# St. John's Annual Quilt Sunday February 17, 2019

The third Sunday in February our congregation will get to worship amongst our home grown quilts. Under the able leadership of Sue Sharrow, a dedicated bunch of 15-20 people (men and women) not only make quilts for Lutheran World Relief but also for "Operation Joy" at Christmas. LWR quilts are sent all over the world. St. John's completes well over a hundred quilts each year!

Some of the work is done at home by several who wash and iron fabric, cut quilt squares, or sew quilt tops, and many people assist in sourcing backing fabric.

A team works together (downstairs in the Fellowship Hall) on the third Thursday of each month, and the Monday preceding, from 8:30 a.m.-noon.

#### From Our Pastors...

Dear friends in Christ.

A pointless people.

Sometime in the 1980's, an English professor at Luther College wrote a little parable about Genesis 1. In it, she describes God as creating a world intended for enjoyment and relationship. Human beings, though, quickly decided that it would be more "fun" to live for points. Soon they became obsessed with living for accumulation of points, and then the sheer joy of life and relationships began to die.

God's response is to try to form a community that would not live this way, a "point-less people."

This little story was captured and illustrated by Pastor Dan Erlander, and has continued to be a touchstone for me about what it means to live by grace, rather than the law. Whether you consider yourself religious or not, most of us have an unspoken system of "points" of some kind that shapes whether we think we are measuring up or not. It turns out that it's extremely difficult to hold onto a "pointless" philosophy of life, especially in our hyper-competitive culture.

Now, I'm not against sports. Healthy competition can be fun, building community rather than tearing it down. But when our worth - whether as teams or individuals or institutions - is wrapped up in our competitive advantage, we are inevitably on a path to loss.

The "pointless people" has come up for me again as our family has enjoyed the philosophical sit-com, "The Good Place," which begins with the premise that your entry to the afterlife is determined by the points you've accumulated in this life. The show explores the ways in which a point system can be inherently unfair, not to mention joy-robbing, even for people of the best intentions.

It turns out, over and over again, that our own efforts are never enough to save us. True relationship with each other and with God begins with the knowledge that we are saved by grace, that God's original blessing to us in Christ cannot be taken away by our faults or shortcomings.

This month we are starting a unit on "ethics" with our confirmation students, which is a tricky thing since we are constantly reminding our students that we are not trying to "be good" in order to gain God's favor. Yet our world constantly gives us difficult choices about how to live, and in pondering those choices we learn how to consider our neighbor's well-being as well as our own. Only when we stop worrying about our own "points" can we really pay attention to others' needs.

As we continue in this year of Grace Overflowing, how might you remind yourself that it all begins and ends with grace, with God's promise to you that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus? What about being pointless might free you to serve?

Valentine of Rome faced imprisonment for marrying soldiers who were forbidden to marry and ministering to Christians who were persecuted under the Roman Empire. Now, Valentine's Day is thought of in terms of romance and love. Cards, flowers, candy, and other gifts are given to loved ones. But for some, Valentine's Day is not a time of celebration.

# Lenten Book Read Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion, by Father Greg Boyle


This year's Lenten Book read selection is *Tattoos on the Heart: The Power of Boundless Compassion*, by Father Greg Boyle, a Jesuit Priest working with gang members in Los Angeles.

For twenty years, Greg Boyle has run Homeboy Industries, a gangintervention program located in the Boyle Heights neighborhood of

Los Angeles, the gang capital of the world. In this book, he turns stories of his experience working in the ghetto into a breathtaking series of parables inspired by faith.

One reviewer said, "(This is) an astonishing book... about suffering and dignity, death and resurrection, one of my favorite books in years. It is lovely and tough and tender beyond my ability to describe and left me in tears of both sorrow and laughter."

#### February 3

St. John's Anniversary Benevolence Project: TORCH - Sanctuary

In honor of our 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, St. John's has given a benevolence grant to TORCH and the Northfield Community Collage Collaborative. Marnie Thompson, Assistant Principal of Northfield High School, will share with us an update on the launch of this project.

#### February 10

Climate Action in MN Government with Howard White - St. John's Hall Howard White will be with us at our adult forum to talk about the impact that pricing carbon can have on our environment as we address the challenges of climate change and global warming. A bill was introduced in the House of Representatives in late November. It is called the "Energy Innovation and Carbon Dividend Act of 2018." By the time of our February 10 adult forum, it may have been re-introduced in the new congressional session. Howard is a retired ELCA pastor and is the co-group leader of the Northfield Chapter of Citizens' Climate Lobby. This organization, more than 100,000 strong, has worked diligently to get a carbon pricing bill introduced in congress. Howard will have a presentation that will include a time for your questions and your sharing of your opinions.

