

From Our Pastors

Dear Friends in Christ.

It's been a really fun and meaningful season in youth ministry at St. John's. Sometimes it is simply amazing how the pieces weave together, and these past few weeks with the youth have been just that. A combination of interfaith dialogue and service work have been revealing how their lives and learning are tied up with the broader congregation and people across the globe in beautiful ways.

Colossians 1:15 – "Christ is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation."

The Greek word for image is είκὼν from which we get our English word icon.

After spending the weeks of Lent learning about words and imagery used to describe God, we turned to learning about another kind of image, the Greek Orthodox icon, as we began our time centered on interfaith dialogue.

Each year, we try to have a series in Confirmation and High School Youth group that is centered around interfaith dialogue. We lean into the belief that religious diversity is a gift of God from we which can learn. God can and does speak to us through people of other faith traditions, which can deepen our own connection to our Christian faith.

This year, in early April, we spent a week of Confirmation and High School Youth group learning about the Greek Orthodox Christian tradition, followed by a trip the next week up to St. George Greek Orthodox Church. The Orthodox Church was still in the season of Lent and we got to experience one of their Wednesday Lenten services. The welcome we received was warm and compassionate. The cantor took time with us to explain worship – how it would be similar and different from our worship, and after worship the priest sat with us for 30 minutes answering our questions and teaching us about the Greek Orthodox tradition. We learned about the role icons play in their faith tradition, the way the architecture of the Sanctuary speaks to their theology, and the unique traditions they have around Holy Communion – like using only the center of a loaf of bread and soaking it in the wine. We learned a lot and invited the people of St. George's to come and visit us sometime!

The invisible becoming visible...

This trip and encounter with the Greek Orthodox tradition was especially meaningful because of the service project we would do the following week. The very next week, through the encouragement of Mary Hoff, and the work of Kristin Partlo and Pastor Pam, we had an opportunity to participate in an intergenerational service project called *Ray of Life*. During this project, youth and adults together built solar panel boxes, which are able to provide light and charge a cell phone for people without any electricity. Thanks to an anonymous donation, we were able to purchase and build 30 solar power boxes that will be shipped and hand delivered next month to people living in war-torn Ukraine. Eastern Orthodox Christianity is the primary faith in Ukraine. The faith we got to learn about the week before is the faith of many who would receive these Ray of Life boxes in Ukraine.

St. John's Forum in May 9:45-10:30 a.m. in the Sanctuary

May 5

Exploring the Bible with Interfaith Sensitivity: Jason Ripley - Is the New Testament Anti-Jewish? The Letters of Paul.

This session explores aspects of the broad question, "Is the New Testament anti-Jewish?" Special attention will be given to Paul's letter to the Romans, addressed to a mixed community of Gentile and Jewish followers of Jesus in the center of the Roman empire, facing challenges across religious, cultural, social, and political issues. We will explore how Paul engages the questions "Has God abandoned the Jewish people - and what might the implications be for Gentile followers? Can Jewish followers of Jesus still keep the Torah commandments? Must Gentiles? Does following Jesus entail rejecting Judaism?"

Jason Ripley is currently chair of the religion department at St. Olaf. A New Testament scholar specializing in the Gospel of John, he teaches courses on biblical interpretation and regularly leads students on study-abroad programs. His publications address topics of religious violence, gender, and reinterpretation of the Hebrew Bible in early Judaism. He has been attending St. John's Lutheran Church since 2020.








"I Am a Prisoner of Hope" was written at a time when political divisiveness, polarization, extremism, hate crimes, xeno-phobia, and violence are increasing at an alarming rate. The racial inequality and injustices that led to the Civil Rights Movement have not been fully remedied.

Lotegeluaki, a St. John's member, will offer insight into the

assumptions, attitudes, fears, and greed that have led to some of these current problems. Hope is seen as the driving force that sustains people through horrific circumstances and propels them to seek a better situation. We are thrilled to host a member of our own congregation, on such a timely topic, completing our 2023-2024 "Courageous Conversations: Hope is a Muscle" program year.



- a little history... by Dawn Tommerdahl

St. John's has been selling fair trade coffee for nearly forty years! Equal Exchange (EE) was founded in 1986 as a social enterprise to strengthen the relationship between international food growers and US consumers. Its first product was Nicaraguan coffee, imported during the US embargo imposed against the Sandinista government. Over the next few years, EE staff established relationships with democratically run farmer groups in Central America and Africa, eventually joining the European Fair Trade network, thus gaining even wider access to farmer cooperatives.

About that time, having learned about Equal Exchange through St. John's Women of the ELCA (WELCA), Thelma Nitz (Lee) urged the WELCA board to partner with EE. With the board's blessing, she placed a coffee order and set up shop - and the rest is history!

Thelma's daughters moved to Northfield, Carolyn Nitz (1991), and Chris Anderson (2007) and joined the family coffee crew. Kathy Shea joined the team (2008) and brought in EE sales of chocolate. Equal Exchange sales continue to this day, on the first Sunday of the month. Dawn Tommerdahl and Mary Ellen North sell coffee, tea, hot cocoa mix and chocolate bars – and more....

Tenyears ago, St. John's women added Thistle Farms (TF) products as well as coffee. Thistle Farms is a nonprofit social enterprise dedicated to helping women survivors recover and heal from prostitution, trafficking, and addiction. Survivors are given a safe place to live, a meaningful job making Thistle Farms products, and lifelong support.

