From Our Pastors

Dear Friends in Christ.

It is that time of year again in the Davis Household. Just a few days after Thanksgiving, a beloved tradition begins - our kids start to argue over who gets to light the Advent Candles nearly every night at dinner time.

What is it about candles? During our Wednesday Vespers service for All Saints, we intended to have a moment during the short service where people could light candles in memory or honor of a saint in their life. But people just couldn't wait that long – some snuck up before the service to light one. During a community candle light service, it was planned to have a moment of lighting candles, but those who arrived ahead of time just couldn't wait. So, candles were lit early and just a stub of wax remained in their hand at the end. Candles have a way of bringing out the 8-year-old in all of us. People – young and old – just can't wait to light candles. Is it because it feels a little dangerous to play with that kind of fire? Is it because there is so much passivity in our culture that getting to do something – by your own hand – feels so good? Is it because there is such mystery in the flame itself that draws us in?

Throughout Christian tradition, candles have been used as a sign of God's presence, a sign of prayer, and a sign of hope. Modern day mystic, Cynthia Bourgeault, says that candles reveal the secret of our existence. She says, "In its outer, sensible form a candle is an object consisting of tallow and wick. But the real secret of the candle reveals itself only when the match is struck and the candle begins to burn. It gives of the materials of its outer form in order to release the heat and fragrance within. Only then do we see what a candle really is: its outer life is tallow and wick; its inner life is flame." The invisible becomes visible. This mirrors our human life, she says. Our outer life is flesh and blood and our inner life is spirit. Our purpose is to make the invisible visible - to spark a flame of aliveness within ourself and within each other and in doing so we become midwives of the Spirit, releasing the energy and beauty of our divine aliveness to the outer world.

Meister Eckhart, a 14th Century mystic, once said, "What good is it to me if Mary gave birth to the Son of God, and I do not also give birth to the Son of God in my time and in my culture?...God is always needing to be born."

The candles we light during the season of Advent represent hope, peace, joy, and love. As you light these candles in the coming weeks, as you light candles at home among family or friends, as you hold a candle and sing "Silent Night", may you see the inner secret and may you feel a deeper awe – that the light of God has come into the world and into our lives. May that promise give birth to hope, peace, joy, and love within you and to those around you.





ISAIAH MN is an interfaith organization working for economic, racial, and climate justice for all Minnesotans. We believe we are called by faith not only to personal acts of kindness, but also to help build a society and government that cares for all its people. ISAIAH MN




is working with similar organizations across the country to preserve and protect a strong democracy, so that we can continue building toward justice for all God's children and all the Earth.

On December 13, dozens of St. John's members will travel by bus to the Minneapolis Convention Center to gather with thousands of people from across Minnesota at "A Light in the Storm." Urban and rural residents, the young and the old will rally together. We will learn details about the specific legislation ISAIAH MN will promote, and how to help. Save the Date... Manna and Mercy Retreat with Rev. Alan Storey, April 24-25, 2026

South African pastor Alan Storey is returning to St. John's to lead a Manna and Mercy Retreat on Friday evening, April 24, through Saturday, April 25. Alan came to St. John's in the fall of 2016 to lead




this retreat, which had a lasting impact for many in our community. Alan is an ordained elder of the United Methodist Church of South Africa and is appointed to the Central Methodist Mission (CMM) in Cape Town.

His commitment to the peacemaking Jesus was tested early in life when he faced conscription into the apartheid regime's military. After spending a year of discernment working in Australia, he returned to South Africa, declaring

he would never fight in the apartheid army – or any army. He was arrested and faced trial with a six-year prison sentence as the likely outcome. Alan's trial was abandoned, and he became the last conscientious objector to be tried in apartheid South Africa.

The Bible is meant to be an instrument of God to enable abundant life for God's creation. Sadly, through the ages it has been read and interpreted in such a way that it has been used as an instrument of human domination and death—to cheer on the crusades, support slavery, advocate Apartheid, glorify genocide, sanction sexism, bless war and worship prosperity in the face of the poor, just to name just a few horrors of our human history. During the Manna and Mercy retreat, we will take a fresh look at scripture through the interpretive lens of Jesus' life, death and resurrection and God's overall call for each one of us to partner with God in mending this fractured world. The hope is that after we have done so, our interpretations and use of the scriptures will be truly liberating and life-enabling.

Using Daniel Erlander's book Manna and Mercy (a book we use for Confirmation here at St. John's), Alan Storey will take us on a journey



from Genesis to Revelation over the course of two days, with sensitivity to the contexts in which the scriptures were written and of our present day. We hope you will join us for this event!

Alan will be leading and speaking at other events in Northfield that week, which may interest you.
