St. Olaf pastoral intern to work at St. John's this summer

Andrew Willis, serving his internship at St. Olaf College this past year as he prepares for ordination, will be doing some pastoral work at St. John's this summer to broaden his experience beyond that which he could do at the college. Andy will likely preach a few times and lead worship, but will primarily be doing pastoral visitation to shut-ins in coordination with Pr. Quam, visiting in the hospital in coordination

with all the pastors, and possibly working with the children, youth and family ministry programs.

Andy will be introduced to the congregation at worship on a Sunday in June. Andy is a native of Plymouth, Minnesota, is a 2003 graduate of St. Olaf College with a degree in religion and English, and plans to graduate from Luther Seminary in St. Paul in 2011.

Gift Received for Needed Beautification

Sometime this summer, probably in July, the sanctuary and surrounding areas of St. John's building will receive a much-needed make-over. David and Susan Hagen are giving carpeting in the sanctuary, narthex, stairways (to balcony and basement), and sacristies in memory of Maurice and Ruth Hagen, David's parents. Maurice was in the

carpet business his whole working life, and especially loved doing church sanctuaries, which he felt should be beautiful in thanks and honor to God. He also worshipped at St. John's in the last few years of his life, and loved his time here. The Environment and Arts ministry team will help make the choice of carpet.

In addition, there will be a couple changes to the front of the sanctuary that several boards have been considering and which will best be done before the carpet project. The Properties and Grounds Board, with the approval of the Worship and Arts Board, will be exposing the hardwood from the front of the first pew to the bottom of the chancel steps (except the center aisle, which will be carpeted all

Stephen Ministry Training

Stephen Ministers are trained Christian care givers who provide care, in addition to the care that St. John's pastors provide, to those experiencing life's challenges.

St. John's Stephen Ministers will offer care giving training this fall. The training is open to those interested in being commissioned as Stephen Ministers and those who do not wish to be commissioned as a Stephen Minister but who would like to receive training in care giving skills. The training session includes fifty hours of class time learning and practicing skills in areas such as listening, assertiveness training, confidentiality, crisis theory, and use of scripture and prayer.

From our pastors . . .

*Change is
... good?
If Jesus is
there, yes.*

And remember, I
am with you
always, to the
end of the age.
Matthew 28:20



These words of Jesus are from Matthew's account of his ascension. Literally, Jesus' last words to us before returning to the Father, and before sending us the Holy Spirit. And I find them immensely comforting in many parts of life, but perhaps even more now. Because they suggest to me that even when things change, even when things seem moving too fast, even when we aren't ready for new things, Jesus is the constant. Jesus will be with us always, to the end of all things.

I've been thinking about this because of who won't be with us next year. And because of who hasn't been with us this past year. Hannah's been in England since September, and by the time many of you read this, she'll be home, thanks be to God. But it's been a long, long time apart from her for us. But then, just returned to us, she'll be off again to college for her senior year. And this is Martha's last summer with us before college. She will join her sister at Luther next fall.

Now, I understand that this is the way it is supposed to be. Our children are to grow, to become adults, mature, good people in the world. And to find their own paths. I just don't think we always have to like it. Mary and I and Rachel and Peter will have a much different family dynamic next fall. We will miss Martha, just as we missed Hannah. And in two years, Rachel will move on. It never seems to end, this change.

But "remember," Jesus says, "I will be with you always." That's our promise and our hope. Because life is constantly changing. People we love grow up and move out. People we love come to the end of their lives and are no longer with us as they were. People we love fall ill and everything changes. People we love lose jobs or find struggles. Life can be hard.

But as we begin this long Pentecost season, we have this promise from our risen Lord Jesus. It's funny, but Matthew tells us at the very beginning of his gospel that Jesus will be called Emmanuel, which means "God-with-us." And then never in the gospel is he ever called Emmanuel. You might wonder if Matthew made a mistake. But then, in this last verse of Matthew's gospel, Jesus at last becomes Emmanuel, God-with-us. Jesus' death and resurrection broke the power of death over us, and restored us to a relationship of love and grace with God. But by returning to the life of the Trinity and leaving us physically, Jesus didn't abandon us at all. He just got out of the way so that the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Godhead, could fill our hearts and minds. And so Jesus could keep this promise to be God-with-us. Always. To the end of the age.

And in a world where things change too fast, and endings come too quickly, and fathers find sadness in the midst of the joy of daughters leaving for college, this father is deeply grateful for this: If Jesus is always with me, then Jesus is always with those I love, no matter where we all are. And we are all therefore in the arms of the God who loves us, even if we can't see each other every day. And that makes all things good.

