# **Blessing Box at St. John's**

"Take something if in need; leave something when blessed."



St. John's Sunday school children are supporting a new mission at St. John's this year: "Blessing Box". It is similar to the Little Libraries found around town except the Blessing box is filled with donated non-perishable food and personal hygiene products. The idea is that anyone walking by who may be struggling can use the goods to make ends meet. The community is welcome to donate to the box being mindful of Minnesota's temperature changes. Donation Ideas: canned goods, pasta, flour, sugar, coffee, crackers, soap, mittens, toothbrush, baby items, such as diapers, pacifiers. The box is located in the drive-up on the north side of St. John's.

## **Dear Friends in Christ:**

This month on Pentecost, we will be giving thanks for all the gifts of the Spirit - the many ways we share in ministry together, visible and invisible.

Our Stewardship Board wanted to lift up the many ways people give of their time and talents, but we quickly realized that there was no way we could generate a comprehensive list that could truthfully encompass all the different roles we take in community. Some "volunteer jobs" are well-defined, while others, no less important, are less about particular times and places and more about the outpouring of a person's spiritual gifts into community.

We also want to make clear that giving of time and talent, like giving of treasure, are acts of generosity that are the natural overflow of faith.

After 20 years of working in the church full-time, I've learned a few things about generosity:

Generosity of time and generosity of treasure are often interlinked. It's almost never an either/or proposition, because both are part of how we give our whole lives back to God. While what we have available to us in treasure or ability may vary over a lifetime, generosity tends to flow from one part of our lives to another.

Generosity has nothing to do with income or with how "busy" you are. Some of the most limited income people give sacrificially year after year. Some of the busiest people are the most reliable volunteers. It seems that God always provides what we need in gifts of both treasure and time to accomplish important mission. When we answer God's call, there will be enough.

Generosity does have something to do with trust. Generally speaking, people give when they care deeply about a place and when they are engaged enough to trust that their gifts will be used wisely. That's why it's so important for a congregation to be a good steward of gifts, being both efficient in the use of money, careful about honoring the use of time, and extremely compassionate in how it treats people.

Generosity grows when we take risks. Someone who has not had a habit of giving rarely decides to become generous when their income goes up. Usually it's more the other way around – someone learns that giving sacrificially feels good, and once they know that feeling, they want to continue it even when their circumstances change, whether for better or for worse. The same is true for gifts of time – the most exhilarating gifts of talent are the ones when we try out something new or grow our skills.

Over the past months many of you have stepped out in boldness in your generosity – giving extra to our Grace Overflowing Campaign, or stepping up to a new volunteer role, or simply extending your own relationship circle a little outside your comfort zone. THANK YOU!

The waters of our baptism call us over and over again to trust that God's grace will overflow. As we celebrate the gifts of the Spirit, let us continue to trust that these waters do not run dry.

# **Stephen Ministry: Our Labyrinth - A Peaceful Path**

The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual World Labyrinth Day is May 5. Through history, labyrinths have served as a substitute for making pilgrimages to holy sites like Jerusalem or Rome.

Embedded in the tile floor pattern in the Commons is a labyrinth. If you enter the labyrinth and follow the path, it will lead to the center and then back out again. Basically, it's walking a meditative path that is laid out before you. You just walk and follow the path that allows you to quiet your mind.

When you enter the labyrinth, consider your intentions for walking with a question, statement, or image. Focus and quiet your mind. Here are some questions to ponder when walking the labyrinth:

- What do I need from this walk?
- What questions am I carrying in my heart?
- Am I perceiving reality truthfully?
- Is there something that does not fit in my path?
- Do I have a decision to make?
- What is my next step?
- Is it a good step for me?

As you walk, you are looking inward and outward trying to be in relationship and harmony with yourself, others, and God. The path is walked slowly and contemplatively as a spiritual exercise of bringing mind, body, heart, and soul into harmony with God.

# From the Faith & Health Board: American Red Cross Blood Drive

# What is Happening with Youth Ministry at St. John's in 2018-2019?

In the February Newsletter, we shared that a small group of adults would be gathering to talk about what we want the future of youth ministry to look like at St. John's. We are calling this group the Youth Transition Team. The work of this group has proven to be a much bigger conversation than anticipated, as there is much to learn and think about regarding current trends and best practices for youth ministry in the 21st Century.

This group has been meeting with Karen Gieseke, from Luther Seminary, who has taught us about the original purpose of things like Sunday school and youth groups when they started developing in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> Century. This has led us into big questions like – what is the purpose of youth ministry here at St. John's in this time and place? What do we want our youth to experience during their time here?

These are important questions and conversations that we want to have with parents, youth, and other adults. The Youth Transition Team will lead an adult forum on May 6 to share about our process of learning and some of our suggestions going forward. Your participation in this conversation is critical to the future of youth ministry at St. John's. Please plan to attend.

