From Our Pastors...

Collaborative Confirmation

As fall approaches, our minds always turn to Confirmation. At St. John's, our Catechism and Confirmation classes have evolved out of a pattern of teaching that was agreed upon more than two decades ago by the three ELCA congregations in Northfield.

Back then, Bethel, St. Peter's, and St. John's decided that our ministries are helped by having similar patterns of teaching. This keeps us as parents and students from taking a consumer mentality to fulfilling our baptismal promises. Rather than asking "What's the easiest/ shortest/ most popular program?", we encourage members to take the long view. What kind of young people do we want to form? How can we pay attention to kids' developing minds and social needs rather than just "getting it done"? The churches agreed to try to avoid competition in our programs; but at that time, they did not intentionally collaborate.

All three churches have adopted similar approaches to teaching the Bible and the catechism over the course of many years; but as time has gone on our curricula have each evolved a little differently. Last year the staff of the three churches began meeting to discuss whether it is time to begin collaborating more intentionally. We all face the same social forces that pull families away from church life both on Sundays and during the week. All of us worry that confirmation is not accomplishing the kind of deep formation in faith that we hope for. And, across the church nationally, new models are springing up, many of them moving away from confirming at 14 or 15 years old toward a more opt-in approach to affirming your baptism at any point in young adulthood. Since we all face similar challenges, we agreed that it's time to move forward together as we adapt to a changing world.

We still don't know the final endpoint of these conversations, but for the 2019-2020 year our collaboration will include two Northfield-wide events and a "J-term" curriculum that will offer kids four weeks of classes with one another at the three different church sites. These J-Term classes will be taught largely by members, not staff, of the three congregations.

We will kick off the year September 18 at the Northfield High School Auditorium. That Wednesday we'll be led by Professor Rolf Jacobson, who will tell his own story of being cared for by the church during his health crisis in high school. We look forward to reminding our youth that their calling as Christians goes beyond the walls of their individual churches, and to building community with each other.

These tweaks in programming are just the beginning of what we hope will be a long move toward deeper collaboration with our fellow Lutherans. We will continue to ask the big questions about what best equips young people for living out their faith in this changing world, and how we can be the church together in that task. In a world where competition tends to be the primary model for group interaction, we are excited to see the church model something different, which better embodies the Gospel we proclaim.

Hearing Loop Update

On July 23, St. John's installed a hearing loop in our Sanctuary.

The downstairs pews - including the back row of chairs - enclose an area where members can tap into our sound system directly through their hearing aids.

This allows them to use their particular hearing aid prescriptions and also mitigate ambient noise as they listen to Scripture, prayers, and sermon.

If you have a hearing aid, you may need to have your T-coil activated by your audiologist to make the system work for you. Once the T-coil is on, the loop will work as soon as you enter the Sanctuary.

Need more help? An instruction and Q & A session is in the process of being scheduled.

This project was supported by individual donations and supplemented by funds from the Grace Overflowing Campaign.

It is not too late to help pay for the system. If we exceed the cost of the project in donations, additional funds will be set aside for eventually installing a loop in St. John's Hall as well.

The Library at St. John's From the Adult Ministry & Education Board By Genevieve Quarberg

Beginning in September and occurring now and then throughout the year, the Sunday morning Forums will be focusing on "Sustainability," meaning sustainability of our planet earth. Implicit in that word is the sense of "survival." But for decades we have had an evolving vocabulary about "nature", such as "stewardship of the earth", "ecology", "environmental crisis", or now "climate crisis" and there have been many voices trying to be heard. Some of those voices are heard in books in our library and can be read for background and support for the Forums.

H. Paul Santmire, a Lutheran theologian, wrote a book published in 1985, The Travail of Nature, about which he wrote, "This study is written with two sometimes overlapping groups of people in mind: first, environmentalists, students of ecology, humanists, and all others who are concerned about our attitudes toward the natural world; second, those who have self-consciously identified themselves with the Christian faith, and who are concerned to become better acquainted with the teachings of their own tradition concerning the meaning and value of the natural world." The chapter headings make it easy to focus on a particular time in classical Christian theology, keeping in mind the words from Psalm 24:1, "...the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof..."

