## What Should We BE for Christmas?

Fall is the season of celebrations. At church we celebrate the Reformation, All Saints, Christ the King, and Advent. Fall also brings Halloween and Thanksgiving, along with preparations for Christmas and the New Year. Now that December has arrived, are you feeling a bit of holiday stress?

What helped you enjoy Thanksgiving and Halloween? Perhaps it was needing simply to *BE* something. What are we expected to *BE* for Thanksgiving? Thankful! Hungry, too, and perhaps organized. *BEING* for Thanksgiving is manageable. And for Halloween we can *BE* whatever we choose! To *BE* at Halloween is a creative opportunity, a time for imagination, surprises, and sweet treats.

But have you thought about what will you *BE* for Christmas, or only what you will *DO*? The *DOING* we associate with December may agitate us and overwhelm us, fill our calendars and empty our bank accounts. As you plan the days ahead and list what you must *DO*, ask first, What will I *BE* for Christmas this year? Try to think peaceful rather than busy, welcoming rather than anxious, thoughtful rather than extravagant, loving rather than dutiful. However, *BEING* also has its challenges. Managing expectations—the ones other people have for us and those we have for ourselves—can feel impossible to meet.

## From our pastors . . .

The Coming Liaht



The Benedictine monks of Christ in the Desert Monastery live in the Chama River valley in northern New Mexico. Every day members of the community wake up in the darkness of early morning for a silent prayer vigil. Worshipers gather in a chapel lit by two small candles and, when skies are clear, millions of stars whose distant light shines through four large windows above the simple altar. As the morning light breaks behind the ancient cliff walls the monks break their silence with the hymns of praise in the service called Lauds. Together they begin the day worshiping Christ, the light of the world.

Not many of us welcome the dawn with such exalted worship. Many days it's enough to fumble out of bed and try to make it to work on time. But in these shortened days of December we cannot help but see the growing darkness around us and we know the anticipation of waiting for lengthening daylight and the longer days ahead.

The Church marks the weeks of Advent by lighting candles not to tide

us over this season of long nights. Our need is greater and our hope is deeper. In this dark world and in the darkness of our lives we look forward to the promised One whose light will bring healing and new life to all creation. We light Advent candles to remember that "a light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it. (John 1:5) With Scripture's witness, the Church proclaims that Christ is the Light – the light that God sent into the world to scatter the darkness; the light that shines in and through the lives of God's people; and the light of the kingdom to come when all creation will be restored and redeemed in God's bright glory.

Faith is keeping vigil in the dark, waiting for the dawn to break. Faith is welcoming the rays of Light that are already breaking through - with songs of praise and thanksgiving. Faith is sharing these days of waiting and rejoicing together.

After we graduated, one of my friends from college moved to New York to work as a volunteer coordinator for a food shelf. Because I lived in Philadelphia at the time I would periodically take the train north to visit her. On one such visit, over Thanksgiving, I volunteered to help in the food shelf. They were so overwhelmed by donations I could barely walk through the stock room as I sorted through hundreds of cans of yams. While the surge in donations was appreciated many of the staff members wished aloud that people would give consistently throughout the year. They had plenty of food to hand out for the holidays but once Christmas was over the stock on the shelves dramatically decreased.

This pattern is not uncommon nor is it surprising. Giving and service are a part of the holidays. At no other time is there such an emphasis on helping to meet the needs of others. Then the holidays end and the emphasis fades but the needs remain the same. I'm not quite sure what happens to us as we sleep on Christmas night that causes us to forget the acts of service we deemed so important just a few hours before.

Perhaps it is simply that during the Advent and Christmas season opportunities for service seem to multiply and they fade from view as the decorations are put away and the twinkling lights begin to dim. I want to assure you: at St. John's the opportunities to give and to serve will continue. I hope this holiday season you'll reflect on not only how you can give and serve now but how you might capture part of the giving spirit of Christmas and carry it with you throughout the year.

## From the Benevolence and Social Concerns Board:

Late afternoon Nov. 17, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved S.1524, the Foreign Assistance Revitalization and Accountability Act of 2009. Fourteen senators supported it and three did not. This is a significant first step in reforming U.S. foreign assistance and a major milestone for our 2009 Offering of Letters. The changes that will result from S. 1524 will be of immense help to Dr. Rajiv Shah, the newly nominated administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development. In the House, our co-sponsors for H.R. 2139, the Initiating Foreign Assistance Reform Act of 2009, continue to increase. Growing support for these

two bills in Congress was instrumental in moving President Barack Obama's order for a presidential study directive to begin the process of developing a national strategy for our foreign aid. The bills also helped push the State Department to begin the first-ever Quadrennial Development and Diplomacy Review that is bringing together an all-ofgovernment approach to assess our foreign assistance delivery systems. As these bills continue to move forward, we will keep you posted. Without your financial support, your letters, your visits, and your phone calls, we would have never been able to win these significant milestones in our campaign to reform the way we deliver U.S. aid to the world's hungry and poor people. As Thanksgiving approaches, I give thanks to God for faithful supporters like you and for God's guidance as we continue to speak out for our hungry and poor neighbors.

