Come into God's presence: the psalms focus our Lent, our life

Lent, our springtime period of renewal and focus on repentance and life in Christ, began on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 25, with worship and the Imposition of Ashes. Beginning Wednesday, Mar. 4, Our Lenten mid-week worship will center on the theme "Come into God's Presence: our psalms, our prayerbook." The psalms are the prayerbook of the Bible. They are virtually the only part of the Bible that is written from human perspective, from us to God. They voice our concerns, thanks, hopes, prayers, laments, and praise to God. We will focus on six categories of the psalms this Lent: penitential/confessional psalms (done on Ash Wednesday); psalms of lament; psalms of praise for the Creator/creation; psalms of thanksgiving-trust and confidence; psalms of Torah/ Wisdom (living in God's goodness), and psalms of



thanksgiving-general. Each week we'll talk about how each of these types aid our prayer and worship and draw us into God's presence. Mid-week worship is at 7:00 p.m. each Wednesday in Lent. We will return to using the Holden setting of Evening Prayer written by Marty Haugen this year. Soup Suppers will precede each midweek service at 5:30 p.m.

Who Is My Neighbor?

Most of the care receivers assigned to Stephen Ministers of St. John's are members of our congregation, but the scope of this ministry is much wider than that. During its 28 years in our midst, Stephen Ministry has always reached out to others in the community—to those who belong to no church; to those who belong to a church without a Stephen Ministry program; to those who prefer, for reasons of confidentiality, to seek help outside their own congregation.

At present six people outside our congregation are receiving the care of a St. John's Stephen Minister. They come to us through various means: they might request a visit with one of our pastors; they might become acquainted with a member of our congregation who suggests this ministry and helps make the connection; they might be referred to us by SM leaders at Emmaus Baptist Church, the only other congregation in Northfield with a Stephen Ministry program. The Stephen Ministers of the two churches have been actively collaborating for almost seventeen years.

Stephen Ministers receive fifty hours of training to develop the habits of mind and spirit that shape the distinctively Christian care they offer: they do their work in the name of Christ, and they trust Christ to provide the cure in his own way and time. Often their visits with care receivers include prayer or Scripture, but only if this is what the care receiver wants. The primary task of the Stephen Minister is to listen and support without judging.

The congregation's vision theme for this year is Extending God's Love. St. John's Stephen Ministry attempts to extend God's love to anyone who needs the help its care givers can offer—to those of weak faith, of strong faith, of no faith; to our neighbors within the congregation and to our neighbors without.

From our pastors . . .

Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."

A Report of the second

These words from Jesus form the whole basis for our reason to exist as a congregation, the whole basis for our call as individual disciples. We are given two commands by Jesus, to love as he loved (which he specifies in the two Great Commandments), and to make disciples, baptizing them and teaching them his commands (which are to love as he loved.) This provides all the mission and vision and focus any of us need as individuals or as a congregation to do God's work in this world.

I attended the two-part ELCA Head of Staff seminar held in Florida these past two Februarys. Each of the two years we learn a great deal about ministry and leadership. But a key focus in this year's curriculum was congregations and mission. One presenter said something really powerful. He said that congregations have no mission. God has a mission. Congregations are called to be a part of God's mission, not make our own.

I couldn't agree more. And Jesus' mission for us is so clear, as those verses show. Our vision plan at St. John's dovetails beautifully with Jesus' mission: we are to grow disciples – both growing ourselves as disciples and growing disciples in terms of reaching people with the Good News of Jesus – and we are to be signs of God's love here at St. John's and out in the world, in the community. Our councils and leadership over the past four years have done a marvelous job of articulating this call we hear from God.

What has been more difficult for us as a congregation has been living into this mission. In 2009 St. John's will pass its 140th anniversary of living as a congregation of God's people here. And one of the things that 140 year old congregations can tend to do is lack an urgency for doing God's mission. As long as we care for ourselves, and continue to do good ministry as we see it, we can sometimes rest on our laurels. By contrast, new congregations, those only a couple years old, tend to be filled with people who

are energized to hear God's call and move the congregation to be effectively doing God's mission.

