Each of us knows (or is) someone who has lost a job or home, watched savings slip away, or just become more sensitive to daily money issues than we used to be. Ripples of worry flow in every direction. Even if you haven't felt personally touched by the state of the economy, you still may be concerned about the global situation and feel the effects of that nagging concern psychologically.

What have you heard from family, friends, and neighbors? What do their words say about their needs? Where might you suggest that they go for direction? A member of our congregation who is a legal professional offers advice like this:

- · Look at your life realistically and try to keep your options open.
- · Fight denial; be clear about your own financial limits.
- · Choose trustworthy advisors to guide you through next steps.
- · Take on new uncertainties with a back-up plan or two.
- · Explore your networks; consider using online tools such as Facebook.
- · Understand and accept that change is a way of life.
- · Be willing to reinvent yourself—over and over.

The pressure of living with uncertainty may take a toll on you in many ways, at work and at home. But hope paired with stress can provide you with comfort and nurture your strength. From our pastors . . .

Be not afraid!

. . . and they said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid. Mark 16:8 This year we have been reading from Mark's Gospel account in our worship. And of all Mark's Gospel, his Easter story is perhaps the strangest. It's the shortest by far. Mark tells only of the initial encounter of the women at the empty tomb; he adds no further stories where people actually see Jesus. And his resurrection account ends with the verse listed beside this column – the women left the tomb and said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

Of course, we know from the other Gospel writers that the women didn't stay silent, even if they were initially afraid. But as we enter Holy Week and then the Easter season in this first part of April, I find myself wondering if we should pay attention to this verse a little more.

One of the things the conference I attended in February raised is that we are living in a new time of life for the Christian church on earth. In fact, our presenter argued that there are three major eras in the history of the Christian church, and that we have only recently entered into the third. The first is the apostolic age, the growth of the early church, and it ends at the early 4th century, when Constantine made Christianity the religion of the empire. From around 300 A.D. until 1960 we were living in the era often called Christendom, when Christianity was the dominant religious force in the Western cultures. This presenter says that era ended in 1960, and he chooses that date as the one when blue laws - those laws in the U.S. which prohibited certain commerce and activity on Sundays – began to be repealed. Since 1960 we've been living in a post-Christendom era and most of our congregations still live as if we are part of the dominant culture and always will be. (We see the shift in Northfield in the increasing difficulty to keep Wednesday evenings clear of school activities and many clubs and leagues having all-weekend tournaments for children and youth that last not only all Saturday but all day Sunday, among other signs.)

Your Congregation Council is reading a book to help us think about what all this

might mean for St. John's In this book, the author (who was our presenter in February) says that three things are key for congregations and how we do ministry in the post-Christendom era: 1. Lay people are the front-line ministers, not the clergy. 2. Church professionals (including clergy and directors of differing ministries) are there to train and support the ministry of the baptized people of God. 3. Ministry takes place in the world, not only in the building of the church, with a strong emphasis on ministry in daily life.

These are not new ideas, and many have been talking about these three realities in the past couple decades as people have realized that the situation is now different. What the council will be talking about is what it means for St. John's. And I referred to Mark's Gospel for a reason.

I think our biggest issue as a congregation is how we work together to tell the Good News of God's love. It's central to our vision plan we've lived in since 2005. It's key to our recent development of Shared Ministries. And it's absolutely essential to our future, that we look at how we might change our whole way of thinking about how ministry is done at St. John's into a place that is a training center, a fitness center for Christian believers in this community. We may not keep quiet because we're afraid, but we've not been the best at sharing the Good News. We've assumed people know it and either are involved or not for their own reasons. But there are huge numbers of folks who haven't been touched by God's love that raised Jesus from death and gives life to all. That should be more than enough incentive for us to put aside our fears and learn to be good-news-tellers, evangelists, in this new era in Christ's Church. God help us all to do this together!

The annual NEW gathering continues the relationship among the women of many congregations in the Northfield area that celebrates their diversity and the common bond that existed among them for over 55 years in Church Women United.

