

Lent Begins March 6 with Ash Wednesday

Lent, our springtime period of renewal and focus on repentance and life in Christ, begins on Ash Wednesday, March 6, with worship and the imposition of ashes at noon and 6:30 p.m.

The ashes we receive on our foreheads remind us that we, along with all of creation, are dependent on God's grace.

Mid-week worship begins the following week, March 13, at 6:30 p.m.

From Our Pastors...

Dear friends in Christ.

I have been thinking a lot about death recently.

You see, we have just started a "Death and Dying" unit with our 7th and 8th Grade Confirmation class. During our first gathering, we pushed together some big carpet squares, we took off our shoes (just like Moses did at the burning bush), and we sat together around candles. Each person was invited to bring in a picture of a loved one who had died. Among us in spirit that evening were greatgrandparents, cousins, beloved friends, and a couple cats - all our loved ones' images resting beside a small flame. There were others there, too, known only in the hearts of our young people that were just too painful to name.

As we all sat together, more quietly and attentive than usual, there was an unspoken truth among us - any of our pictures could have been up there. Someday, someone will bring our image to a Confirmation class and lay it beside a candle.

I am proud of our youth for how maturely and seriously they were in that moment. It is a courageous and humbling act to look death in the eye. An act that our culture does not allow us to do very often. We like to avoid death at all costs and do whatever we can to stay young and stay alive. We trade the jagged word "died" for a smoother, more palatable words: passed, left us, went home.

Which is what makes Ash Wednesday in the Church such a unique and necessary act in our culture. In some ways, Ash Wednesday is that Confirmation class when our beautiful and fragile images are laid beside a flickering candle. Ash Wednesday is when we all come face-to face with the truth about each one of us: we are mortal. For all of us to be marked with ashes and to hear, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return," is to walk together in a level place, where no one's perceived higher or lower status makes any difference. In the book by Cathy Wurzer and Bruce Kramer, We Know How This Ends, Bruce Kramer says, "acknowledge death, and suddenly you must acknowledge just how vulnerable the human condition truly is."

We are dust. We are mortal. We are dying. It is a truth that lays us all bare and, like the elephant in the room finally being named, we can all exhale. We can look around at the community of people gathered around us and know that we are all in this together. We are not alone. We belong to each other and we belong to God. As the Apostle Paul put it, "Whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's." At the end of the day and the end of a life, that's all we really need to know.

I recently heard the story of a hospital chaplain who had attended an Ash Wednesday service over the noon hour. He came back to the hospital with ashes on his forehead, and went to go visit a particularly joyful and peppy resident — one who would say, "Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord!" after just about anything. But on this particular day, she asked about the dirt on his forehead, and he said, "No, no. It's Ash Wednesday. This is a cross that has been placed on my forehead in ashes and oil." Looking confused, she asked, "Why on earth would you

Stephen Ministry: A Call for Healing

In the era of road rage and dueling tweets, God's people are called to look with love on one another. Perhaps we think we do just that, but it is easy to ignore the hurts of others. Jesus helps us respond to that call to love by inviting us to see him in the faces of those who are anxious, in the hands of those who must work two or three jobs, in the feet of those who are in a hurry - even on icy roads. How can we help one another heal?

Set aside the notion of healing as curing or fixing. Much human pain requires neither drugs nor repair. Much human hurt seeks simple acknowledgement and presence. Turn to your right and consider the respite from worry someone there may need. Offering a smile could make an important connection. Turn to your left and wonder which soul's regret aches for forgiveness. Extending a hand and warm greeting could begin a welcome conversation.

For Christians, Lent is a time to reflect on hurts: those of Jesus, others, and our own. Some hurts are obvious, even public; many are not. Might someone you know express private hurts by retreating, lashing out, denying, deflecting, or giving up? Might you? Stephen Ministers are trained to listen attentively, support quietly, and offer the healing of all hurts through the free gift of God's grace. 
do that?" After thinking for a moment, he said, "Because this is a sign that when life goes to hell, God is still with me."






The Library at St. John's From the Adult Ministry & Education Board By Genevieve Quarberg

During our February snows many of us were hunkered down with Netflix. Maybe even watching a movie in a foreign language we once studied, where we struggled to understand what was going on even though we recalled only a few words or phrases - because we hadn't practiced that language. I suspect that much of the world we live in has that experience with the church. Or a different a picture. Sometimes our TV shows a split screen, but something goes wrong and one side becomes blurry or indistinct. For many people our empirically orientated world shows up clearly but our "church world" becomes so foggy we turn it off. In either picture it's obvious that the practice of "living in God's presence" has become very difficult for many people.

Our pastors are diligent, faithful, and imaginative in their sermons, always based on one of the four Gospels, the stories of Jesus. Our liturgy and the hymns we sing together give us time to face ourselves and to express our faith. Our times talking together give us encouragement and an opportunity to be friends. And, we have another resource at St. John's in the Library.

While we removed many books that were outdated in approach or language, we still have many more available for personal use. Some on display are especially for the season of Lent, some are from people who have gone through difficult times and found solace in God's presence in their lives. No one person's words are the last word. Their words are there to read, to question, to argue with. They are there for us, the readers, to find our own words to be able to live in this world of the 'forgotten language' of the church or the 'split-screen' world we all live in.


If you are an eligible member of Thrivent Financial, don't forget to direct Thrivent Choice Dollars.®

From the Benevolence & Social Concerns Board

Now is the time for the annual Minnesota Food Share Campaign through the Northfield Community Action Center (CAC). During the month of March food shelves across Minnesota seek donations to augment supplies and run their programs. Local donations are dispersed by the CAC into Northfield food programs such as the Food Shelf. Monetary donations are preferred. The CAC is a non-profit serving the life sustaining needs of people in our area through resources, advocacy and volunteer efforts. churches, campuses, and other faith communities in writing letters to Congress. Each year for the focus of the campaign we choose specific legislation or a legislative emphasis that can make a real difference to people struggling with hunger and poverty.

People write letters, usually as a group, and present them as an offering to God before mailing them to Congress. Hundreds of Offerings of Letters are held each year, resulting in tens of thousands of letters to Congress. Supported with prayer, these letters are a bold witness to God's justice and mercy. They have a significant impact on the decisions made in Congress.

Over the past several decades, the world - with a strong commitment from the United States - has made great progress toward ending hunger by promoting global nutrition programs. Hunger and poverty rates have been cut nearly in half during the past 30 years. In countries such as Ghana and Honduras, stunting - when a child does not grow and develop properly because of chronic malnutrition - has been reduced by nearly one third in approximately 10 years.

To accelerate progress on nutrition we must scale up what we know works: improved access to nutritious foods, vitamins and minerals, clean water and sanitation, promotion of breastfeeding, and treatment for severe malnutrition. Current funding is not enough to reach our global nutrition goals and powerful political forces are pushing to curtail poverty-focused assistance.

The letters we offer will urge Congress to support a global initiative that will speed up progress on nutrition. Passage by our Congress of a bill strengthening U.S. commitment to global child nutrition, with funding increases, will lead other countries to join us in the global effort to end hunger.

At a time of sharp political division in our country, our Offering of Letters can unite Americans around a common cause from which millions stand to gain.

St. John's will join the Bread for the World 2019 Offering of Letters campaign, "Better Nutrition, Better Tomorrow," this month. Materials, including sample letters, will be available between services at tables in St. John's Hall on Sundays - March 10, 17 and 24. Members of the Peace & Justice Group will be present with information and assistance. Letters will be offered in worship on March 24.
