

The congregation of St. John's continues to support the "Blessing Box", a mission that started in the fall of 2017. From Our Pastors

Dear people of St. John's,

At my ordination years ago, I was given a gift I didn't expect. Traditionally at ordination, a pastor receives a stole as a sign of their call to ordained ministry. I did receive a stole during the service, which was expected. What I didn't expect was that during the Passing of the Peace part of the service, as I greeted and offered peace to friends, family, and strangers, suddenly I turn around and someone was putting something over my head. Caught off guard, I finally realized what it was and who was giving it to me. Rev. Marvin Witte, who was a

90-year-old retired pastor and member of my home congregation, was putting around my neck a pectoral cross (a cross necklace worn over the chest that many pastors wear during worship). As he placed it around my neck, Marvin said, "This was mine during my ministry and now I want you to have it." I was quite moved and a bit stunned in that moment. I did not expect such a gift.

I've had that cross with me throughout my 14 years of ordained ministry, but I confess that I haven't worn it all that often – maybe a few times a year. But that has changed recently.

In his book *The Naked Now: Learning to See as the Mystics See*, Richard Rohr talks a lot about how Christianity offers us a "third way" of seeing (also known as the "third eye" in Eastern religions). So much of our society lives in a dualistic, or binary, way of seeing – us vs. them, liberal vs. conservative, pro-life vs. pro-choice, good vs. bad, etc. etc. This is living an "either/or" way of life. Rohr says, "It is hardly an exaggeration to say that (such thinking) is the foundation of almost all discontent and violence in the world."

Christianity (along with other religions!) offers us the wisdom of an alternative way though. A third way, which can bring unity, instead of division. This is living a "both/and" way of life. We see this in our faith tradition – Jesus was both human and divine, we are both sinner and saint, the cross is both great suffering and great love.

Through this, the cross – our central Christian symbol – has become for me a lens for how people of faith are called to look at the world and this life. The cross becomes quite literally the "third eye" we mark on our foreheads, trace across our bodies, or wear around our necks, through which we can see each other as both beloved and imperfect children of God. We are not separate from each other – we are one. We are not separate from God – we are one.

And so, I've started to wear a pectoral cross each Sunday now – as a reminder to myself (and you, perhaps) of this deeper truth.

When society wants us to see each other as this or that, to put each other in narrow boxes that cause more and more division between us, I pray that our faith in the God revealed to us in Jesus can be a *third eye* that gives us a new vision for each other, for God, and for the world.

St. John's Forum - Fall 2025 Courage, Conversion, Care: Responding Faithfully to Climate Change

As people of faith, what do we need to know and understand about climate change, and how are we called to respond? Underlying these questions is a more basic one: who are we, and what are we called to be? Join us this fall as we explore these questions in a series of forums on responding to climate change.

The series continues with Professors Kathy Shea drawing attention to the unique features of our own natural environment in Northfield while modeling habits of attention and care. Professors Kathryn Schifferdecker, Tim Eberhart, and Colleen Carpenter introduce us to biblical and theological resources for redefining our relationship and responsibility to the natural world and its creatures. Professor Jorgenson and her students, Addie Flesch and Paavo Rundman, bring the series to a close with reflections on our current situation: how, amid the anxiety of dealing with a rapidly changing environment, do we move forward with hope?

Other activities are also planned. On October 5, please join Professor Shea from 4:00-5:00 p.m. for a walk through the St. Olaf Natural Lands (details to follow in *E-Voice* and bulletins). And watch for further information on an online discussion of *Laudato Si'* (Praise be to You), Pope Francis's encyclical on care for Earth "our common home." This discussion, tentatively scheduled for October 16, 30, and November 13 from 4 to 5:30 p.m., is designed to complement Professor Carpenter's talk on November 16.



Online Giving Goes to New Platform

The Business Management Board has been working on streamlining our financial processes to save staff time and reduce human error. One big step taken this month was to move our online giving from the

previous Vanco platform to Pushpay, a software that is integrated with our CCB church management system. Using this platform will eliminate the need to double enter online gifts and will give us better data on our giving patterns.



For those of you who give periodically online or make payments for church activities through our website, you will not see any difference other than a new button on the church website. Members who have been enrolled in automatic online giving through Vanco will need to go to the church CCB system to move their giving into the new platform. The security and look of Pushpay is very similar to what you'll see in other online payments. The church staff are available to help if you want assistance navigating the new system.


Fall Book Read: Laudato Si' ("Praise Be to You")

Wildfires, floods, hurricanes, droughts: extreme weather events are becoming more common, and more deadly. Even as the scientific consensus points to climate change as the root cause of these disasters, our contentious and divided politics makes it difficult to discuss what is happening, and what we might be called to do about it.

Join us as we approach climate change from the perspective of our Christian faith:

- How are we called to care for the Earth?
- What insights does our faith contribute to the wider discussion of climate change?

We will be reading *Laudato Si*, the message Pope Francis wrote "to every person living on this planet," about how we can and should be



caring for our common home. We will be led in this discussion by Christine Engstrom, a member of St. John's, and Dr. Colleen Carpenter, who has taught theology at the University of St. Catherine (2006-2022) and environmental studies at Carleton College (2022-2024). Dr. Carpenter will also be speaking on *Laudato Si*' at the Adult Forum on November 16. A generous grant from the St. John's Foundation has made it possible for us to provide this opportunity for deeper understanding, for debate, for inspiration, for shared commitment, room for you.

We will be meeting online on Thursdays, October 16, 30, and November 13, from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m. Please sign up by contacting Chris Engstrom by text (507 403-3623) or email (revchristea@me.com). Chris will send participants a Zoom link and reading guide a few days before the first meeting.


Pub Theology in October