You support these social enterprises through your purchases. We round up prices to make it easier to give change. The small amount of profit generated by the mark-up each year is donated to non-profits in our community. (continued on next page)


Fun facts about Fair Trade and More sales at St. John's:

©-Our gray cash box, originally a tackle box – has been in use since Thelma began coffee sales nearly 40 years ago.

©-Thelma was ahead of her time: not until 1996 did EE and Lutheran World Relief collaborate to make selling fair trade products easier for congregations. For almost 20 years EE made a donation to LWR for each bag of coffee sold in Lutheran congregations.

©-Ethiopian coffee has been our bestseller for years. It was added to the coffee selection as a way to remember the story from Acts 8 of Philip and the Ethiopian eunuch.

©-Pastor Pam and the founder of Thistle Farms, Rev. Becca Stevens, overlapped at Vanderbilt Divinity School.



Ray of Life

Youth and adults at St. John's Lutheran Church spent Wednesday evening, April 17, constructing solar kits that will provide light and power to refugees in and near Ukraine.

The project, known as Ray of Life, is the vision of a West Virginia-based nonprofit New Vision Renewable Energy. The technology, a 4-pound box that can charge a cell phone and provide a nightlight even in a Ukrainian winter, was developed by John Prusa, whose own family were refugees from Eastern Europe in the 1960's. New Vision trains local community members in manufacturing and partners with churches, schools, and other organizations to send these kits to places around the world. That could be a developing community where an electrical grid doesn't exist, or a community where the infrastructure has been destroyed by war.

The project's link to Minnesota is Dave Nonnemacher, a Duluth resident whose connections in Ukraine and Moldova have put these kits into the hands of people who need them. Nonnemacher has personally traveled to the area annually since March 2022, shortly after the war began.

Thanks to Mary Hoff for connecting St. John's with Ray of Life. An anonymous donor provided a gift that funded the costs of the boxes, which will be accompanied by water filters when they are shipped later this spring.

What is Pub Theology?


It is weekly conversation around questions of faith, God, Jesus, the Bible, current events, and culture. No fancy theological or biblical knowledge needed in order to participate.

St. John's Chorale Works with Composer Rene Clausen

On Wednesday, March 20, the St. John's Chorale had the opportunity to work with world renowned composer and conductor Rene Clausen.

Clausen was the conductor of the Concordia Choir at Concordia College, Moorhead, MN for 35 years. He retired in 2021 and now lives in the south metro. The Chorale was preparing two of his pieces: "Set Me as a Seal" and "All That Hath Life and Breath Praise Ye the Lord" that were shared in worship on Easter Sunday. During the hour he spent with the choir, Clausen shared musical insights about each piece as well as the personal stories of what was happening in his life when he composed them. The rehearsal was very moving and helped everyone gain a better understanding of the character and spirit of each piece.





Habitat for Humanity Home Builds in Northfield

Homes are being built for Partner families in Northfield this year. Partner families are selected by three main criteria: a need for

housing, the ability to partner with Habitat in sweat equity (building with the volunteers on their own house or the house of another partner family), and the ability to pay an affordable mortgage when the build is complete.

From the Church Council

On March 7, the ELCA Council of Bishops – the elected leaders of the 65 synods of the ELCA - met and approved a statement calling for a permanent bilateral cease-fire in Gaza (see below).

At their March and April meetings the Church Council discussed how to educate the congregation about the statement and whether to affirm it. At their April meeting they voted (7 yes, 4 abstaining) to affirm the statement.

The Conference of Bishops of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) is adding its voice to the growing group of faith leaders urgently calling for a permanent bilateral cease-fire in Gaza. We urge President Joe Biden, our legislators, and all who lead and make decisions on behalf of the United States to do everything in their power to bring an end to the current suffering and lay the foundation for lasting peace with justice.

As members of the ELCA Conference of Bishops, we are elected to lead one of the largest Christian denominations in the United States, with nearly 3 million members in more than 8,700 worshiping communities across the 50 states and in the Caribbean region. We are compelled to advocate, pray, and act by the social teachings of our denomination, and by our belief - rooted in Scripture - that all people are made in the image of God.

We mourn the loss of 1,200 precious lives in Israel on October 7 by the actions of Hamas and the trauma for those 250 others who were taken hostage. We mourn the loss of over 30,000 precious lives in Gaza including tens of thousands of women and children - who have died in Israel's military action since then and the trauma that ripples outward from this loss. We grieve the deaths of more than 400 Palestinians in the West Bank, including East Jerusalem, and in Israel since October 7 as the circle of violence expands and makes casualties of yet more civilians.

Too many have suffered. Too many lives have been lost. Strong U.S. leadership is needed to help bring a comprehensive permanent cease-fire and lasting peace. Our country's leadership is needed to support human rights and the Geneva Conventions, to resume funding to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA), and to provide greater access for humanitarian relief in Gaza, as well as to advocate for the immediate and safe return of the hostages and release of political prisoners, for affirmation of both Israel and Palestine's right to exist, and for a path forward that disrupts cycles of violence. Mindful of the rise in hate targeted at people across complex intersections of race, ethnicity and religion - worldwide and nationally - we exhort our legislators, leaders and neighbors to oppose hate in all its forms, and we recommit ourselves to partnership in that same work.

Jesus taught: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). We affirm that all our neighbors, near and far, are children of God and made in God's image, and we are praying for President Biden, our legislators and all decision-makers. May God give us and our leaders everything necessary to meet the needs of this critical moment, particularly peacemaking.
