Living with Memory Loss

As our population ages, memory loss and the stresses that accompany it will increase for more and more of us and our caregivers. Some changes in mental functioning are normal and they parallel gradual changes in physical functioning as we get older. Other changes, however, are diseases, like Alzheimer's, which progress and eventually disable the patient mentally and physically.

What is normal memory loss that comes with aging? What are signs that the loss is more acute, that the family needs to consult with a physician? Last month, Gerise Thompson, Rochester Regional Center Director of the Minnesota/North Dakota Chapter of the National Alzheimer's Association, introduced the congregation to several forms of dementia, the most common of which is Alzheimer's. There is no cure for Alzheimer's, but early diagnosis and treatment can slow the progression of the disease. Ms. Thompson suggested the following as some of the warning signs of Alzheimer's disease:

- +Memory changes that disrupt daily life (forgetting, and not remembering later).
- +Challenges in planning or solving problems (unable to retrace steps).
- +Difficulty completing familiar tasks (putting frozen foods in the cupboard).
- +Confusion with time or place (wearing summer clothes in winter).
- +Withdrawal from work or social activities (no longer initiating conversations).

Help is available. The Alzheimer's Association works to advance research and offer support to those affected by the disease. Contact the association at 1.800.272.3900 or ALZ.com. Watch for information about a support group in the planning stages through the Faith and Health Board here at St. John's. Do you know someone who is dealing with or caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's or another form of dementia? November is a time for both
stewardship thinking for the coming
year, and for thanksgiving. And it's
probably no accident. Thanksgiving
and giving are inextricably tied.

What Paul says in these verses is very
helpful. Here Paul ties the thanksgiving
of the Corinthian Christians to their
giving to the offering he is raising.
Their generosity will "produce
thanksgiving to God" in those who
receive it, but the offering itself
"overflows with many thanksgivings to
God," therefore the offering itself is the
thanksgiving of the Corinthians. A few
verses later he helps them, and us,
recognize the "surpassing grace of
God" we've received, the
"indescribable gift," while encouraging
them, and us, to offer our thanks by
being God's gift to others.

Our theme for our work these past two
years at St. John's has been "Extending
God's love," and it has shaped our
thinking on all aspects of our ministry
together. This year we are adding
"God's work. Our hands." to the
theme, which is the theme of the
greater ELCA churchwide organization
for this year as well.

Extending God's love by doing God's
work with our own hands is all about
thanksgiving and giving. When we

recognize with joy what we have
received from God in abundance, the
only response we can make is "thank
you!"

And when we thankfully look at all
we've received, after we've said thank
you, Paul would suggest that the next
thing to do is offer these gifts to others.
To extend God's love in the world, to
do God's work with our hands.

The front page of this *Voice* has an
article from the Stewardship Board on
the emphasis this year. I hope that all
will read it carefully, take the pledge
card that is included in this *Voice*, and
prayerfully consider what thankful
response and promise each is able to
make.

We do this ministry together, and we
are richly blessed by God in that. As
we near Thanksgiving Day, let us also
open our hands to serve God with our
thanks. As Paul tells us, when we offer
thanksgiving to God by offering
ourselves back to serve God in the
world, there is actually a multiplication
of God's gifts and blessings on the
world and even back on to us. God
make it so with us as well. Come, let us
give thanks to the Lord!

A music curriculum for our young Sunday School children starts this fall

Each week, our pre Kindergarten through third grade students participate in a fifteen minute Sunday School "opening" time which includes music and an introduction to the day's lesson. Our children at St. John's do not have a regular music component to their Sunday School education apart from the songs sung at this opening unless they choose to participate in choir. It seems important, then, to give careful thought to the music we teach during this opening time, and how it might strengthen their understanding of God.

In August, following the recommendation of the Children's Ministry and Education board, Council approved a position to coordinate music programming for Sunday School. The St. John's Foundation grant will fund this position for the 2009-2010 school year as a test project. I was asked to take this role for the year. I'm excited to take it on, in addition to directing the Alleluia Choir.

My goal is to help bridge the Sunday School lessons with the music and liturgy that our kids experience in every day worship. In devising a

music curriculum, we can carefully plan diverse music that will make sense to our kids and hopefully inspire them as well, while having continuity throughout the coming years. Our parent/family volunteers have always been a blessing, and I hope that we'll continue to have our musical members at St. John's lend a hand whenever possible. Your participation and enthusiasm is appreciated!

Certainly, we all have thoughts about what hymns, songs, and liturgy our kids should be learning. Our history with the church, our culture, and our generations contribute to a rich and diverse repertoire. In this light, I'm always interested to hear what parents and any member of our congregation feels about music our little ones should learn. Please contact me with any questions or input you'd like to offer.