St. John's is a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, with nearly 5 million Lutherans across the United States and the Caribbean. There are 65 geographic synods within the ELCA, and St. John's is a part of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod. As baptized children of God in Christ, the congregation is also part of more than a billion Christians on earth. from the Southeastern Minnesota Synod:

The following is a summary of the 2010 Southeastern Minnesota Synod Assembly meeting on May 7-8. St. John's voting members were Pr. Crippen, Pr. Johnson, Katie Bull, Tim Eklund, Carrie Duba, and Mike Sylvoester.

The 2010 Southeastern Minnesota Synod Assembly gathered on May 7-8 to join together in the work of the church. As always, the assembly featured worship and Bible study. The assembly was also an opportunity to recognize the work of individuals, congregations, and organizations throughout the synod, our communities, and the larger church. A number of stories were shared about the exciting ministries going on throughout the synod. Young people being integrated into congregational life, congregations reaching out to

unchurched neighbors, groups supporting ministry and education for the blind and deaf, individuals reaching across oceans to brothers and sisters in other lands, and many more. The assembly ended with a consecration of individuals representing 37 congregations in their work to share the news of the ministry of the ELCA. These individuals have committed themselves to telling this story in their congregations and communities. Karleen Sherman will fulfill this role at St. John's.

Friday afternoon assembly participants had the opportunity to explore techniques for being more missional. After the workshops, assembly goers gathered for a buffet supper and panel discussion on the ELCA's LIFT (Living Into the Future Together) initiative which seeks to develop and recommend options for future ministry in the ELCA in light of its current mission and environment. Of course business issues also were attended to at the Synod Assembly. Seven resolutions were presented to the assembly. from the churchwide organization:

"We are not the sprinters...we are the long-distance runners." So begins the webpage for Lutheran Disaster Response. LDR, the combined efforts of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, rarely gets headlines because they never intended to be first responders. The American Red Cross and the Salvation Army have chosen that role. Rather LDR recognizes that recovery from disaster takes years, not days or weeks. Lutheran Disaster Response is modeled on the concept of long-term recovery and meeting the unmet needs of those affected. Despite the stories of terror and tragedy often heard on the news, our LDR

coordinators and volunteers bring great help to those who have suffered great loss. In turn, they meet disaster survivors filled with hope and perseverance.

The Lutheran Disaster Response Mission Statement reads: "To demonstrate Christ's compassion for people by promoting hope, healing, and wholeness for disaster survivors." A vital component of this holistic care is the spiritual and emotional well-being of those affected. There are many ways in which LDR offers Spiritual and Emotional Care to survivors of disaster, meeting them in their journey towards recovery.

the way to the steps). This will make it much easier to clean up spills from serving communion, and make the front of the sanctuary more acoustically pleasing for the music that is performed down in front. As part of this project, the pew in front of the pulpit will become a half-pew, like the one on the other side, and the second pew on the front side will become a three-quarters length pew, both to facilitate better movement of people and to make a couple more places for handicapped access.

St. John's is deeply grateful to the Hagen family for this generous gift, which will grace our worship life for years to come!

LDR provides training and resources for local congregations and communities to be prepared for disasters and to respond when they occur. Minnesotans have become more familiar with this ministry partner of the ELCA than we might like with the recurring flooding of the Red River Valley in the northern part of the state and the floods in 2007 that devastated parts of southeastern Minnesota.

Though undocumented by the larger organization, local congregations have been and will continue to be an impressive part of Lutheran Disaster Response in local, national, and international disasters by their support in prayer, money and personnel.

This spring has been a devastating one for many parts of the southeastern United States. On April 24, a powerful tornado touched down and traveled across five counties — over 100 miles — in central Mississippi. Then, as May began, torrential rains brought flash flooding to four states, including heavy flooding around Nashville, Tennessee. In

all, these storms have been blamed for more than two dozen deaths, and thousands of homes have been damaged or destroyed.

The ELCA, through Lutheran Disaster Response, has provided two \$10,000 emergency response grants for work in Mississippi and Tennessee. These grants, issued to Lutheran Episcopal Services in Mississippi, help to strengthen the work of staff with affiliate agencies there, some of whom were directly impacted themselves and many of whom have been already working tirelessly in the unfolding response. LDR will also seek to serve the long-term needs of individuals, families, and communities affected by these storms.

Shared Ministry

I'll be honest. I am not typically a huge fan of John Piper. This is most likely due to the fact that my first exposure to him was the exhaustive work he edited, along with Wayne Grudem, entitled *Recovering Biblical Manhood and Womanhood*. This book, which I think may be longer than the Bible itself, makes an argument against women having any leadership in ministry. You may agree with Piper, and that's fine, it just so happens that I don't.

Several years after my first encounter with Piper I was required to read his book *Let the Nations Be Glad!*, which details his theology of mission. I was pleasantly surprised.

