

The idea is that anyone who may be struggling can use the goods to make ends meet. The community is welcome to donate to the box being mindful of Minnesota's temperature changes. Donation Ideas (please check expiration dates): canned goods, pasta, flour, sugar, coffee, crackers, soap, mittens, toothbrush, baby items, such as diapers and pacifiers. The box is located in the drive-up on the north side of St. John's.

#### **From Our Pastors**

"Weeping may last for the night, but joy comes in the morning." *Psalm 30:5* 

A few weeks ago, in a Catechism class, I reminded our 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> graders that the word *Lent* actually means "springtime." Instantly, one young person replied, "That's so weird – because Lent seems like such a gloomy time in the church." He is not wrong. It is a sort of gloomy time. We begin with the marking of ashes and reminder of our

mortality. We continue with hymns in a more minor key – and even the center pieces in the St. John's Commons are sort of gloomy with their black placemats and their boney branches.

When you think about it, though, "springtime" is always preceded by a kind of gloom or emptiness. The earth outside looks weathered and worn, brown and burdened by another weird winter. But just beneath the surface, where we cannot go just yet, lest we disturb the magic and mystery, there are bulbs preparing to reach for the surface. There are seeds cracking open, creating their own little cauldrons of life that will soon burst towards the sky. Or think of the moment a new one is brought into this world. It doesn't always *start* with celebration. It starts with birth pangs. It starts in the dark, with life fighting for the surface, kicking to be born.

As weird as it may sound, springtime always begins in gloom. It must.

Earlier on the same day as that Catechism class, the Northfield area clergy and faith leaders group gathered for our monthly meeting. Because of the challenges our nation and world are facing at the moment, the group itself was quite gloomy. Recognizing the state of everyone in the room, the Rabbi from Carleton (who was giving the devotion that day) said, "I know this might sound weird, but I want us to go around and share where we have been surprised by joy recently. I am sure no one is in the mood for this right now, but can we just try it?" One by one, we all reluctantly obliged.

One person shared that they got to spend 3 unexpected days with their college-age daughter. Another shared that they unexpectedly joined the neighborhood kids in sledding, after the sudden snowstorm a week earlier. Someone shared that unexpected joy found them when they caught their young kids sneaking downstairs earlier in the morning with mischief mixed with comradery painted all over their faces.

One by one, each person found something to share – and it wasn't long before we all were laughing together with bright smiles towards one another. One person said, "When you asked us to do this, I rolled my eyes, because it was the last thing I wanted to do and I had nothing to share. But now...now I feel so filled with joy. I had no idea it was just waiting to be found."

There was joy...life...right underneath the surface of our lives, ready to burst forth. We just had to let it happen. It was marvelous.

Since then, I have been trying to mark the moments where I am surprised by joy – like when I catch someone dancing in their car at a stoplight or when I see two college students walking and laughing

# Tuesday, April 29, 6:30 -8:30 p.m. "When My Times Comes" Documentary & Discussion

The Faith & Health Board invites you to participate in viewing and discussing a thought-provoking documentary about medical aid in dying.

When My Time Comes is a PBS documentary depicting Diane Rehm's exploration of the issue of medical aid in dying (MAID). This is an



option for terminally ill patients with six months or less to live who are able to make their own medical decisions and meet certain other prescribed criteria. Available to over 20% of the U.S. population, it is an option that John Rehm, Diane's husband of 54 years, wanted before he died in 2014, but could not have.

The film tells Diane and John's story, as well as the stories and perspectives of others as Diane sets out to discover as much as she can about MAID. Viewers will learn what Diane learns, right alongside her, in a series of conversations with patients, family members, physicians, clergy, and lawmakers. A diversity of viewpoints is represented – pro, con, and undecided.

The film will help Americans understand what MAID actually is, and what it is not. Medical aid in dying is not suicide, euthanasia, or many of the others things with which it is sometimes confused. The film will also encourage people to have conversations with their family and their physicians about what they want at the end of their lives, and to have those conversations early.

Raymond De Vries will facilitate a discussion following the 55-minute film. Ray is Professor Emeritus at the University of Michigan's Center for Bioethics and Social Sciences in Medicine. He was Professor of Sociology at St. Olaf College from 1988 to 2006.