Congregational care - looking after each other

You may have read in the Sunday bulletin a few weeks ago about the possibility of a new Ministry Team focused on Congregational Care. The hope is to establish a team of people willing to be contacted to meet the practical needs of families in the congregation dealing with a long term medical issue. My goal is to have a lengthy list of people (30 or so) who would be willing to be “on-call” meaning when the need arises those on the list are willing to be asked to prepare a meal, rake leaves, shovel a sidewalk, or help in whatever way their time and talents align with the needs of the family.

There are a lot of different ways this team could take shape but the first step is assessing whether or not members of the congregation are willing to serve one and other in this way. The Faith and Health board is supportive of this endeavor and members of the congregation have voiced their desire to see such a team take shape. Two things need to happen before a team can be established. First I need to know if you are interested and willing to add your name to this “on-call” list. Second, I need a group of people who would be willing to serve as a rotating coordinator: as needs arise help coordinate the schedules of our “on-call” volunteers. This would ensure that the same person does not end up coordinating in every case, enabling every individual’s work load to be kept fairly light.

The first two Sundays of November there will be, as there was a few weeks ago, a slip in the bulletin for you to place your name and contact information on if you’re interested in serving others in this way. Please fill it out and place it in the offering plate, return it to the church office, or contact me directly via e-mail or phone.

A final thought about Congregational Care: it doesn’t always have to be formal. If you’re aware of a family in need, members of St. John’s or not, I encourage you to think of practical ways you can extend God’s love. At some point in our lives we all become the ones in need of someone else’s help. I have been that person and the practical ways in which my church body displayed Christ’s love to me in that season reminded me of the faithful love of God in a time when everything was uncertain.

I am speaking very practically on this matter: if your co-worker is moving this weekend perhaps you could stop by and carry a few boxes. If your neighbor’s leg is broken maybe you could rake the leaves. If you know the family sitting next to you on Sunday morning is in the midst of a medical crises look at them and ask “Can I bring you dinner tomorrow night?”

When my family was in the throes of a medical crisis lots of people said, “Call me if you need anything.” But the truth of the matter was I didn’t have the energy to pick up the phone. But the people who called me and said “Can I drop off dinner tonight?” were the people who helped me survive.

It is part of being the body of Christ, when one member is in need the rest of the members respond to restore that member, and the entire body, to wholeness and health. It is part of Shared Ministry at St. John’s, extending God’s love: Serving to Love, Loving to Serve.

*Extending God's Love:
a fast and celebration for
peace and justice*

For many years the Peace and Justice Group has observed Nov. 11 with a day of individual fasting and prayer. At 6:00 p.m. we gather in St. John's Hall for a service followed by a soup supper to break the fast.

This year we will celebrate on Monday, Nov. 9, our regular meeting date. All interested persons are invited to participate in any part of the day to reflect on the costs of war and the ways of peace, nonviolence and justice. Resources for reflection during the day are available on the Peace and Justice bulletin boards.

Our focus for this month continues the broad theme of justice in our programs.

We will reflect on the fast that the Lord requires—the responsibility to “Loose the fetters of injustice, untie the knots of the yoke... to set free those who have been crushed....to share our food with the hungry, to take the homeless poor into our house, to clothe the naked, and never evade a duty to our kinfolk.” (*Isaiah 58: 6-10*) This, the prophet tells us, is the justice God wants from us.

The age-old discipline of fasting directs us not only into inner renewal and reflective action, but also outward, focusing our energy and resources to meet human needs that have been ignored or denied. St. John's Forum: Global Issues in November

This month the St. John's Forum presentations will focus on three areas of global concern: climate change, war, and poverty.

On Nov. 1, Kathy Shea and Kristi Wermager will highlight issues discussed at the Ecumenical Advocacy Days meeting in Washington D.C. last March. The theme of the event was "Enough for all Creation" and the specific focus was on climate change. The presentation will outline scientific background on climate change, discuss ethical issues, give examples of people affected by climate change, and lift up ways that people of faith can care for creation through responsible and sustainable use of resources.

2009 is the 200th Anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth. On Nov. 8, Ed Santurri, professor of religion and philosophy at St. Olaf College, will speak about how religion and ethics shaped President Lincoln's leadership during the Civil War and how those ideas and concerns might have relevance for the time of war that we are living in. "The Religious Sensibility of Abraham Lincoln" is the title of Professor Santurri's presentation.

On Nov. 15, St. Olaf economists Tony Becker and Beckie Judge explore the causes of poverty across the globe with an emphasis on how economic and political systems contribute to both the problem and the solution. Together with those in attendance, Professors Becker and Judge will explore how others have responded to the call to love one's neighbor that compels us to consider each other's needs in light of our own actions and resources.