Following discussions with the St. John's Executive Committee and the Church Council, we have decided to continue with our current interim staffing structure for 2018-2019. We feel strongly that discerning a faithful future for youth ministry at St. John's warrants additional time.



# **Special Offering in May for Lutheran World Relief**

Lutheran World Relief (LWR) helps families in the world's poorest communities. In 2017, your support of LWR reached 3,163,673 people in 32 countries through 131 projects. LWR works to improve livelihoods and to assist in emergencies.


For example, the lives of millions of small farmers and their families are improved through sustainable agriculture projects. Did you know that coffee is the second-most traded commodity in the whole world, second only to crude oil? LWR works with smallholder coffee and cocoa producers. With expertise developed over decades, LWR brings a unique perspective and skill set to improve producers' lives from the ground up.

LWR's emergency operations are designed to address the most urgent and basic needs of communities hit by war and natural disasters. One example is in Mosul, Iraq, the city once known as Nineveh – where God sent Jonah almost three thousand years ago. Days after Mosul's liberation from the Islamic State (IS) in July 2017, Lutheran World Relief began serving thousands of people who were scarred, scared, and longing for lives free of risk and repression. LWR is carrying out the city's only psychosocial counseling and recovery support, and is one of only a few international nongovernmental organizations working in the area. The task is great. The damage to Mosul included 4,000 civilian deaths, 30,000 IS militant deaths, the flight of 900,000 people, and more than 90 percent of houses and buildings destroyed. LWR's work helps people heal and build hope as they return after the war.





## **LEGACY OF A ST. JOHN'S WOMAN**

This is a continuation of a series on women who have served in the church and given much toward its ministry. This month Elaine Feroe is introduced to you.

Elaine was born in Minneapolis and later the family moved to Eau Claire, Wisconsin, where her dad continued in his pastoral ministry.

She entered St. Olaf College, majoring in History. While in school, she had the opportunity to attend an Ashram at Lake Geneva, WI. It was there that she met a "bachelor pastor" (her description),

Jennings Feroe, who was serving a congregation in Fox Lake, Illinos.

Jennings observed Elaine playing ping pong and was impressed with her athletic playing ability and invited her for a round of golf. She declined the invite. Later, he asked again. She declined again.

After that weekend, their contacts continued with letter writing. But due to WWII, Jennings now was in the U.S. Navy, serving as a chaplain. On one leave, he came to visit Elaine at St. Olaf, appearing in his Navy Whites. She says he caused quite a stir amongst the female students.

Time moved on. Jennings was due to be sent to Hawaii for his second deployment and their plans were to be married and he to take Elaine with him. However, the war, then, was declared over, and Pastor Feroe accepted a call to Bethlehem Lutheran in Mankato, MN. Elaine says that he was called, with a salary, but the congregation expected the wife to "serve for free," which she did!

They were in Mankato for 28 years, had five children, and Elaine kept very busy working with the youth in Luther League, teaching Sunday School and Vacation Bible School, leading the women's organization, and producing and running off the Sunday bulletins on the church mimeograph.

In all this time in Mankato, her husband presided in about 700 weddings and Elaine, again, was expected to be at the rehearsal dinners and the wedding receptions. No remuneration, even though she needed to hire a baby sitter for her young family.

But Elaine said that the one service she could not provide as a pastor's wife was the ability to play the piano or sing. And she was thankful she was spared that expectation!

They moved to Northfield, after Mankato, where her husband was a fund raiser for St. Olaf for several years and then served as a visitation pastor at St. John's for five years. In these years, for Elaine, there were not the expectations so she enjoyed functioning as a regular member of the congregation.

In retirement, her travels with her husband took them to Arizona, and to the countries of Norway, Germany, Austria and India.

Pastor Feroe died seven years ago and now Elaine dearly enjoys her family, likes to play bridge and attends the wonderful programs where she lives.

With many retired pastors and spouses in the Northfield community, Elaine had the role that was expected of many from those earlier decades when the wives "came with the package." Devoted, kind, quiet, in loyal servitude.



# Synod Assembly: May 4 and 5

The Southeastern Minnesota Synod will gather for its annual assembly on Friday, May 4, and Saturday, May 5, in Mankato. The theme of this year's assembly is accompanying our global partners, and guests from the synod's global partners in Colombia, Tanzania, and South Sudan will all be present for this assembly.

At our annual meeting in January, St. John's elected voting members for the assembly. In addition to Pastors Fickenscher and Davis, St. John's will send Kristin Partlo, Martin Thorsheim, and Tarkel Price.

Synod assemblies include worship, workshops, Bible study, and reports from all the working tables of the synod. Resolutions brought forward from the conferences are considered, and members of synod council and committees are elected. This year will also include election of voting members to the Churchwide Assembly in 2019.

The 2019 synod assembly will include the election of a new bishop. Bishop Steven Delzer has announced he will not seek another term, and none of the current synod staff are seeking election either. Bishop Delzer has invited the whole synod into a time of discernment in the year ahead as we prepare to identify a new bishop.