All St. John's women are invited to come share a common worship and learning experience. A continental breakfast will be served followed by a program featuring inspirational speaker Grace Lusher who for 12 years has been affiliated with the Stonecroft Christian Women's Clubs. Her title is "Rags to Riches." There will also be special music and the annual offering for the Fellowship of the Least Coin. The offering is sent to Church Women United to fund projects worldwide that help women and children. Come for good food and good company!

A plea and a thanks:

Churches with very busy kitchens and reception rooms, such as St. John's Hall and kitchen, often hire a staff person to coordinate all the kitchen activities. Churches without such a staff person rely on numerous volunteers to keep the many kitchen related events afloat! It takes an enormous amount of energy and very hard work to pull it all off! St. John's is so fortunate that Alice Nasby was willing to take on the huge responsibility of finding and working with several volunteers kitchen "monitors." This group is dedicated to keeping the kitchen in excellent working condition. They have already spent many hours cleaning and re-organizing the kitchen. It has never been in such great shape! Check lists have been made and instructions for using the kitchen equipment have been updated and posted in necessary locations.

Speaking as someone who has worked in the St. John's kitchen for over 20 years, I know from experience that people do not like to read instructions. However, since we are so blessed to have this beautiful new kitchen, I am asking (pleading) with all kitchen workers, whether new to the kitchen, or long-time workers, that you please read all signs and instructions found throughout the kitchen. This is extremely important for safety and for protecting St. John's very expensive equipment.

For many years, Alice Nasby taught home economics at the High School. She was dedicated to running a "tight ship" in order to teach her students the many aspects of working in a kitchen. Besides teaching them to cook, etc, they also learned the importance of keeping the kitchen sanitary, for all obvious reasons, as well as for keeping the state kitchen inspector from shutting down the classroom kitchen. Note: There have been many times in the past, if an inspector had come into the St. John's kitchen, it would have been shut down! Work spaces were not sanitized; the electric dishwasher was run incorrectly, clean silverware "handled" rather than left to air dry, etc.

There might be times when Alice or more of the monitors will suggest to us, that we use different or more sanitary methods in our kitchen work. I, as an occasional worker, plan to accept these suggestions graciously and I invite everyone to do the same. Many thanks, Alice Nasby, for taking on this important job. It is very much appreciated!

"Enough for all creation" Kathy Shea & Kristi Wermager report on Ecumenical Advocacy Days in DC

From the Peace and Justice group . . . Ecumenical Advocacy Days

Kathy Shea and Kristi Wermager represented the southeast Minnesota Synod at Ecumenical Advocacy Days in Washington D.C., March 13-16, 2009. This high impact weekend, is organized by the National Council of Churches and sponsored by the ecumenical Christian community. The goal is to strengthen the voice of people of faith who are working for global peace with justice. Our common beliefs were emphasized in ecumenical worship services each day, concluding with a Sunday evening service in Commemoration of the 800th anniversary of the founding of the Franciscan Order by Francis of Assisi. Plenary sessions and workshops provided training on the issues.

The theme of this 7th annual advocacy days meeting was Enough for All Creation. The specific focus of this meeting was climate change and how climate change contributes to poverty and forced migration. There were plenary sessions on the science, ethics, and impacts of global climate change as well as workshops focusing on different regions of the world, global economic justice, and security. We also had specific advocacy training on how to make the best use of a thirty-minute visit with our members of Congress or their staff.

Working with ELCA staff from the Washington D.C. and Chicago Offices we also addressed U.S. Policy towards Columbia with our members of Congress. The ELCA has taken an active role in Columbia to help people displaced by 50 years of internal conflicts. We brought our members of Congress information showing that humanitarian rather than military aid is more effective in promoting peace and justice in Columbia. This was reinforced by first hand experience from two Columbians who attended the congressional visits with us.

The weekend culminated with lobby visits on Capitol Hill on Monday. Visits to congressional offices were arranged ahead of time and most of the visits were with senior staff people in the offices of our representatives and senators. Specific bills on climate change are expected this year. We had the opportunity to suggest issues that should be in the bills and to begin a relationship to follow up on issues discussed. The take-home message for us is that these issues are not political issues, but moral issues. As people of faith we are called to care for all of creation through responsible and sustainable use of resources and the gifts we have been given.

