Blessing Box at St. John's

St. John's Sunday school children are supporting a new mission at St. John's this year: "Blessing Box". It is similar to the Little Libraries found around town except the Blessing box is filled with donated non-perishable food and personal hygiene products. The idea is that anyone walking by who may be struggling can use the goods to make ends meet. The community is welcome to donate to the box being mindful of Minnesota's temperature changes. Donation Ideas (please check expiration dates): canned goods, pasta, flour, sugar, coffee, crackers, soap, mittens, toothbrush, baby items, such as diapers, pacifiers. The box is located in the drive-up on the north side of St. John's.

Dear Fellow Pilgrims,

The Bible often describes people of faith as travelers. The Hebrews, Joseph's descendants in Egypt, were themselves travelers from Canaan, transplanted by famine and then by family. You could say that Joseph's brothers were early beneficiaries of chain immigration. The word Hebrew is not an ethnic designation - it literally just means people who crossed over.

Rescued from slavery in Egypt, the Israelites wander a long time in the wilderness before they come into a land they call their own. The time of relative peace and stability was vanishingly short under David's reign, and then they are conquered or displaced again and again by conquering armies. The Babylonian exile is one of the most formative events of the Bible, the time when God's people learned anew that God is everywhere, not tied to one land.

Jesus himself is referred to as one who has no place to lay his head; the apostle Paul spent years on the road and crossing the sea to spread the Gospel. In the letter to the Hebrews, the early Christians are reminded of this identifier: "My father was a wandering Aramean.."

As much as various nations through history have tried to claim the cross as their own national symbol, the confession of the church has been that we are "catholic" – with which a small "c" means "universal", that is, not belonging to any one nationality. That is why our denomination is the Evangelical Lutheran Church *in* America. Not of America. As Christians, our faith always transcends our nationality.

Immigration has been both a life-giving reality and a matter of conflict for most of this country's history, and these times are no exception. St. John's has a long history of supporting refugees and migrants, recognizing that most of us are only a generation or two removed from immigration ourselves.

For this reason, St. John's Benevolence Board chose an additional Grace Overflowing project this summer. Your overwhelming generosity allows us to augment an effort already underway in Northfield – namely providing legal advice and aid to low-income immigrants through the Immigration Law Center of Minnesota (ILCM). This group already works in greater Minnesota to advise people of their rights and provide counsel for people who could not otherwise afford it. Our grant will allow ILCM to provide a quarter time staff person working here in Northfield, alongside the Volunteer Legal Network (VLN) which will also be expanding work in Rice County this fall. ILCM and VLN work so that people of all income levels have access to legal advice.

As we celebrate another Reformation Sunday this October, your witness to grace overflowing is evident, and reaching well beyond our church walls.

Stephen Ministry: Life Transitions Into Fall

Fall is upon us and with it comes a feast for the senses: trees clothed in brilliant shades of red, orange and yellow, pumpkin pie spice lattés, apple cider and doughnuts from the orchard, walking through piles of crunching leaves, and wearing a favorite cozy sweater. It also brings the anticipation and excitement of a new school year, making new friends, and new things to learn.

But Fall also signals the passage of time. The days grow shorter, the weather turns cooler, the trees shed their leaves and branches are soon bare. These changes alone can affect us physically, some even experience something called Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). But these seasonal changes can also remind us of changes in our lives. Empty Nest Syndrome can be felt in many stages. Kindergartners are no longer babes in arms, high schoolers are asserting their independence, and homes become suddenly quiet as the youngest goes off to college. Empty Nest and other losses such as losing health, getting a divorce and even retiring are similar in that they involve challenges to our sense of identity, and a loss of an important role in our lives.

Psychologists encourage us to be open to alternatives to meaningful aspects of our lives in one way or another when we lose them. Possible new roles and interests to explore are all around us. We might even find new ways to connect with others as we look through this publication of the Voice.

"We can be ready for a new phase in life and be sad about things changing. Through it all, what remains steady is the loving presence of God. And when we realize that God's constancy helps us change and adapt to the world, when we expand our understanding of who God is and who we are as God's people, then our fears and anxieties and loneliness need no longer dictate our lives. We can release them to God, trusting that through the tears and worries and doubts, God has always and will always be with us. For us. Loving us and on this journey with us." 




- Martin Luther, by Paul Meir with large illustrations by Greg Copeland, making vivid memorable events in Luther's life.

- Luther's Life by Ingeborg Stolee, a revision based on "Luther's Life by O. Nilsen. Includes the 95 Theses and The Augsburg Confession as appendices.
- Luther - The Reformer, The story of the man and his career, by James M. Kettelson. "Luther, a human being who lived in a particular place and at a particular time - yet "had a public career that transcended its own time."
- Martin Luther, a readable history by Harry Emerson Fosdick, a
 pastor in early 20th century who was an early pioneer in religious
 broadcasting.
- Luther - A Life, by John M. Todd, a more thorough treatment of the man, his time, theology, his life, his letters.
- Bach's Big Adventure, a book for children about a story Bach claimed was true for him as a child.
- Pulpit Under the Sky, by Joseph M. Shaw (a member of St. John's who has written several St. Olaf histories) is the story of Hans Nielsen Hauge (1771-1824). He was born in Norway, where he revitalized religious life by stressing living out one's faith in daily life. Many Norwegian immigrants to our country were influenced by him.

To gain a sense of Lutheranism in the last century in our country:

- The Story of The American Lutheran Church by Alvin N. Rogness, written in 1980 about a church that had its birth in 1960, and ended with the formation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America in 1988.
- The Story of America's Religions, by Hartzell Spence who says, "To a remarkable degree, the United States is the product of religious impact. In a very real sense, our social patterns are the result of religious beliefs and customs translated into democratic action." Written as a series of articles in Look magazine in the late '50s, it is a stark comparison to our time in 2018.

