Lawrence Migdale follows a family through the month of praying and fasting and through celebrating the Eid al-Fitr the feast that ends Ramadan. Islam is an extravagant picture book of the variety and vastness of the Muslim religion.

There are books, not religious, that yearn for what Christians sang at Christmas, "Peace on Earth, Goodwill Toward Men". The Peace Bell by Margi Preus, illustrated by Hideko Takahashi is the story of the American-Japanese Friendship Bell. Wangaari's Trees of Peace is the true story of Wangari Maathai, environmentalist and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize by Jeanette Winter.

Our library has books for all ages! And our library is a good place to spend quiet time perusing those books. Enjoy!

From Bread for the World

Bread for the World released the following statement on December 4 in response to the Trump administration's final rule requiring stricter



work requirements and time limits on adults participating in SNAP (attributed to David Beckmann, president of Bread for the World): "This rule will make it more difficult for low-income adults to access the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program - a change that could kick hundreds of thousands of people

off the program. Most low-income adults on SNAP who can work do work. The rule also ignores that there are still millions of Americans who face barriers to employment, lack transportation, or live in areas where the economy has not recovered. God teaches us that we are not to withhold nourishment from anyone. We oppose the administration's decision and urge them to immediately withdraw this rule."

More than 50 Christian leaders with the Circle of Protection asked all of the presidential candidates, Republican and Democrat, to send a short video explaining what they would do as president to offer help and opportunity to poor and hungry people in the United States and around the world. As of December 12, the Circle of Protection had received videos from seven candidates. More are expected. By publicizing the videos the Circle of Protection hopes to make poverty and hunger key issues for candidates and voters in the 2020 elections. The Circle of Protection will distribute the videos among their churches and the general public but will not publicly evaluate the proposed policy positions or endorse any candidate.