In this St. John's is like many longestablished congregations. We, like many, were founded to serve a particular immigrant group and ensure they had a church. In St. John's case, the Norwegian settlers in the community. That was the mission, and we did it well. As we grew up alongside St. Olaf College, founded by the same people, another part of our mission was that partnership. Until the mid-1950s the students worshipped here on Sundays, and most faculty were members. It's been a vital part of St. John's life. But in the past couple decades things have changed. Our ties to St. Olaf, while valuable, are not as strong as they used to be. (For example, not all faculty are members, or Lutheran or even living in Northfield anymore.) The city has changed, society has changed drastically, and the needs of families, youth, senior citizens have also changed a great deal. And these all will continue to change.

For St. John's to be faithful as we continue our life as God's people here, it's important that we continue to listen to God's mission for us and ask the questions we need to ask about how we do that mission in a changing world. It's not enough for us to maintain what we have. Rather, we might want to ask God to fill us with a little of that fervor and excitement that brand-new congregations have. Because in many ways, that's our reality: we have a new call from God, in a world that is ever changing. And with God's help we can do our mission as faithfully as those who have gone before us did. Even if it looks radically different.

Your council will be talking about these things in the next months. I hope we all will pray for God's guidance as we consider God's mission here, that we might all do this faithfully together.

who is in the kitchen at a certain time. Second, concerning small amounts of dishes from a group: 1) Rinse and place in correct dishwasher racks on dirty side of dishwasher; 2) All large containers or trays are to be hand washed by the user. Third, the chairperson of each group using St. John's kitchen will fill out a check sheet for the group. Fourth, the outside exit near the dining room area is not for garbage.

The kitchen monitors have noticed many positive things concerning the use of St. John's kitchen, however, some issues still remain. There have been problems with general kitchen clean up, sanitation, proper use of equipment and returning equipment to its place. It is very important we rectify these issues as the kitchen is a commercial kitchen and held to specific standards. The Ministry Team would like people to read the signs for easier use of the kitchen. As a result the Kitchen Ministry Team wants the <u>kitchen users</u> to do a complete <u>check</u> before leaving the kitchen. They are offering workshops on correct techniques for a commercial dishwasher and proper use of other equipment once a month between services.

Currently we have need of volunteers willing to deep clean the kitchen and those willing to operate the dishwasher on a semi-regular basis. Please speak to Regina Hassanally, Director of Shared Ministries, if you are willing to serve in this way.

We look forward to continuing to work with you in maintaining our kitchen as a positive and user friendly place. If everyone at St. John's takes pride in our kitchen mission our ministry will be successful.

from the churchwide organization: Final draft of sexuality statement, recommendations released



From press releases dated Feb. 19, 2009: The 15-member Task Force for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Studies on Sexuality released Feb. 19 "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust" — a proposed social statement on human sexuality - and a "Report and Recommendation on Ministry Policies" for the professional leadership of the church. The 2009 ELCA Churchwide Assembly — the chief legislative body of the church — is expected to consider the social statement for adoption as an official statement and the report and recommendations as policy changes Aug. 17-23 in Minneapolis.

The statement, "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust" – The proposed statement addresses a spectrum of concerns relevant to human sexuality from a Lutheran perspective. It responds to the question: "How do we understand human sexuality within the context of Jesus' invitation to love God and love our neighbor?" If adopted by the assembly, the social statement will assist the ELCA in its moral deliberation, govern its institutional policies and guide the church's public advocacy work.

While the document does not offer once-and-for-all answers to contemporary questions about sexuality, it "seeks to tap the deep roots of Scripture and the Lutheran theological tradition" for Lutherans to discern what is "responsible and faithful action," according to the proposed statement. The document contains sections on key Lutheran

principles, trust and human sexuality, social structures that enhance trust, sexuality and trust in relationships, sexuality and social responsibility, and a series of resolutions to incorporate the statement into the mission and ministry of the ELCA. "Sexuality has to do with relationships, and God has made us relational beings," said the Rev. Rebecca S. Larson, executive director, ELCA Church in Society. "The underlying question of this social statement, therefore, is what makes right relationship. Our model is God's unfailingly, trustworthy relationship with people and creation. No human relationship can thrive without trust. The social statement therefore considers all human relationships and social structures in light of what fosters trust, commitment and protection for those who are vulnerable," she said. The call for trust is woven into the proposed statement's discourse about marriage, same-gender relationships, family and children, commitment in relationships, adult cohabitation, society, public ministry and more.

On the topic of marriage the document states that the historic Christian tradition and the Lutheran Confessions recognize marriage as a covenant between a woman and a man. In recent decades the church has begun to understand "in new ways" the need of same-gender couples who seek relationships of "lifelong companionship and commitment as well as public accountability and legal support for those commitments," said the statement.

