



Saints and Sinners - all the time. Every. One.

Dear Friends in Christ

There's a game my family loves called "Wavelength." It's one of those exercises in trying to read your team members' minds. Each round, there is a card that offers a pair of apparent opposites: healthy food – junk food; or, common – rare. Then the players guess where on the spectrum a given clue belongs.

If most of the world were to play this game with the terms "sinner-saint", we might imagine the world's villains and heroes on opposite ends, with ourselves somewhere in the muddy middle, but hopefully toward the "saints" side. In the world of politics and media, we seem hell-bent (there's a phrase!) on categorizing everyone famous as either a hopeless sinner or a messianic saint.

But in Lutheran theology we all belong at the extremes, all the time. We are sinners – turned in on ourselves, incapable sometimes of even seeing our own failings. AND, we are saints, claimed body and soul as God's own, loved by the Creator every bit as much as Jesus, God's beloved Son. 100% sinners. 100% saints. All our lives long.

Some people find this theology frustrating. After all, we wonder, shouldn't the church help assess who the good people are? Shouldn't faith help us move across the dial in one direction?

But the longer I live, the more liberating this theology is to me. God isn't sitting on high, deciding whether to be on my team or someone else's based on our performance. God sees *all* my faults, and loves me still. God knows *all* my potential, and rejoices in every moment that I also give grace to others. I don't need to worry about "backsliding," or live in constant fear of future regrets. I'll be a sinner until I die, and then I will be welcomed as a sheep of God's own fold, not because of me, but because of Christ.

To know this is to live freely, and in the company of every other sinful saint and saintly sinner, because God loves all of us all along the spectrum of our lives, and beyond it too.

St. John's Forums this Fall: Exploring the Bible with Interfaith Sensitivity

Throughout the New Testament, the Jewish roots of Christian faith are obvious. Jesus was a Jew, worshiped as Jew, and proclaimed the good news to fellow Jews. In spite of, or perhaps because of, this very close relationship to Judaism, early attempts to define Christianity's distinctiveness hardened into a fierce anti-Judaism that has never disappeared from public life. As we launch a year-long study of the New Testament in its Jewish context, the Adult Ministry & Education Board invites you to join us for a series of forums exploring the roots of Christian anti-Judaism on October 1, 15, and November 5. All forums will be held at 9:45 a.m. in the Sanctuary between services. We are excited to welcome these scholars to share their insights with us as we embark on a year of exploring ways to move beyond this difficult legacy.

October 1

Dr. Deanna Thompson - Martin Luther's Anti-Judaism and Our Contemporary Response

In 1543, Martin Luther published "On the Jews and Their Lies," an anti-Jewish diatribe filled with hateful and violent language towards Jewish people. During this forum we will discuss the legacy of Luther's anti-Judaism and explore ways the ELCA has been working to repair Luther's legacy of harm against Jewish people, and what that work means for us as Lutheran Christians today.

Dr. Thompson is Director of the Lutheran Center for Faith, Values and Community. Her work at St. Olaf focuses on promoting interfaith dialogue both within and beyond St. Olaf. She is the author of five books, including *Crossing the Divide: Luther, Feminism, and the Cross* (Fortress, 2004) and a theological commentary on the biblical book of Deuteronomy for the Westminster John Knox Belief commentary series.

Earl Schwartz - "Who is like your people Israel, a singular nation?": Jewish "Chosenness" as a Source of Inspiration and Tension

Biblical history tells us something about when, where, and how Israel's distinctive identity as a people developed, but the extraordinary endurance of the Jewish descendants of those Israelites would also come to spawn questions about *why* it developed among these particular people. Themes of divine decree, ancestry, and an instructed way of life came to be associated with Jewish identity. What can we learn, as heirs of Abrahamic traditions, from the ways in which these themes have wended their way through this story?

Before his retirement, Earl Schwartz taught in the religion department of Hamline University and was the university's first director of its program in social justice studies. He has also served on the faculty of the Talmud Torah of St. Paul. He is the author of two books on Jewish moral education and co-author with Rabbi Barry Cytron of When Life is in the Balance: Life and Death Decisions in Light of the Jewish Tradition, and Who Renews Creation, a Jewish sourcebook on environmental ethics.

November 5

Jason Ripley - Anti-Judaism and the New Testament

This session explores the Jewish context and character of the early Jesus movement as a way of contextualizing the anti-Jewish rhetoric embedded within the New Testament. We will discuss Jesus' identity as a particular type of Jew who challenges other competing Jewish notions of the Kingdom of God in the face of Roman imperial rule. We will also examine several key New Testament passages that were later employed to justify hostility and murder of Jews across the centuries in order to sensitize us to the problems and to suggest possibilities for interpreting these passages today.

Jason Ripley is currently chair of the religion department at St. Olaf. A New Testament scholar specializing in the Gospel of John, he teaches courses on biblical interpretation and regularly leads students on study-abroad programs. His publications address topics of religious violence, gender, and reinterpretation of the Hebrew Bible in early Judaism. He has been attending St. John's Lutheran Church since 2020.

We are excited to welcome these scholars to share their insights with us as we embark on a year of exploring ways to move beyond this difficult legacy. Look for other opportunities to engage in further study throughout the year.



Plus, the Youth Room received new couches! Many thanks to the Foundation and other gifts that made this possible.








Pub Theology in October
