Four different celebration committees are working to create special events for 2019. Composers are working on new works. Artists are creating logos. Sunday School planners are thinking about how to share our history with our kids. And your Church Council and staff have tried to keep track of it all even as we carry out the normal cycle of a year of worship, education, welcome, and service.

Sunday, January 13: We will welcome the St. Olaf Choir in worship and celebrate the historic and ongoing relationship between St. John's and the St. Olaf Choir with a special forum and reception between services.

Stephen Ministry: Season of Surprises

Lights to position, flights to book, weather to monitor, a guest room to prep. All of these require time and energy; many of them assume a hefty budget as well. And that doesn't include the once-a-year foods we set out and just-right gifts we wrap! These may seem to be the ingredients of the Christmas surprises anticipated by family and friends.

Whether we travel or host, such a season of surprises is also a season of expectations - the expectations others put on us and those we put on ourselves and our families. How can we manage expectations and surprises while keeping the focus on the gift of being together? Here are some tips:

- Establish priorities and make sure they are clear to everyone. Strive to balance excitement and calm, group activities, and personal space.
- Simplify whenever possible. Provide options (don't make demands) and allow plenty of free time (don't over-schedule).
 Focus on the basics of nourishment and rest for both guests and hosts.
- Let love shape an openness to all kinds of surprises weather that causes slowdowns, an unexpected beloved at the door, a favorite hymn sung by Christmas Eve's candlelight.

But there will be empty calendars and souls living lonely holidays. The heavenly peace that sounds soothing to the stressed may feel empty to them. Still, the season's sweetest surprise is for all - the infant God comes to a lonely place in a hostile world, not to a festive, meticulously prepared "divine" party.

Back to Confirmation:



The Library at St. John's From the Adult Ministry & Education Board By Genevieve Quarberg

From St. John's Library at the beginning of the church year...

Advent may continue to be a "waiting time" for those who have been changing the appearance of the library. The long cabinet containing children's books has been cut and placed back to back by the desk area. The shelves that were in that area have been repurposed over against the wall where the children's books were. This has been a large labor task!

We wanted to make the books more accessible and the room more open and available for more types of small groups, as well as a place for parents to be with restless little ones. To do that, we had to make major changes in shelving the books. That meant an initial cooperation between the Adult Ministry & Education Board and the Property & Grounds Board. It meant packing boxes and boxes of books. It meant a lot of moving and carpentry. It meant that the Library Committee and Bill Carlson, Gordon Mickelsen, and Char Carlson (plus other helpers) put in hours of labor to create what look like new shelves. And now it means unpacking and evaluating those boxes and boxes of books.

Thank you to all who have lived the connection of our sense of the *Church* being *the people* - who need a place to meet, hence the necessity of taking care of that place. The library is a part of that place, where all ages can find books that may meet a particular need or enjoyment. We will put Christmas books on the display shelves for you to enjoy during Advent.

If, when you read a book from the library, you come across a particularly short, concise passage that you think others might enjoy, make a note of that in the book when you return it. Perhaps we can create a place to display those wise words.

Books can be checked out for two weeks (make a note to yourself of the date). Please put last name and telephone number or email on the card and leave in basket on desk. Books can be returned through the slot in the desk.

St. John's 150th Anniversary Oral History Project from November 2018-December 2019

As part of the celebration of St. John's Lutheran Church 150th anniversary, the Evangelism & Communications Board will be conducting oral history interviews that will help to preserve the history of the Church and the experiences of our long-time members.

In some cases, the interviews may involve video. For example, if a church member has contributed visual art or has particular artifacts that need to be documented visually, the interview can help to document that visual art.

The oral interviews will be digitally archived at St. John's and in the Northfield History Collaborative archive. Excerpts from oral interviews will be available on the St. John's website beginning in Spring 2019. Excerpts will not be posted on the St. John's site unless the interviewee provides written permission for sharing of the interview.

The interviews will be conducted at the convenience of the interviewee. We anticipate that most of the interviews will take place on Sunday morning between services. An interview will likely be 20 to 30 minutes long.

The interview will not require preparation. Questions will be general, with a focus on the particular interests and experiences of the church member. Free Legal Clinic to Open in December

This summer, realizing that our capital campaign was exceeding our original goals, the Benevolence & Social Concerns Board selected a fifth project to support in the Northfield community. We had a proposal from the Immigration Law Center of Minnesota to provide regular legal aid in Northfield for low-income people needing legal advice in immigration matters.

Serendipitously, the Community Action Center was at the same time working with the Volunteer Legal Network to expand free legal aid in Rice County. These efforts came together as three congregations - St. John's, St. Dominic's, and Northfield United Methodist Church, committed to support a free legal clinic. St. John's grant from our Grace Overflowing Campaign will provide staffing from the Immigration Law Center, St. Dominic's is providing space, and NUMC will be the hub for volunteers to assist the clinic.

The clinic is opening one afternoon a month starting in December. On Thursday, December 11, there will be a service of blessing and public opening of the clinic bringing together the congregations and the agencies. All are invited! Join us **Thursday**, **December 11**, **at 1:00 p.m**. at St. Dominic's Church.



From Bread for the World

Recently the Trump administration released a proposed rule that could deny green cards (permanent residency) to legal immigrants



who have used, or might use, safety-net programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Medicaid. This new rule could also penalize low-income immigrants, families with more than two children, people who have health conditions and anyone over the age of 61 and under 18. If

this public charge rule is adopted, millions of immigrant families could be forced to make the impossible choice: use SNAP benefits to put food on the table and risk the chance of getting deported, or not accept help and suffer for lack of food or medical care.

The administration's rule could affect millions of legal residents in the U.S. - including children. Nearly one quarter of children in the U.S. have at least one immigrant parent and 9 in 10 of these children who would be most impacted are citizens. Immigrants are among those most in need of the programs targeted under the public charge rule as they experience hunger at twice the rate of other Americans. This would mean more immigrant families falling deeper into hunger.

The chilling effect is real. We are seeing more and more immigrant families afraid to use safety-net programs, even if eligible, for fear of deportation. Penalizing hardworking immigrant families and their children for using safety-net programs undermines our future workforce and weakens the economy.

Throughout scripture God calls us to act with hospitality for the stranger. Now more than ever we must stand with immigrant families who fear that despite their hard work they might still be deported just because they need a helping hand.

We can register opposition to the public charge rule by submitting a comment urging the Department of Homeland Security to withdraw this harmful rule. Go to https://protectingimmigrantfamilies.org. Scroll down and fill out the "submit a comment" form. Draft your comment or use the sample comments provided. Click "Submit Comment." (Your comment will automatically be submitted to the public register.) Using social media, urge others to act.
