When they affirm their baptism, these young people will renounce all evil, profess their faith in the Triune God, and commit themselves more fully

to participate in the life of the congregation and to live out their faith in the world. This rite follows a six-year education and reflection program at St. John's beginning with Catechism (CAT) classes in grades three, four, five, and six; weekday and Sunday classes in grades seven and eight; and Sunday classes, retreats, and a mentor relationship in grade nine. The program concluded with an all-day retreat with the pastors and Mike Sherman at Gustavus Adolphus College on Saturday, Sept. 26.

Those being confirmed and their parents and mentors will meet for a

The Grief Journey

Douglas Smith, a nationally recognized speaker and author, spoke at St. John's last month about different styles of grieving and different ways of healing. The journey experienced after the death of a loved one often leads to different destinations. Some may experience greater wholeness, and for others, perhaps greater brokenness. Many need to express feelings and seek support, while others are more likely to immerse themselves in activity. Smith also reminded us that yes, we need to grieve about yesterday, and all the opportunities that are past, and we do. However, there are some things we need to be doing today. We need to respond to the voices that are around us today. We must do our best in the words of Paul to "come before winter". We must open the door to the future in our lives.

There are things in our lives that will never be done unless they are done now. There are opportunities that only come once and then they are gone and there is no recapturing them. There are people who won't be here next spring and we don't always know who they are; a parent, a child, a spouse or partner, maybe a neighbor, a good friend, even someone at St.

John's. Each day there are voices calling to us saying, "Come before winter". And, according to Smith, tomorrow may be too late

People who grieve may turn for help to a grief counselor like Smith, or to a grief support group. They may also turn to a Stephen Minister. As we experience the loss of a loved one we may wonder just when we might expect to "get over" our grief. But do we really want to "get over" the memories, thoughts, uniqueness of the one we loved? Of course we don't. Through grieving, we meet daunting challenges, make critical choices, and reshape our lives. A Stephen Minister may be helpful in the process through actively listening and reinforcing the gifts which we possess. A caring relationship with a Stephen Minister reminds us that we are not as alone as we thought we were. For a year now we've been focusing our work and mission on the theme *Extending God's Love*, and it's been exciting to see boards and ministry teams engage this vision and mission. As you can read on the front page, this theme will continue into 2010, with the addition of the words of the ELCA churchwide organization's theme for the year, "God's work. Our hands." Those four words sum up very well how the real action of extending God's love happens in the world – through us.

The Congregation Council met in a mini-retreat on Aug. 25 after its regular council work and brainstormed some focus points for this year as we look to be the hands and feet and voices doing God's work of love in this place. They came up with three main areas: Fellowship and Learning, Outreach, and Service.

Fellowship and Learning is a key way for us to grow as disciples together, part of the greater vision of the congregation. We are together that we might deepen in faith and love toward God and toward the world and each other, and we do that in our worship together, in our conversations and work together, and in many ways. But times of fellowship and learning are also very important. This year a main focus will continue to be the growth of our small group ministry here at St. John's. Formerly called ChristCare, our small groups are just that – small groups of people gathered around prayer, Bible study, fellowship, and sometimes service. There will be an expo between services on Sunday, Oct. 4, to give information on the many small group opportunities available to experience. I hope many will come, and then find a group they can be a part of and so deepen their discipleship.

Outreach is also essential to our work as the hands of God here. Finding ways to bring the Good News of God's love for the world in Jesus to

others through our words and actions is a central part of Jesus' call to us.

There are many ways to work on outreach, and many are going on here already, including the ministry each member does when they invite someone to St. John's or bring them so they can know God's grace, too. For this year, the council has decided to focus on expanding and improving our hospitality ministries. This includes Second Wednesday meals and other additions to the Wednesday programming, the Sunday Night at St. John's worship services, and supporting the work of the new Welcome Ministry Team, who will help us be hospitable and welcoming on Sunday mornings.

The third area is *Service*, and this is literally the "our hands" part. We are living fully as disciples of Jesus when we are using the gifts God has given us to make a difference in the world, getting our hands dirty as we work for the good of God's kingdom. It's a call and a blessing that God has given us to do this. So we will continue to lift up our Shared Ministries program at St. John's, led by Regina Hassanally, and invite all members to discover their passion and gift for service. We can make an enormous difference in the world by using our hands to extend God's love, and that's what this focus is all about.

Sounds like a lot of things to do, doesn't it? But in all three areas there are many exciting things underway and many faithful people already working. How might you get involved? Where is your place in the mission of St. John's? I have no doubt that there is a place for each of us, and that God has given all of us, including you, gifts to grow as a disciple and become signs of God's love in the world and to each other. May God continue to make this vision a reality among us!

Understanding Memory Loss

"Understanding Memory Loss" will be the theme of the Faith and Health St. John's Forum on Sunday, Oct. 11. Gerise Thompson, Rochester Regional Center Director of the Minnesota/North Dakota Chapter of the National Alzheimer's Association, will be the presenter.

Many of us know or have a family member or friend living with the sadness and challenges of Alzheimer's disease or some other form of dementia.

Alzheimer's disease was named after Dr. Alois Alzheimer, a physician in Munich, Germany, whose observations and findings contributed to the research of the disease as we know it today. Dementia is the umbrella term for many brain diseases and disorders; Alzheimer's disease being the most common.

Gerise will help us understand the difference between various forms of dementia and normal aging. She will also explain the importance and advantages of getting an early thorough diagnosis and explain possible medications and other resources available.

As a follow up to the Oct. 11 presentation by Gerise Thompson, the St. John's Stephen Ministers are leading a discussion of Mary Gordon's short story, "Mrs. Cassidy's Last Year". The story is about an elderly man who is caring for his wife at home as her dementia worsens. Pr. Johnson used the story as part of a sermon a few months ago. The discussion will take place on Tuesday, Oct. 20 at 7 p.m. in the Fireside Room and all are welcome to attend. Copies of the short story are available in the church office.