But is isn't only theologians who focus on creation as a starting point. Madeleine L'Engle in And It Was Good - Reflections on Beginnings (1983) begins her wide-ranging view of creation with the experience of a storm on an ocean trip. She writes as one who seems to live through the Biblical stories of God's love and faithfulness toward his human creatures who experience many storms.

Annie Dillard in *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek* (1974) says, "This is the truth of the pervading intricacies of the world's detail: the creation is not a study, a roughed-in sketch; it is supremely, meticulously created, created abundantly, extravagantly, and in fine."


Wendell Berry's *Collected Poems*, 1957-1982, reveal his decision to renew his bond with the farm he grew up on, and his commitment to marriage and family as a sacrament. They are a joy to read.

Bill Holm says of Paul Gruchow, author of *Grass Roots - The Universe of Home*, "...he wants to needle us to trust nature, doubt power and look closer." His essays "...God us to think more clearly, feel more honestly and pay more attention to what we see around us."

In 1992, Tony Campolo says of his motivation in writing the book *How to Rescue the Earth - Without Worshipping Nature*, "My main reason for writing this book is that I want to add my voice to an increasing chorus which declares that rescuing the environment from an impending disaster is biblically mandated and that ending the careless selfish life-style that has brought us to this impending disaster is a Christian obligation."

There are many more books that look at some of the many ramifications of the concept of "sustainability." Check them out!


Pub Theology Reads a Book

On August 19th and 26th,
Pub Theology will be discussing the new
book by Rev. Lenny Duncan,
Dear Church: A Love Letter
from a Black Preacher to
the Whitest Denomination in the US.

In his book, Duncan tells his story of how he went from being incarcerated to being a black preacher in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA).

He also confronts the currents struggles the ELCA faces, such as shifting demographics and declining congregations, and he challenges the ELCA to consider how theology might be part of the problem and part of the answer. Provide supplies for Lutheran World Relief school kits and for TORCH college student gift bags.



Education is one of the strongest tools a community has for breaking the cycle of

poverty. Ensuring that girls attend school, especially in places where their access is deprioritized, has even stronger results. LWR School Kits contain essential supplies to help all children – and in some cases, adults – continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities.

Each year LWR spends nearly \$1.7 million to operate its Quilt and Kit Ministries. Those funds, combined with the generosity of quilters and kit-makers throughout the United States in 2018, enabled LWR to distribute \$13.4 million worth of Quilts and Kits to more than 601,144 people in 25 countries.

Same as last year, the St. John's Scout troop will assemble the school kits in September. We're grateful for their participation.

A collection box will be in the Commons August through - Labor Day

St. John's partnered with the TORCH program with a \$40,000 grant, through our 150th Grace Overflowing Anniversary.



This program helps TORCH high school graduates who are going on to college. These students are the first in their families to go on to college, and without this continued follow-up, they are often not able to make it through the first year. These gift bags are an added help and encouragement to them.

The Northfield TORCH program is a collaboration among members of the school district and community partners to address the issues of the achievement gap. Originally TORCH served Latino students, but because of our success, our programs are now available to all traditionally under-served students, including first-generation college students and low-income youth.

The Power of Nonviolence

Encouraging News: Attention to and action in the ways of using the power of nonviolence to promote the resolution of conflicts in the world reveal the power of such approaches.

If you wonder what positive signs there are for this, check out the presentation on the first day of each month at the Culture of Peace News Network (CPNN). Each month has a new topic and specific examples of success.

The July 1 issue focuses on efforts in Russia, Algeria, Kazakhstan, Czech Republic, and Serbia. At times there was violence against the protesters, but the protesters themselves were nonviolent which was especially important.

An earlier report in CPNN of the 1945 to 2000 study of Nonviolent Resistance in 101 democracies found that nonviolent resistance is more effective than violent resistance in both the long term and short term.
