

The box is located in the drive-up on the north side of St. John's.

Successful Middle and High School Mission Trip to Nashville!

In June, Pastor Jonathan and Emmanuel lead 28 youth and 6 other adult chaperones (three of whom were former youth at St. John's – Jaida Gehring, Mia Becker, and Seth Hansen!) to Nashville for a



mission trip. This trip included youth and chaperones from St. Peter's and First UCC. It was really great to create community and connections between our churches!

On Saturday, June 24, we drove to St. Louis and stayed over at a

local church. We worshiped at Gethsemane Lutheran Church that next morning and then visited the St. Louis Arch! On Sunday afternoon, we hit the road for Nashville!

During the week, we were divided into three separate service groups, which would leave our church homebase around 9:00 a.m. each day (with bag lunches in tow) and not return until 7:00 p.m. or so. Each day was divided into morning and afternoon service projects.





Throughout the week, participants spent time serving meals in a homeless shelter (Room in the Inn of Nashville), volunteering at a local church garden (The Giving Garden), sorting medical supplies to be donated (Project CURE), and working with community youth programs (Preston

Taylor Ministries of Nashville).

Each group also spent a morning driving around the city, learning about the history of its neighborhoods and praying for the places of struggle and care. Each person

St. John's Forums this Fall: Exploring the Bible with Interfaith Sensitivity

Throughout the New Testament, the Jewish roots of Christian faith are obvious. Jesus was a Jew, worshiped as Jew, and proclaimed the good news to fellow Jews. In spite of, or perhaps because of, this very close relationship to Judaism, early attempts to define Christianity's distinctiveness hardened into a fierce and deadly anti-Judaism. In the aftermath of the Holocaust, all major Christian denominations, including the ELCA, repented of this legacy; yet the recent rise in anti-Jewish violence would indicate its lingering impact.

The Adult Ministry & Education Board has invited three noted scholars in Jewish and Christian thought to examine this problem in greater depth as we launch a year-long study of the New Testament in its Jewish context. All three of the following forums will be held in the Sanctuary at 9:45 a.m. between the two Sunday services:

October 1

Dr. Deanna Thompson - Martin Luther's Anti-Judaism and Our Contemporary Response

In 1543, Martin Luther published "On the Jews and Their Lies," an anti-Jewish diatribe filled with hateful and violent language towards Jewish people. During this forum we will discuss the legacy of Luther's anti-Judaism and explore ways the ELCA has been working to repair Luther's legacy of harm against Jewish people, and what that work means for us as Lutheran Christians today.

Dr. Deanna A. Thompson is Director of the Lutheran Center for Faith, Values and Community and Martin E. Marty Regents Chair in Religion and the Academy. Thompson's work at St. Olaf focuses on advancing the mission and programming of the Lutheran Center and promoting interfaith dialogue both within and beyond St. Olaf. She is the author of five books, including *Crossing the Divide: Luther, Feminism, and the Cross* (Fortress, 2004) and a theological commentary on the biblical book of Deuteronomy for the Westminster John Knox Belief commentary series.

October 15

Earl Schwartz - "Who is like your people Israel, a singular nation?": Jewish "Chosenness" as a Source of Inspiration and Tension

Biblical history tells us something about when, where, and how Israel's distinctive identity as a people developed, but the extraordinary endurance of the Jewish descendants of those Israelites would also come to spawn questions about *why* it developed among these particular people. Themes of divine decree, ancestry, and an instructed way of life came to be associated with Jewish identity. What can we learn, as heirs of Abrahamic traditions, from the ways in which these themes have wended their way through this story?

Before his retirement, Earl Schwartz taught in the religion department of Hamline University and was the university's first director of its program in social justice studies. He has also served on the faculty of the Talmud Torah of St. Paul. He is the author of two books on Jewish moral education and co-author with Rabbi Barry Cytron of When Life is

Hope is a Muscle


Today's airwayes are flooded with reminders of our deepening divisions and the back-sliding of many social justice issues that we had long taken for granted. It is easy to lose heart and to wish to bury our heads in the sand. Yet we know that hope is a critical element to human flourishing, together with agency and dignity.

After decades of research, scientists are discovering that hope is more like a muscle than an emotion. It is the belief that your future can be brighter and better than your past and that you actually have a role to play in making it better ("Hope Rising," Gwinn & Hellman). If it were an equation it would look something like: Hope = Goals + Road Map + Willpower.



Among victims of trauma, this kind of hope appears to be one of the most effective antidotes yet studied.

This year our Courageous Conversations will feature speakers who will share stories of hope and resilience in the midst of struggle. It is our hope that we, in turn, might better understand how to reject injustice where we find it, and to work together to envision a better future for all.

The following individuals compose this team: David Neuger (Worship & Arts), Gary Engstrom (Business Management), Steve Taggart (Property & Grounds), and Dean Schoeb (Stewardship), along with Pastor Pam Fickenscher and Facility Manager Steve Harner. Jeff McLaughlin from the Foundation Board is also assisting and advising.

The team is exploring solar panels on our roof; other energy efficiency improvements; and other projects such as hail damage repair that would need to be coordinated with such projects. We anticipate bringing a plan to the congregation near the end of August.





Words from St. John's Library By Anne Sovik

Library Spotlight: The Faithful Spy

Luckily you don't need to be young to enjoy a young adult book. The Faithful Spy: Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Plot to Kill Hitler is a biography in graphic novel format. The author, John Hendrix, provides a comprehensive account of the life of German Lutheran pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer, his faith, and how it led him to participate in the plot to assassinate Hitler, a plot that eventually cost him his life. Hendrix also provides an in-depth look at the German resistance movement; Bonhoeffer did not act alone.

While the author doesn't skimp on historical detail (I learned a lot I hadn't known before) and gives source notes to authenticate facts and quotations, the book reads like a thriller. Hendrix's graphic approach and vivid illustrations enhance the account and make it accessible to young readers (and those not so young). Find it in the St. John's library on a display shelf or in the YA section.

in the Balance: Life and Death Decisions in Light of the Jewish Tradition, and Who Renews Creation, a Jewish sourcebook on environmental ethics.

November 5

Jason Ripley - Anti-Judaism and the New Testament

This session explores the Jewish context and character of the early Jesus movement as a way of contextualizing the anti-Jewish rhetoric embedded within the New Testament. We will discuss Jesus' identity as a particular type of Jew who challenges other competing Jewish notions of the Kingdom of God in the face of Roman imperial rule. We will also examine several key New Testament passages that were later employed to justify hostility and murder of Jews across the centuries in order to sensitize us to the problems and to suggest possibilities for interpreting these passages today.

Jason Ripley is a scholar of the New Testament, specializing in the Gospel of John. He teaches courses on the Bible and biblical interpretation and regularly leads students on study-abroad programs. His publications center on empire-critical readings of the New Testament, engaging topics of religious violence, gender, and reinterpretation of the Hebrew Bible in early Judaism. He has taught at St. Olaf College since 2005 and has been attending St. John's Lutheran Church since 2020.

We are excited to welcome these scholars to share their insights with us as we embark on a year of exploring ways to move beyond this difficult legacy. Look for other opportunities to engage in further study throughout the year.

Congregational Finance Update

- Offering received through the end of June is 42% of our \$966,500 offering budget. At the halfway point in the year we would hope to see this number at 46%. This puts us more than \$41,000 behind budget, slightly worse than what we reported in April.
- Expenses are on target at 48% of budget; in order to avoid another year-end deficit, the Council will begin to review budgets, potential cuts, or other ideas for savings in the second half of the year.
- The cost to repair hail damage to the roof will be covered by our property insurance.
