

From Our Pastors

Dear Friends in Christ.

Grief is a tricky and unpredictable thing. It shows up in ways and in moments when we don't expect it.

This summer, I was on a church mission trip to Nashville with middle and high school youth, and a group of us walked right into grief we didn't expect or know was there. We were volunteering at a summer program for youth, and we were assigned a number of tasks to do in order to make the space ready for the children to show up the following day. Tasks like moping the floors, cleaning the tables, etc. But one task stood out – we were asked to take painted rocks and place them around a newly planted tree in the backyard. This was given to us as an ordinary task among the others.

But then the leader of the program, Ms. Toni, told us what the tree was about. The tree had been planted in loving memory of 9-year-old Hallie, who was killed in the school shooting in Nashville this past March. Hallie's mom had been a volunteer at this summer program, and so they felt the need to do something to honor Hallie's life. Thus, the tree and the rocks handed painted by the children.

After learning this, our high school youth treated this moment with the sanctity it deserved – gently choosing a painted rock, carefully walking it outside, and thoughtfully placing it around the base of the tree. It took us all of 2-minutes to do, but when the task was over, no one moved. There was a palpable sense that this ordinary request was in fact a holy ritual that we, as strangers, had been invited into. Feeling like something was missing – that we couldn't just go from this moment to cleaning out the closet – we asked Ms. Toni if we could pray a blessing around this tree. She said yes.

We all circled around the tree, reach out our hands to the people next to us, and we prayed. It felt a bit awkward and beautiful all at the same time, but it also felt very, very right. When the prayer ended, Ms. Toni was weeping. She said, "I didn't expect you all to do that. These past few months have been so awful and so hard, and we haven't taken a moment to stop and pray and grieve. Thank you."

None of us expected this national tragedy and communal grief to come so close to us, but there it was – right in front of us. I doubt any of us who were there will forget that moment for a long time. There was a very real sense that God was present in that unexpected and sacred moment.

In the gospel of Matthew, Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." I hear in this that God makes holy our grieving spaces and promises to meet us there.

Grief often surprises us. Not all grief is so tragic as what we encountered in Nashville. But any grief is real and important. And it pleads for our attention. Grief is always all around us, but especially in a season of transitions like this one – as parents are sending their children off to school for the first time or the last, as new and old jobs

start or end, or as some trudge through the task of clearing out a loved one's home to get it ready for market.

When our grief shows up unexpectedly, or when you stumble into someone else's grief, I think our bodies and souls long to do something about it. When that happens, I invite you to do what you can to stop and take a deep breath, and find a way to mark the moment. Maybe that means saying a prayer, or lighting a candle, or simply putting your hand over your heart. Grief is hard, and it can also be very sacred at the same time, because God promises to be with us in that moment.

St. John's Forums this Fall: Exploring the Bible with Interfaith Sensitivity

Throughout the New Testament, the Jewish roots of Christian faith are obvious. Jesus was a Jew, worshiped as Jew, and proclaimed the good news to fellow Jews. In spite of, or perhaps because of, this very close relationship to Judaism, early attempts to define Christianity's distinctiveness hardened into a fierce and deadly anti-Judaism. In the aftermath of the Holocaust, all major Christian denominations, including the ELCA, repented of this legacy; yet the recent rise in anti-Jewish violence would indicate its lingering impact.

The Adult Ministry & Education Board has invited three noted scholars in Jewish and Christian thought to examine this problem in greater depth as we launch a year-long study of the New Testament in its Jewish context. All three of the following forums will be held in the Sanctuary at 9:45 a.m. between the two Sunday services:

October 1

Dr. Deanna Thompson - Martin Luther's Anti-Judaism and Our Contemporary Response

In 1543, Martin Luther published "On the Jews and Their Lies," an anti-Jewish diatribe filled with hateful and violent language towards Jewish people. During this forum we will discuss the legacy of Luther's anti-Judaism and explore ways the ELCA has been working to repair Luther's legacy of harm against Jewish people, and what that work means for us as Lutheran Christians today.

Dr. Deanna A. Thompson is Director of the Lutheran Center for Faith, Values and Community and Martin E. Marty Regents Chair in Religion and the Academy. Thompson's work at St. Olaf focuses on advancing the mission and programming of the Lutheran Center and promoting interfaith dialogue both within and beyond St. Olaf. She is the author of five books, including *Crossing the Divide: Luther, Feminism, and the Cross* (Fortress, 2004) and a theological commentary on the biblical book of Deuteronomy for the Westminster John Knox Belief commentary series.

October 15

Earl Schwartz - "Who is like your people Israel, a singular nation?": Jewish "Chosenness" as a Source of Inspiration and Tension

Biblical history tells us something about when, where, and how Israel's distinctive identity as a people developed, but the extraordinary endurance of the Jewish descendants of those Israelites would also come to spawn questions about why it developed among these particular people. Themes of divine decree, ancestry, and an instructed way of life came to be associated with Jewish identity. What can we learn, as heirs of Abrahamic traditions, from the ways in which these themes have wended their way through this story?

Before his retirement, Earl Schwartz taught in the religion department of Hamline University and was the university's first director of its program in social justice studies. He has also served on the faculty of the Talmud Torah of St. Paul. He is the author of two books on Jewish moral education and co-author with Rabbi Barry Cytron of When Life is

St. John's 2023-2024 Women of the ELCA Executive Board began the year's work in earnest at their last meeting.


Courageous Conversations is returning for another year of exciting programs. See St. John's Women bulletin board for details.

Facilities Sustainability Work

Over the summer, a dedicated group of leaders has shepherded our planning to make investments in St. John's facility that will promote financial and environmental sustainability over the years ahead.

We have explored solar and geothermal energy options as well as a number of other technologies and innovations that can reduce our carbon footprint as well as our energy costs.

To this end, the Council authorized an engineering assessment of our HVAC systems to determine if geothermal is a viable option for the future. In addition, we are working with EnerChange, a state-funded agency that performs energy audits for nonprofits and recommends projects to maximize our efficiency.

We are learning about government rebates for projects we have already completed – such as the tankless water heaters that replaced our obsolete water heater in May – as well as potential tax rebates for future projects that would reduce the costs to us by as much as 30%.

At the time of this writing, there are still questions we haven't answered, but we are confident that with the congregation's support we can move forward with investments that would improve our stewardship both of this historic building and of the planet around us.

in the Balance: Life and Death Decisions in Light of the Jewish Tradition, and Who Renews Creation, a Jewish sourcebook on environmental ethics.

November 5

Jason Ripley - Anti-Judaism and the New Testament

This session explores the Jewish context and character of the early Jesus movement as a way of contextualizing the anti-Jewish rhetoric embedded within the New Testament. We will discuss Jesus' identity as a particular type of Jew who challenges other competing Jewish notions of the Kingdom of God in the face of Roman imperial rule. We will also examine several key New Testament passages that were later employed to justify hostility and murder of Jews across the centuries in order to sensitize us to the problems and to suggest possibilities for interpreting these passages today.

Jason Ripley is a scholar of the New Testament, specializing in the Gospel of John. He teaches courses on the Bible and biblical interpretation and regularly leads students on study-abroad programs. His publications center on empire-critical readings of the New Testament, engaging topics of religious violence, gender, and reinterpretation of the Hebrew Bible in early Judaism. He has taught at St. Olaf College since 2005 and has been attending St. John's Lutheran Church since 2020.

We are excited to welcome these scholars to share their insights with us as we embark on a year of exploring ways to move beyond this difficult legacy. Look for other opportunities to engage in further study throughout the year.