Companion Synods Medical Team Forming

The Southeastern Minnesota Synod is forming a Companion Synods Medical team who will assess and respond to the needs and opportunities for support of the companion synod health programs in Colombia and Tanzania. Currently, the Central Diocese in Tanzania operates 13 rural dispensaries and one general hospital and has plans to expand six of the dispensaries to health centers and for the hospital to become a university teaching facility. seminary, he has also studied conducting and church music with Dr. Anton Armstrong, Dr. Christopher Aspaas and Dr. John Ferguson at St. Olaf College. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Organ from Mississippi College, and a Master of Music in Organ Performance from the University of Houston, Texas. He has served in several congregations throughout his time of education in Mississippi, Texas, and Minnesota. Mr. Fenn received superb recommendations from people such as Paul Westermeyer, professor of church music at Luther Seminary, and Dr. Anton Armstrong, St. Olaf College.

The search team held two days of interviews and auditions for two final candidates on Mar. 20 and 21. Both candidates were well-received. Mr. Fenn will begin at St. John's on June 1. Many thanks to all who participated in this important work over the past year, including the members of the music task force, the music search team, Personnel, Council, staff, and the many members who were invaluable at the auditions!

Of Community and Kindness

When my husband and I were contemplating our move back to Minnesota, we determined that it would be most important for us to settle in a place where we could seek out and build community; that is, relationships with others.

Community is vital to health for all. We need people with whom we can laugh and cry. We need those with whom we can share our hopes and dreams, fears and failures, and with whom we can rehearse the stories that have shaped who we are. We need people who will stimulate, challenge and stretch us with new ideas and understandings. We even need people we can trust who will help bring correctives to our lives and encourage us along the way.

Many of us have a cadre of relationships we can count on: family, colleagues, neighbors and friends. We may also participate in groups where we find community: groups centered in fellowship, learning, work, service, common interests, and support.

Some people don't have relationships they can depend upon. Some don't feel like they belong or have any sense of meaningful community, even when they are in the midst of a group...or a congregation... and may not have the confidence to risk taking the first steps in seeking out settings in which they can connect with others.

St. John's is blessed in having a variety of opportunities where people can build community and develop a sense of belonging. Recently, a small group which meets monthly to discuss a book they have been reading, had a rich and lively conversation about the importance of reaching out to others in kindness.

We practice kindness when we engage new and different faces in conversation following worship, during coffee, meals, and other gathering places, whether those take place in church, workplace, school or community. A kindness extended through a simple greeting or courtesy may be all that is needed to help someone gain a sense of belonging; it may also lead to an opportunity for helping that person connect with a group where community can be fostered. When that happens it becomes a touch of God's grace.

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St. John's has new Director of **Music Ministry**

On Tuesday, Mar. 24, the Congregation Council voted to offer the newly created position of Director of Music Ministry to Daniel J. Fenn, and the same week he accepted. This brings to a close a long and intensive process beginning over a year ago with a music task force assigned to make recommendations about the music staffing at St. John's. The recommendation to create a new position combining organist, senior choir director, music coordinator, and adding music director responsibilities was approved by Personnel Committee and the Council last fall. Over thirty applicants sought the position, and the music search team has been working on finding the right candidate from those applicants since November.

Mr. Fenn is currently a graduate student at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he will earn a Master of Sacred Music Degree in Choral conducting in May, 2009. In addition to theological and sacred music studies at the

On Sunday, Apr. 5, the Cathedral Choir of Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, will sing at St. John's both at the 10:45 a.m. service and in concert at 3:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. The Cathedral Choir is composed of 90 select singers, drawn from the college's sophomore class. Its membership reflects the wide range of academic disciplines on campus. Members are selected yearly by audition. Cathedral Choir participates actively in campus worship, in the annual Christmas at Luther concerts, and at several special events and concerts throughout the academic year. Cathedral Choir tours each spring in the Midwest. Their 2008-09 year culminates with a commencement weekend performance of Ein Deutsches Requiem by Johannes Brahms with Collegiate Chorale, Nordic Choir and the Luther College Symphony Orchestra. The Cathedral Choir is directed by Dr. Sandra Peter, Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College, where she directs Cathedral Choir and Aurora (100 first-year women) and teaches introductory and advanced choral conducting.