Northfielders for Justice in Palestine/ Israel presents "Palestinians: Past, Present and Future."



The conference will be held from 9:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 3, at St. John's.

Addressing the past through discussing the Nakba, or catastrophe, is Dr. Ibtesam Al Atiyat. Al Atiyat is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Anthropology at St. Olaf Col-

lege in Northfield. She is also a refugee of the 1948 Nakba, when Zionist forces expelled her mother from her native village in Palestine and into Jordan, where Al Atiyat was born and raised.

Jonathan Kuttab, a human rights lawyer in Israel-Palestine, will address the present Palestinian reality of apartheid. Kuttab will examine the legal definition of apartheid under international law and how it impacts Palestinians in the West Bank. Kuttab's family fled Palestine after the Six Day War in 1967.

Dalit Baum, director of the Economic Activism Program of the American Friends Service Committee, will speak to the future for Palestinians through the lens of BDS -- boycott, divestment and sanction. Baum is an Israeli Jew and IDF reservist who has publicly refused to be recalled for service.

Book Group Reads Account of Doctor and Mother in Tumultuous Palestine/Israel


A first-hand account of life by a doctor and mother during the

AN INTERVIEW WITH REV. DEBORAH LYANGA

My name is Deborah Lyanga. I was ordained as a pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania in 2005. I hold a master's degree in Missiology from Tumaini University Makumira. I have worked as a parish pastor as well as the Woman General Secretary in the Central Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania. I am married to Rev. Emmanuel Kaghondi, and we are blessed with two boys, Mercy and Abner.

YOU HAVE BEEN VERY INVOLVED IN PREACHING AND LEADING WORKSHOPS WHILE YOU'VE BEEN HERE IN MINNESOTA. WHAT DO YOU FIND MOST LIFE-GIVING ABOUT THESE EXPERIENCES?

First of all, I am so happy to be among the members of this synod. In every parish that I visited, I have been so welcomed and I feel at home. Pastors and congregants are so kind, I experience love and care. All of the people I visit are eager to learn things. I feel happy and honored to work among brothers and sisters in the synod. THE GLOBAL MISSION COMPANION SYNODS TABLE FOCUSES A LOT ON THE ACCOMPANIMENT MODEL. WHAT DOES ACCOMPANIMENT MEAN TO YOU?

I relate the accompaniment model with a couple who was from different families, situations, backgrounds, etc. but decided to live together as husband and wife or partners. What brings them together is the model of accompaniment. They have their differences but they are walking together, sharing their ideas, lifelong histories, and experiences which gives them a way forward to the present and to the future situation. Accompaniment for me is an act of sharing the stories and listening and growing together in strength, understanding and trust.

WHAT DO YOU MOST HOPE PEOPLE IN THE SOUTHEASTERN MN SYNOD WOULD COME TO KNOW ABOUT LIFE IN THE CENTRAL DIOCESE OF TANZANIA?

One of the things that I would like the people of Southeastern Minnesota Synod to experience in Tanzania is the community life. The basis for the 'Ubuntu African Philosophy' is a full recognition of our interdependence. It is the idea that we depend on each other...that we cannot be what we are without other people. So Ubuntu – or humanness – is to know, to understand and to value one another despite of our differences.

WHEN DID YOU BEGIN TO SENSE A CALL FROM GOD TO BECOME A CHURCH LEADER?

Actually my call was from outside, so it was very difficult for me to understand if it was God's choice or my parent's choice. I did not want to be a pastor and I had no peace about it, but I got a little light of my call after four months of joining the theological college. For some reason, I found peace in my heart on becoming a pastor. Every day now I continue to understand and believe in God's purpose in my call through people I serve.



Bread for the World Sunday is October 21

A Lectionary Study (excerpt) on Mark 10:35-45 by Rev. Amy Reumann, Director of Advocacy for the ELCA and a member of BFW Board of Directors:

The shortest sermon I know is only ten words. It was preached by my grandfather to a small country congregation on the story of the Good



Samaritan. He read the account of an outsider who demonstrates true neighbor love by stopping on the road to care for a bleeding and badly injured man. This Samaritan's compassion stands in stark contrast to religious types who passed by without offering aid. After reading the text, my grandfather mounted the

pulpit and said, "We all know what this means. Just go do it." Then he sat down, sermon over.

The simplicity of "just go do it" reminds us that sometimes all the words we use to describe and explain Jesus may get in the way of his core message. We really do know what he means. Love God by serving your neighbor.

It appears to be a hard lesson for James and John to learn. When the brothers sidle up to Jesus to put in a word for themselves as "Disciples of the Year," Jesus tells them they don't know what they are talking about. The brothers' request to sit in places of honor flies in the face of everything Jesus has been modeling and teaching about servant leadership.

In Jesus' kingdom, greatness is achieved by stopping to attend to the wounds of those around you and by addressing the hunger and hurts of our world. And when faith moves into action alongside those who are hungry or hurting, then we already are by Jesus' side.

Ending hunger requires charity and justice - binding the wounds of those who are hurt but also addressing those with power to lord it over others. The role of those who govern is to make sure the needs of all are met for the sake of the common good. Sometimes those who govern need a firm reminder of this responsibility. And if we do not remind them, then who will?

We can't afford the luxury of passing by or pretending a policy that would increase hunger has nothing to do with you or me. When bad policies will deepen poverty or make it harder to feed a family, we need to "just go do it" - by serving, yes, but also by speaking up and speaking out. When we do, we may find ourselves a bit closer to Jesus and his glory.