# From Our Parish Nurse Melissa Berthelsen, RN

"Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." (Matthew 25:40 NIV)

Recently, I offered shelter, warmth, and safe passage to a stranger. At a distance, loving one's neighbor is safe, even easy, but this stranger and I shared the narrow proximity of my front seat in the blustery darkness of evening. Perhaps she felt as much concern about getting into a stranger's car as I felt by inviting her out of the cold. This individual was delivered safely home in the midst of a storm, but I was the one who was rescued.

I didn't know where we were headed. It was much farther than I expected. Just one more street after one more corner. I needed to trust the stranger to lead me safely to the destina-



tion, just as she needed me to shield her from the raw exposure of time and distance in the chilling storm. It was an act of faith for each of us.

The stranger reminded me that we are called to look for the eyes of Christ in every face we meet. But we shouldn't just look, a verb that carries no accountability. We must seek those eyes. Search for them. Recognize them. Judgements fall away when we recognize each person as a cherished child of God. You are. I am. The stranger is. We are loved and cherished. The stranger reminded me of this.

Go in peace. Care for one another as you would care for Christ. Thanks be to God!

I just met Jesus, and his name is Carolyn.

I left the hospital at 8:45 p.m. on a Wednesday and re-introduced myself to the snow-covered car and to winter. I hadn't looked out a window for a full sweep of the clock and I was quite surprised to see the change of season.

It had been a solid 13-hour day with meetings and tasks and letters and negotiating - all for the benefit of those who will never need to know how much time and effort went into making a clinic and hospital experience just a bit fairer and informative and human.

I turned off North Ave onto Cedar and headed past Bethel toward home. Mike had just texted me that his 4-hour commute had just ended and he was home. The snow was blowing from the east and south - swirling and irritating to the face. Near the west border of the NRC in contrast to the blustery glow of oncoming headlights, I caught sight of a shadowed form walking into the wind along the opposite shoulder. My breath caught audibly with the realization that there is no room for pedestrians along Cedar Ave. on a clear, summer day, and so much less so on a dark, snowy night when roads are slick.

I slowed and moved to the right while the first of three north-bound cars moved around the figure bent into the blowing snow. By now, I had nearly stopped to allow room for the on-coming cars to swerve around the bundled pedestrian, but the third car did not swerve. I felt panicked! I was sure I would find that the pedestrian had been struck by the third car. I carefully drove forward until my headlights revealed the upright form. I rolled down the window and shouted desperately into the wind, "You need to get off the road! Can I give you a ride?" The car behind me waited patiently for the person to make her way around the car to the passenger door and land inside, out of the winter weather.

"Thank you, Ma'am. Yes, Ma'am."

I wanted to tell her not to call me ma'am, but it seemed that saying something would draw more attention to her courtesy, than saying nothing. I wanted to diminish the space between us.

"I was at my friend's and he wouldn't give me a ride. Keep going on Greenvale. Keep going straight."

"I was worried for you back there on the road. I thought one of those cars would hit you. I'm so glad that you are okay!"

- "Yes, Ma'am. Thank you, ma'am."
- "Where do you need to go? I'll drive you there."
- "I'll show you. Keep going straight. I'll show you where to turn. Keep going straight. But this weather, this is cold!"
- "Sure is! Do you have any gloves?"
- "No, I don't."
- "Here, take these."
- "Oh, thank you, ma'am."
- "It always seems colder in the beginning of winter while we are getting used to it. We don't have snakes and tropical bugs, so I guess the cold is a trade-off!"

We both laughed at this point, as we realized that perhaps the snakes have something on us for staying in more temperate climates. I kept driving, trusting that she would instruct me for the turns ahead. She lived farther from that section of Cedar Avenue than I had expected.

- "You would have had a long walk!"
- "Yes [laughing]! I'm going to have to call my friend when I get home. He'll be surprised that I am home already! Turn here by the clinic. Keep going straight. I like this part of town. It's pretty."
- "There are Christmas lights up already."
- "Lots of lights! These big trees along here used to be covered in Christmas lights, but they don't decorate them anymore. I don't know why."
- "Hmm. Maybe the owner grew old or moved."
- "Yes, I wonder...I always like to walk this way in the summer. Keep going straight."
- "It's very pretty here."
- "Yes, it is, isn't it? I'll tell you when to turn. Turn at that next one...turn here. Follow around."
- "Looks like they are building something here..."
- "Yes, they are putting up another house. Follow around here to the end. That last one. That's my house."
- "Oh, very nice. My name is Melissa."
- "Melissa, my name is Carolyn."

We shook hands. Her hand was warm now. She stepped out of the car onto the sidewalk and turned back to the car.