The proposed statement acknowledges that "consensus does not exist" among ELCA members on how to "honor" committed same-sex relationships. The statement reflects differing conclusions on the basis of biblical and theological interpretation. Some members believe homosexuality is a sin in their understanding of biblical teaching and natural law, and some members believe homosexuality "reflects a broken world in which some relationships do not pattern themselves after the creation God intended."

Some Lutherans believe same-gender relationships are to be "honored and held to high standards and public accountability" but do not equate these relationships with marriage, and some believe that same-gender relationships are to be held to the same "rigorous standards, sexual ethics and status as heterosexual marriage," said the statement. Despite the varying viewpoints, the church encourages all people to live out their faith with "profound respect for the conscience-bound belief of the neighbor," said the proposed statement.

The document calls on congregations to be safe places for children and youth, and it calls for education on human sexuality for children and youth. "Degrees of physical intimacy should be carefully matched to degrees of growing affection and commitment," stated the document. For this reason, the document calls the church to oppose "non-monogamous, promiscuous or casual sexual relationships." The statement addresses the topic of the value of friendship, adult cohabitation, and Lutheran opposition of sexual exploitation within and outside the church. It also asks that justice for women in church and society continue to be an important dimension of Lutheran response.

"When approved, Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust will be the 10th social statement of the ELCA," said Larson. "All social statements are developed through at least a five-year process in a broadly participatory way. Human sexuality infuses all of life from the time we are born until the time we die. It is also social. Economics, business and advertising, social roles, medicine and science are all relevant to human sexuality

and the ways we act in relationship to others. How to use this gift in a way that honors God and serves the neighbor is a critical issue, particularly in this culture," Larson said.

A draft of the social statement was given to ELCA members in March 2008 for study, review and feedback. (Note: St. John's participated in this review in fall 2008.) "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust "reflects what the task force heard from this church in response to the draft social statement," said Larson. "Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust" completes a directive from the 2001 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to develop a social statement on human sexuality.

Report and Recommendations: The task force also released a "Report and Recommendation on Ministry Policies" to the 2009 Churchwide Assembly regarding the professional leadership of the church. This document completes a directive from the 2007 assembly to address and make recommendations on changes to policies that preclude Lutherans in committed, same-gender relationships from the ELCA's professional rosters. On the basis of study and "listening to this church," members of the task force developed a report and recommendation for the 2009 ELCA Churchwide Assembly — the church's chief legislative body — to consider as regards the church's current policy.

For Lutheran pastors and other professional leaders in the ELCA, the church requires that sexual intimacy "be within the context of marriage." The church understands marriage as between a man and a woman. Gay and lesbian Lutherans serve as ordained ministers in the ELCA but are expected to abstain from engaging in same-gender sexual intimacy. The report focuses on changing the policy that "ordained ministers who are homosexual in their selfunderstanding are expected to abstain from homosexual sexual relationships" — as stated in the ELCA's "Vision and Expectations" for ordained ministers. The same expectation is expressed in policies for professional lay leaders of the church.

The task force's report also highlights areas of disagreement and agreement among ELCA members regarding current policy. Some members of the ELCA support continuation of the policy, and some members advocate for change. Lutherans have asserted "their positions with varying degrees of certainty," the report said. The task force acknowledged that there is neither "a consensus — a general agreement — nor any emerging consensus" either within the ELCA or within other faith communities in North America, according to its report. The task force stated that ELCA members "must seek a common way to live and serve in the midst of disagreements."

"Through careful listening to this church and to one another other, task force members share a sober appreciation for the depth of disagreement on this matter. We also share a longing for church unity," said the Rev. Peter Strommen, Shepherd of the Lake Lutheran Church, Prior Lake, Minn., and task force chair. "Our hope is that a way can be found to live in the unity of the gospel amidst our differences."

The task force recommended that a process begin with the churchwide assembly, "declaring its intention about what it wants to do," according to the report. It proposed four steps to be taken consecutively. If the assembly agrees to the first, then the second, third and fourth would be considered only if the preceding steps have been approved.

The first step asks the assembly whether it is committed "to finding ways to allow congregations and synods that choose to do so to recognize, support, and hold publicly accountable lifelong, monogamous, same-gender relationships," said the report. The second step asks the assembly whether it is committed to finding a way for Lutherans in committed, same-gender relationships to serve as ELCA professional leaders — clergy, associates in ministry, diaconal ministers and deaconesses.