#### From the Faith and Health Board

#### **Preventing Falls in Your Home**

Falls can happen at home for many different reasons. There are several things that are known to add to your risk of falling such as poor vision, poor nutrition, a history of falls, certain medications and certain conditions in the home. The Faith and Health Board would like to share with you some advice from the National Center for Patient Safety that will help lower your risk for falls at home.

**Lighting**: Replace burned out light bulbs, use a night light in your bathroom, hallway and bedroom, keep a flashlight available, make sure that lights are easy to turn on and off.

**Floors**: Remove scatter and throw rugs from your home, keep floors free from clutter, wipe up spills immediately, make sure your floors are not slippery, do not have extension cords where you walk. **In Your Bathroom**: Use a raised toilet seat and safety frame for ease in getting up from and sitting down on your toilet, set the water temperature at 120 degrees or lower, to prevent burns and falls from trying to avoid the hot water, place non-skid adhesive strips on the bottom of your tub, use liquid soap or soap-on-a-rope to help avoid dropping your soap.

**Other Locations**: Store items that you use often at waist level, select furniture with armrests for support as you are getting up and sitting down, keep your telephone within easy reach, if you experience dizziness and weakness, you should consult your doctor. You are at risk of a fall. Following these simple steps can help you "catch yourself", reducing the risk of falling and avoiding the serious consequences associated with falls.

News and Events

#### From the Peace and Justice group . . .

The Peace and Justice Group does not meet in December. As the beginning of the liturgical year, Advent brings many of the opportunities and challenges we associate with Jan. 1. We look back to review what has happened and where we are now. We look ahead to see what needs to be done, what we should and can do. High expectations permeate the month that leads us to the celebration of the birth of Christ. Groups make year-end assessments, as well.

During the past year the Peace and Justice Group has focused on a variety of topics, from very specific issues to broader areas of fundamental responsibilities: Special Needs Children in Ukraine, Human Rights in Colombia, Global Warming, Rationing Health Care in a Pandemic, Reforming U.S. Foreign Assistance, Justice in our Court System, Nonviolence and the Beloved Community, The Stewardship of Justice, advocacy through Bread for the World, and special legislative concerns. We hosted "Growing a Culture of Peace," the Northfield Community Celebration of the International Day of Peace, in September.

Diverse as these topics are, they share a strong message: God's gift of love is for all people, not just those who are most like us. God's peace is not just the absence of war, but also the presence of justice. Similarly, God's justice is not just fairness according to society's law and order. God's justice goes beyond requirements to obey the law. Its greater concern is with doing what is right in all relationships. It means living in relationships of love and caring where the basic needs of all are met through acts of justice. Again and again God commands us to remember the poor, the outcast, the downtrodden, those who are suffering in any way, those who are rejected and abused. Jesus exhorts those who ask what they should do to be saved, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength....AND love others as much as you love yourself." (Mark 12:29-31) Recognizing and maintaining the relationship we have with one another is the heart of the Beloved Community, and central to our covenant relationship with God.

During the coming year we will continue to explore how we can deepen our covenant relationship individually and as a group. Our topics will be determined by the needs we see and where we can do something to diminish violence and strengthen the beloved community, the community of God's love.

Please join us for whatever time you can and for any issue that you care about.

#### Light and Darkness

## St. John's Forum: Technology and the New Testament

This month in St. John's Forum St. Olaf Professor of Classical Languages Steve Reece explores technology and the New Testament in a three part series. About 2,000 years ago Mark, Luke, Paul and others put reed to papyrus and composed the works that eventually made up the New Testament. Now we have the New Testament in printed, audio, and electronic forms. How did we get from there to here? Steve Reece will show remains of the earliest manuscripts of these ancient works and trace the technology that resulted in the New Testament as we have it today.

All are welcome to the St. John's Forum on Dec. 6, 13, and 20 beginning at 9:45 a.m. in St. John's Hall.

## New Epiphany Large Group Bible Studies begin in January

Save the dates for new Bible study opportunities during Epiphany. On Thursday Jan. 7,14, and 21 Pastor Crippen will lead a large group Bible study on Jesus, the Light of the world, focusing primarily on the witness of John's Gospel, but also looking throughout the New Testament. On Thursday Jan. 28, Feb. 4 and 11, Pr. Keith Homstad will lead a large group Bible study entitled "Studies in Isaiah – Considering Almah and Immanuel." Pr. Homstad will lead a presentation on the the prophet known as "First Isaiah", looking at its context within the whole book of Isaiah, consider how the longest book in the Hebrew Scriptures fared when translated into the Greek Septuagint and how New Testament writers interpreted it as foreshadowing the Epiphany of Jesus Christ.