Venice Williams November 6, 2024 From the first group for women at St. John's (1875) to present day WELCA, St. John's women have generously raised money to support St. John's, St. Olaf, the Northfield community, and other non-profit organizations. Through the years, money has been raised by catering meals, selling craft items at bazaars, monthly offerings, and gifts. This is a sampling of support offered through the years by St. John's women's groups.



- 1875 Five ladies attended the first Ladies Aid meeting, each contributing \$0.25 for material which would be made into useful articles to be sold to help purchase a reed organ for St. Olaf School.
- 1900 \$50 was given to St. Olaf for furnishing a waiting room for girls in the Boys Dormitory.
- 1912 The Ladies aid gave \$1,802.34 to the building of our present church.
- 1914 Clothing was purchased for \$3.97 for several children so they could be brought to church for baptism.
- 1915 The 40th anniversary was observed with gifts of \$1,000 to the church building fund and \$1,050 to the organ fund.
- 1920 Gave \$1,000 to help finance the parsonage.
- 1923 In response to an urgent emergency appeal the entire amount in the General Fund, \$1,136.77, was given to St. Olaf for the new Administration Building (now Holland Hall).
- 1943 Contributed 35 or 40 dozen cookies a week for several weeks to the USO Cookie Jar and also sent cookies to the Red Cross for Christmas.
- 1949 The Aid gave food and clothing to many displaced persons who came to Northfield through St. John's.


# Pub Theology in April

# Reflection of Kick-off Retreat for Tending the Garden by Margie O'Loughlin

Seven members of St. John's traveled to the Good Earth Retreat Center in Spring Valley, MN on Sunday, February 23rd. The event was the first of an eight part series called, "Tending the Garden". The facilitators had us up on our feet in to time, dancing and singing our way through a curriculum aimed at engaging our whole selves in the work of anti-racism. Who were our facilitators, you might wonder? It wasn't exactly business as usual for a Lutheran retreat.

JUSTmove is a Minneapolis-based dynamic duo of two friends who are brothers in Christ, and really terrific hip hop artists. Both have strong ties to Luther Seminary. Their approach is scriptural, and theologically grounded in the Lutheran tradition. They use music and storytelling to explore differences—not with guilt and shame but with joy and curiosity.

Joe Davis is a nationally-touring artist, educator, trainer, and speaker. He uses poetry, music, theater, and dance to shape culture. David Scherer is a performer, teacher, author, trainer, and facilitator who helps people build bridges across the "differences that make a difference." Davis is African American; Scherer is white.

In this first training, much of our energy was directed at deepening our listening skills and getting to know our fellow participants. As Davis and Scherer said, both are needed to move closer to a space of Beloved Community.

Attending from St. John's were Pastor Pam, Cheryl and Kirsten Buck, Jo Franklin, Elaine Nesbit, Maggie Odell, and Margie O'Loughlin.

The 60 or so people participating in "Tending the Garden" are from churches in Wabasha, Redwing, Dennison-Vang, Minneola, and Northfield. There are six monthly Zoom sessions to follow, and a final inperson retreat to be held at Good Earth in September.

Thank you to Pastor Paul Graham of the Dennison-Vang Lutheran Church for organizing the retreat series, and to St. John's for making it possible for us to attend.

# Habitat for Humanity: Energy Efficiency & Weatherization Program

Do you want to lower your energy bills AND help the earth at the same time? Habitat would like to help you! Rice County Habitat for Humanity is partnering with the City of Northfield to provide energy efficiency and weatherization assistance to homeowners. The program focuses on recruiting residents for home energy audits, scheduling and participating in the audits, and helping families implement recommendations by connecting them to funding and rebate programs. It also involves assisting with rebate applications and gathering feedback on barriers to accessing these programs. Additionally, the partnership includes weatherization assistance, working with the Northfield Rotary Climate Action Clean Energy Resource Teams (RCAT) to provide weatherization materials and services. Eligible low-income (incomes up to \$80,000) homeowners can receive improvements such as insulation, furnace maintenance, venting, and installation of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. The Celebration kicks-off the night before, Friday, April 26, with an evening Contra Dance at Armory Square in Northfield.