If steps one and two are accepted, step three asks the assembly to commit to implementing steps one and two "in such a way that all this church bear the burdens of the other, love the neighbor, and respect the bound conscience of any with whom they disagree." According to the report, "decisions about policy that serve only the interests of one or another group will not be acceptable." Step four presents a proposal for how the ELCA could move toward change "in a way that respects the bound conscience of all," said the report. The fourth step is different from the previous steps in that it is "not simply a commitment in principle, but makes a specific recommendation for flexibility within existing structures and practices of this church to allow for people in publicly accountable, lifelong, monogamous, same-gender relationships to be approved" for professional service in the ELCA, stated the report.

The task force's report and recommendation on ministry policies completes a directive from the 2007 ELCA Churchwide Assembly to address and make recommendations on changes to policies that preclude Lutherans in committed, samegender unions from the ELCA's professional rosters. The 2001 assembly directed the church to study homosexuality with reference to two topics — the blessing of same-sex unions and the "ordination, consecration and commissioning of people in committed, same sex unions." It also asked the church to develop a social statement on human sexuality.

Welcome Team News:

A new service team formed last Fall at St. John's, and many exciting changes are underway as we Extend God's Love to our guests at St. John's.

The first thing you may have noticed is that our Welcome Team greeters are now stationed at the two main West entrances to the church before the two Sunday services. Team members are there to open the doors and warmly welcome guests and members alike to church each Sunday morning.

In addition, some team members now regularly bake delicious chocolate chip cookies to give out as a welcome gift for our first time visitors. Those bags are located at the Welcome Center in the Commons with a gift tag that says "Thank you for visiting St. John's!" Feel free to hand these out when you meet a guest.

We've revamped the sign-in sheets to gather more helpful information for following up with our guests. And our team now makes follow-up phone calls the week after a visit to thank them for worshiping with us and answer any questions they may have about the church or community.

To assist us in warmly welcoming our guests, we encourage every member of St. John's to join us. Here are a few easy things everyone can do:

Look for people in church on Sunday morning who are looking lost or standing alone. This is a good sign that they are either guests or a new member. Introduce yourself and others who may have common interests or experiences.

Slide toward the center of the pews to make room for newcomers.

Pay attention to the orange Welcome Sheets as they are passed down your pew during worship. Seek out guests after the service to welcome them and learn more about them.

Assist guests with the hymnal or bulletin if they seem to have lost their place during worship.

Offer to walk visitors to the Welcome Center in the Commons so they can pick up a copy of our newsletter and brochures, and receive their welcome gift. (Or bring those items to them.)

We feel blessed to be a part of the wonderful community at St. John's, and know that you do too. Let's share this blessing with everyone who walks through our doors!

St. John's Kitchen is User Friendly

St John's kitchen monitors have been busy making the kitchen **user friendly**. During the last two months the group has cleaned, reorganized shelves, and added new labels to areas needing extra instructions. This Ministry Team is under the Adult Ministry and Education Board. The board approved of the monthly monitor system.

This is how the monitor system will work. Currently there are 14 monitors and each person will be in charge of one month. Four other people will be doing weekly checks on the kitchen. The monitors are not cleaning up after people. Instead: 1) they will check to see that things are in order for the next group to use the kitchen; 2) that equipment has been turned off properly; 3) that garbage has been taken care of correctly according to the check sheet; 4) they will check for upcoming groups if they need instructions for use of the kitchen. The monitors will also check to see if the **check sheet** has been completed for each group using the kitchen. Each monitor will report to the staff person in charge to contact the chairperson of the group that left the kitchen untidy, equipment improperly shut down, or failed to complete the check sheet.

There are a few new policies in place. First, any one wishing to use the kitchen has to check with Laurie Prior, office manager, before using the kitchen. The monitors and church staff need to know

"Extending God's Love To Special Needs Children In Ukraine"

From the Peace and Justice group . . .

Minnesota's Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC) held its 2009 Day on the Hill on February 3. Under the theme "Led by the Prophets," JRLC executive Director Brian Rusche presented morning briefings on key legislative issues to prepare the 850 citizen participants in the event for afternoon visits with their legislators urging all to join JRLC's prophetic leadership in bringing about justice and righteousness in Minnesota. Briefings can be found in full at www.JRLC.org. A condensed version is presented here.