I have never tasted manna from heaven but I have personally experienced the faithful provision of God time and again. Each time I do, for some reason, I am surprised and humbled. I am surprised that God could be so good, so faithful, meet my needs so perfectly. And I am humbled that God would lovingly do so over and over again.

There have been times in my life when God's provision was all I had. When I was a toddler with my parents finishing college degrees and temporarily joining the ranks of the "working poor," my mother opened our front door to a bag of groceries lovingly given by someone who had more than we did. When I was in seminary I knew the balance of my checking account to the penny because sometimes pennies were all there were and I never went without, never missed a bill, never knew real need. A significant theme in my life story is a testimony to God's faithful provision.

Unlike the Israelites I wasn't wandering in a desert and manna and quail have never appeared before me out of thin air. God has always been faithful to meet my needs but in ways different than the faithfulness shown in the book of Exodus. God's faithfulness in my life has more often than not been demonstrated through people. A person left groceries on my family's doorstep and that person exemplified the tangible faithfulness of God. A living person bequeathed a sum of money to my seminary that translated into a tuition scholarship that enabled earning an M.Div. for me.

In my life God has used the generosity of others to make tangible his faithfulness. There is the nagging question of those whom God seemingly does not provide for. Our brothers and sisters who know genuine need, who are without homes, shoes, clothing, or food. Jesus referred to them as "the least of these." His lessons regarding our treatment of those most in need can seem quite harsh. He casts away those of us who do nothing for our brothers and sisters in need and warmly invites into the kingdom those who served Christ in serving others.

It doesn't seem to make sense. Many of us proclaim and know for ourselves God's faithful provision, but we live in a community with those who know the depths of poverty and need. It is a nagging question indeed: how do we explain God's faithful provision to some and not to others?

I cannot help but wonder whether we are part of the answer in our refusal to respond to the needs of the "least of these." I have, in part, known God's faithfulness because people of God have made it tangibly so in my life. Perhaps others have needs because the people of God refuse to live in obedience to Christ's commands and meet the needs of those around us.

In the summer of 2004 before I left to work as a public health intern in the southern parts of India, my godmother gave me a written copy of this prayer of Mother Teresa. It profoundly affected the way I think about the "least of these" and I trust God will use it to transform your heart, mind, and spirit as well.

"Dearest Lord, may I see you today and every day in the person of your sick, and, whilst nursing them, minister unto you. Though you hide yourself behind the unattractive disguise of the irritable, the exacting, the unreasonable, may I still recognize you, and say: 'Jesus, my patient, how sweet it is to serve you.' Lord, give me this seeing faith, then my work will never be monotonous. I will ever find joy in humouring the fancies and gratifying the wishes of all poor sufferers. O beloved sick, how doubly dear you are to me, when you personify Christ; and what a privilege is mine to be allowed to tend you. Sweetest Lord, make me appreciative of the dignity of my high vocation, and its many responsibilities. Never permit me to disgrace it by giving way to coldness, unkindness, or impatience. And O God, while you are Jesus my patient, deign also to be to me a patient Jesus, bearing with my faults, looking only to my intention, which is to love and serve you in the person of each one of your sick. Lord, increase my faith, bless my efforts and work, now and for evermore, Amen"

From the Peace and Justice group . . . Reducing Justice?

Cuts in the State budget flash in newspaper headlines. The effects of these cuts are rarely analyzed or reported. How concerned should we be about the reductions? In the case of the courts and legal system we hear of crowded court calendars, diminished support staff for judges and attorneys. We can sense that justice will be much slower and may suffer in other ways.

Greg Colby, whose career has been in criminal defense since 1985, has a passion for his work. Since 1992 he has been a State Public Defender, the last 12 years being full time in this role. Currently he is the Managing Attorney for the Owatonna Office of MN State Public Defenders, Third Judicial District. He appears in five counties for this work.

On Oct. 12 he will speak on the adverse impact of state budget cuts on the justice system with special attention to juvenile

justice and child protection. For example, there has been a withdrawing from representing people charged with misdemeanors (traffic violations, DWI, domestic assault). The significance of this can be seen when, in the course of a trial, a simple misdemeanor may be changed to a gross misdemeanor with increased fines, increased jail time and implications for future employment and further consequences.

More dire results come when a gross misdemeanor is changed to a felony. Within the system, opportunities to work to correct the causes of crimes or criminal behavior are reduced.

He will bring more details about the changes and share his great concern for assuring that juveniles receive justice in the courts, with the hope of restoring them to useful lives in the community.

Bread for the World Sunday, Oct. 25

The St. John's Peace and Justice group invites the congregation to join with other Bread for the World (BFW) covenant congregations across the country on Sunday, Oct. 25, to amplify this collective Christian voice urging our nation's decision makers to end hunger at home and abroad.

Ed Payne, a longtime volunteer with the Midwest region of BFW, will speak at St. John's Forum on that Sunday. He will present the compelling rationale for **reform of U.S. foreign assistance**, the focus of the 2009 BFW Offering of Letters. He will remind us again of the urgency of reducing world poverty and hunger and of our opportunity and obligation to advocate with our representatives in government on behalf of the poor and the hungry. There will be time for letter writing during the forum hour.

Rev. Samuel Rodriguez, President of the National Hispanic Christian Leadership Conference, pens these words in support of the offering of letters: “The universal Christian symbol is the cross, a transcendent fixture that stands with both a vertical and a horizontal element. Let us pray that the 2009 Offering of Letters will fortify a cross with the complete message of our Lord, bringing Good News to the poor.”