- "So nice to meet you, Carolyn. Happy Thanksgiving to you!"
- "Happy Thanksgiving to you, and Merry Christmas, too, Melissa!"
- "Merry Christmas to you, Carolyn. See you again!"
- "Thank you. See you again, Melissa."

I waited at the curb until someone met her at the front door and let her in. I waived, but Carolyn was inside and didn't turn. I turned right at the corner and headed toward home.

"I just met Jesus, and his name is Carolyn", I said out loud to myself.

# **Composting Beginning at St. John's!**

For the last couple of years, a new local business has offered curbside compost pickup in Northfield. This locally run business collects food waste from residents and delivers it to a large compost site in Shakopee, where Mother Nature transforms it back to nutrients for the soil

This fall St. John's was approached with a proposal for mutual benefit: St. John's would provide a site for some of their West-side collection to gather until they truck it up to Shakopee, and our own food waste, particularly from Wednesday Night Meals, would have a place to go. Most Northfield schools already compost and many of you in your own households compost your food waste - but now we have a way to handle the volume of waste our growing meal program produces.

What can be composted? All food scraps, including meat and bones; paper napkins; compostable plates and bowls (which we already use); paper towels; other food soiled cardboard and paper products. In short nearly all our waste from Wednesday Night Meals, with the exception of plastic wrappers and towels with chemical cleaners on them.

We hope you'll help us in sorting your waste, and thank your kitchen crew for helping us adjust to this new process. The result is less waste in the landfill, and more of God's goodness going back to the earth!

#### DEVICES FOR THE HEARING IMPAIRED



Three new hearing devices are available for use in the Sanctuary and in St. John's Hall.


These devices, in addition to several older devices, are found in baskets in the Narthex and at the entrance to the Sanctuary via the Commons.

To use in the Sanctuary or St. John's Hall, open the battery compartment, locate the CHANNEL SEEK BUTTON and press until the device "finds" the correct channel.

The same needs to be done each time the device is used in a different venue. The device will remain on the same channel of its last use. Ask an usher for help.

You can help keep our hearing devices operational by loosely wrapping the earbud cord around the device when not in use. Do not pull tightly or tie it in a knot.


Ensure the device is turned off and returned to the basket, or usher following each service.





# Hand-in Hand... A New Giving Opportunity to Mission

Over the years, the Southeastern Minnesota Synod has shared deep relationships with our companion synods of IELCO (the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia) and the ELCT-CD (Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania - Central Diocese). People of this synod have traveled to walk on their soil and our companions have traveled to walk on ours. We travel hand-in-hand with each other on our journeys of life and faith. In Christ, we are one.

After deep conversation between our synod and mission partners, the Hand-in-Hand initiative was designed. Hand-in-Hand provides an opportunity for congregations of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod to partner in health, education, and entrepreneurial ministries in ways that make a significant impact on people's lives.

The synod has published a Hand-in-Hand Brochure that describes 6 projects. In December, St. John's Benevolence & Social Concerns Board sent \$1000 to support 3 of the 6 projects: (1) Dispensary Project in Tanzania, (2) lambi Agricultural Project in Tanzania, and (3) Family Reunification on the US border. Individuals are also invited to contribute

#### From Bread for the World

From the earliest days of U.S. history, our country has welcomed people who are escaping persecution and poverty. People who make



the decision to leave home and come to the United States in recent years as in the past, generally have few other options. Factors beyond their control have made their circumstances too hungry and violent for them to remain. Undocumented immigration is less about the United States and more about

hunger, extreme poverty, and conflict in the three countries of Central America's Northern Triangle - Guatemala, El Salvador, and Honduras. War and extreme poverty have created similar situations from Syria and Nigeria to Yemen and Myanmar.

While it is ultimately the responsibility of each country to provide for its own citizens and protect them from violence, the United States should support neighboring countries in the endeavor for both moral and strategic reasons.

The United States should strengthen its diplomatic efforts and development and humanitarian assistance to help countries in the region respond to and address the causes of forced migration. In addition to efforts to stem violence and strengthen governance and institutions, these should include food security and nutrition programs. As our country continues to debate immigration policy, we must acknowledge the U.S. cannot have a comprehensive immigration strategy without a focus on supporting other countries' efforts to create environments that help people survive and thrive in their homes and communities.

In an upcoming Offering of Letters from St. John's we will urge our senators and representative to support legislation and programs that benefit immigrants, those fleeing violence, and all our neighbors near and far who are faced with food insecurity and hunger.

As part of St. John's Women's Courageous Conversations Programming, they will address topics such as affordable housing, wages, advocacy, government funding for programs, and the interconnectedness of all these issues.