- 1. Homelessness and Housing Three years ago on any given night about 10,000 Minnesotans were without a home. Continuing job loss and home foreclosures are increasing the need for state resources to prevent homelessness and provide housing stability. <u>IRLC Position</u>: (1) preserve current investments for homeless prevention, outreach, emergency shelters and transitional housing; (2) increase funding for existing permanent supportive housing; (3) increase the Housing Trust Fund for rent assistance for homeless adults, youth and families.
- 2. **Health Care** 374,000 Minnesotans, including 77,000 children have no health insurance. The Governor's budget proposes to cut about 113,000 more Minnesotans from health care coverage. The human dignity of every person demands recognition of health care as a right. Public health research tells us that overall health in a society improves when health disparities are narrowed. Having healthy neighbors improves everyone's health status and we all benefit from system-wide efficiencies. <u>IRLC Position</u>: Achieve universal coverage and guaranteed access to comprehensive and quality health care. The state has a primary role to make sure that health care is available to the poor and vulnerable. Denying insurance coverage to 113,000 Minnesotans is inhumane and costly.
- 3. Ending Poverty In 2004, 35 religious leaders in Minnesota signed *A Common Foundation: Shared Principles for Work on Overcoming Poverty*. The executive summary of the report of the Legislative Commission to End Poverty released in February states, the current economic crisis, while daunting, sharpens their resolve to end poverty in Minnesota by 2020. Minnesota's overall poverty rate is about 9.5% over 480,000 people including 170,000 children. As more of our neighbors fall into joblessness, bankruptcy, medical debt and homelessness we must ask the critical question, "Why does our economy fail so many?" <u>IRLC Position</u>: Support repairs of the wage floor and increase household income through tax credits and childcare assistance. Adopt benchmarks by which progress toward ending poverty can be measured.
- 4. **Budget and Taxes** —Minnesota should raise sufficient revenue to meet agreed-upon levels of public service, doing so fairly, based on ability to pay. Minnesota's budget crisis is due largely to an insufficiency of revenue. Minnesota's Price of Government (POG) index, maintained by Minnesota Management and Budget, shows that state-local revenues as a percent of income stood at about 16 percent in 2008. That's a full percentage point lower than the typical POG that prevailed through the 1990s, amounting to about \$4 billion of the projected shortfall for the next biennium. <u>JRLC Position</u>: (1) raise revenue to avoid painful cuts to health care, early childhood, and human service programs; (2) restoration of income tax rates, an income tax surcharge and expansion of sales tax base are all options.

St. John's is a member congregation of JRLC and is also related to JRLC through the Southeastern Minnesota Synod of the ELCA and its membership in the Minnesota Council of Churches.

March is Minnesota Food Share Month

This month St. John's joins other Minnesota congregations, synagogues, mosques, businesses, schools, and the media to help restock the food supplies of more than 300 food shelves across the state. St. John's supports hunger relief efforts around the world through ELCA World Hunger, but this month we focus our attention and efforts here in Northfield.

According to the Northfield Community
Action Center, an average of 1,103 people
living in Northfield, representing 385
households, received food at the CAC Food
Shelf each month in 2008. This is an increase
of 20% over 2007. Of those receiving food last
year in Northfield 42% were children. People
using the food shelf do not have enough
income to cover their basic needs. Prices for
food, transportation, housing, and health care
continue to climb and these increases, coupled
with the effects of higher unemployment, can
mean financial crises for people in our
community.

Food and cash donations are welcome at the Northfield CAC Food Shelf throughout the year, but especially this month as the community shows support during Minnesota Food Share month. (Cash donations are preferred due to discounted food to which food shelves have access. Every dollar donated helps the CAC purchase 4 pounds of food.)

The support we give to the CAC Food Shelf is one way to mark the season of Lent, as we seek to grow in discipleship, remembering the words Jesus spoke, "...I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink..." (Matthew 25:35) Menno Simmons, founder of the Mennonite Church, said, "True evangelical faith, cannot lie dormant, it clothes the naked, it feeds the hungry, it comforts the sorrowful, it shelters the destitute, it serves those that harm it, it binds up that which is wounded..." Support of the CAC Food Shelf is a way St. John's is extending God's love in Christ into the community.

Please use the special envelope in the giving envelope packet to support the CAC Food Shelf this month. St. John's Sunday School students are also participating in the Food Share month with a special offering challenge. Watch their progress downstairs. Mission Outreach

Mission Partner Team Update: The Mission Partner Team welcomed visitors from two of our partner congregations last month, El Milagro Lutheran Church in Minneapolis and El Salvador Lutheran Church in El Cocuy, Colombia.

On Feb. 5 three staff members from El Milagro, Pastor Judith Van Osdol, Warren Craft, and Jim Seller, met with members of St. John's staff and the Mission Partner Team. El Milagro is experiencing "an adventure in discipleship" as it seeks to make Christ known in South Minneapolis. Many people in the neighborhoods around El Milagro, including those who worship and serve at El Milagro are undocumented workers. This fact shapes El Milagro's ministry as it seeks to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. Undocumented workers are not eligible for social service programs which limit access to health care, education, job training, etc. Turnover in church membership is frequent as people search for jobs and affordable housing. El Milagro's mission is to serve this community that is marginalized and transient. Through worship and music and youth-led evangelism, El Milagro is seeking to be a healing community in Christ's name.

St. John's may not face the same challenges as El Milagro but St. John's is also called to be a healing community, to extend God's love in Christ's name for members of this congregation and the Northfield community who are marginalized in all sorts of ways. The group that met on Feb. 5 identified five potential areas of ministry that El Milagro and St. John's can share to help strengthen our common mission to be healing communities in Christ's name:

prayer, youth, music, human resources, and justice issues. A short term task force – made up of members from both El Milagro and St. John's – is being formed to plan two or three partner events for the coming year. If you are interested in being part of this conversation and planning contact one of the pastors or Jenny Pelletier, 664-9296.

On Saturday, Feb. 7 members of the Mission Partner Team welcomed Jorge Diaz, communication director for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Colombia, Pastor Natanael Lizarazo, pastor at First Lutheran in Sioux Falls and founder of LIZWAN, a non-profit that coordinates programs that provide hunger relief, and access to health care, housing, and education in Colombia, and Ildze Canfield, a staff member of SMSO Architects. All three guests are Colombian and shared with the team their reflections about the current political situation in that country as well updates on the church. Jorge and Pastor Lizarazo grew up in El Cocuy and were members of El Salvador Lutheran Church, St. John's new partner congregation. Jorge brought official greetings from the staff and people at El Salvador along with photographs of the area. St. John's will officially mark this new partnership with El Salvador later this spring. In the meantime watch for a display about our new partner in ministry in the Commons and on the web.

Council affirms partnership with lambi Lutheran Church, Tanzania

In January, St. John's Congregation Council affirmed a proposal from the Mission Partner Team that St. John's enter into a formal partnership with Iambi Lutheran Church in Iambi, Tanzania. The Southeastern Minnesota Synod has been a companion synod with the Central Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania since 1988. St. John's joins thirty three other congregations in the Synod who have a partner congregation in the Central Diocese. In December, the council affirmed a partner relationship with El Salvador Lutheran Church in El Cocuy, Colombia. The Southeastern Minnesota Synod has been a companion synod with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia since

1994. St. John's joins thirteen other synod congregations who have a partner congregation in Colombia. St. John's is the first congregation in the synod to have a partner congregation in both Tanzania and Colombia. The Mission Partner Team will nurture these relationships and provide updates to the congregations about the ministries of Iambi and El Salvador. A more formal recognition of these partnerships will take place in worship later this Spring.

March Food Share Campaign

This month, Northfield Community Action Center has its annual Minnesota Food Share Campaign. St. John's Sunday School classes will be participating in the drive to help benefit our local food shelf.

During March, we are asking for donations from St. John's kids in one of two ways:

With cash donations – The Community Action center has the ability to purchase food items at a much lower cost per pound than the average consumer can, so cash is preferred. For every \$2.00 donated by a class, a donation sheet will be posted on their classroom door. On Sunday, April 5, we will find out which class has the most cash donations. Donuts will be given to the class with the highest total and donut holes to the second highest! (March's Sunday School offering will be donated to this drive.)

With food items - Classes will have a donation box or they can be placed directly in the grocery cart that will be displayed by the bulleting boards across from the Nursery. Items most needed: cooking oil, peanut butter, canned fruit, canned meat, meal helpers, healthy snacks, dry milk pasta, spaghetti sauce, canned beans, dry pinto beans, and rice. 