One of the things I found most helpful is Piper's argument that all of Christian mission exists for the sake and glory of God and more specifically to make God's name known throughout the world. He supports this idea with thorough references to scripture. To join him in reflecting on the breadth of scripture addressing that single concept makes the entire book a worthwhile read.

It is because the work we do in Christian ministry is for the sake of the kingdom of God that our work in ministry is decidedly different than the other altruistic volunteer activities we participate in.

The amount we're asked to give of our time and finances can be a bit overwhelming. There are many worthy causes that rely on outside support. It is easy to clump ministry opportunities together with every other organization clamoring for our attention but they are different.

The goal of Christian ministry is to glorify God's name and to spread the good news. We are called by God to participate in the work of the church in the name of God because the glorification of God is our ultimate goal. This is simply my opinion: I think we are called first and foremost to further the work of the church and to participate in Christian ministry. I believe the ministry opportunities we have take priority over the other volunteer endeavors we are invited to participate in. This is because the goal of Christian ministry, to glorify God, is the most important.

Truthfully the things we do in ministry are very similar to the things we volunteer to do outside of ministry. So why does it matter? When we participate in ministry we do so as an extension of the body of Christ. Suddenly we aren't participating simply because it makes us feel good, it's the right thing to do, or we're required to give a certain number of volunteer hours. Rather when we engage in ministry it is a natural outpouring of God's love in us and the work we do is to glorify God's name.

Participating in the Adopt-A-Highway program as the member of the Bicycle Club is different than participating as a member of a Ministry Team from St. John's. The first furthers the name of the Bicycle Club; the second is a representation of God at work on earth.

The difference in activities may not seem significant but often the hoped for goals are eons apart. It is something worth considering as we decide where to spend our time and our talents

Challenge Committee: Survey

We have shared with you our charge approved by the Congregation Council. It is an aggressive timeline to gather a lot of information about the congregation, its programs, and its finances. We are working quickly to meet this obligation in preparation for a mid-year Congregational Meeting on Sunday, Jun. 27, 2010, 11:00 a.m., in St. John's Hall. At this meeting we will share what we have learned, a status report on current finances, and some initial recommendations to the congregation.

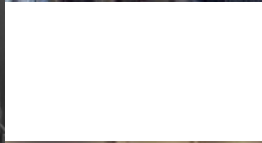
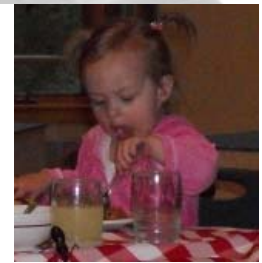

From the Peace and Justice group . . .

Strangers in Their Own Land, Strangers in a Strange Land

The Peace and
Justice Group does
not meet in June
or July.

During the month of June there are two dates that bring our attention to the suffering that millions endure as a result of violence in their lands.

Jun. 20 is United Nations (UN) World Refugee Day, a time to remember and recognize the more than 14 million people who are refugees. Many are refugees within their own country, others are displaced to neighboring countries or farther away to distant places. Obtaining the basics, food, shelter, and security, is the first priority. Finding medical help, social support for adapting to new environments, schooling for children, and employment for workers are further challenges to those who have been uprooted. The size of the problem requires support from governments and other large groups as well as the generosity and empathy of smaller organizations.

Jun. 26 is the UN International Day in Support of Victims of Torture, a reminder that human torture is not only unacceptable, it is also a crime. Since

1985, The Minnesota Center for Victims of Torture (CVT), with headquarters in Minneapolis and offices in St. Paul and Washington, D.C., has provided services directly to torture survivors in the U.S. and around the world. CVT also trains and provides support to the professionals who work with the refugees, conducts research on the effects of torture and on effective treatment, and advocates for public policy measures in Minnesota, the United States and worldwide. A private, nonprofit, nonpartisan organization, CVT also operates healing centers in Jordan, Sierra Leone, and the Democratic Republic of Congo, extending its work to put an end to the practice of torture.

Overcoming the destructiveness of torture is a long process, requiring support and understanding, and the skillful help of many trained personnel. The CVT has accomplished much in this difficult work.

This simple little song is based on Psalm 133, which is listed as one of the Psalms of Ascent, possibly sung by the Israelites as they made their annual pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Understanding that this psalm was written at a time when the people were widely dispersed, one might imagine the annual pilgrimage culminated in a great and joy-filled reunion.

This time of year is filled with reunion celebrations...of families, academic classes, and wedding anniversaries. We, too, are a dispersed people, and when we come together in reunion, joy and blessings follow...the blessings of belonging and connection.

There is a delightful story told by Jim Limburg in his book, *Psalms*. "The story is told about a Jewish man who never failed to attend synagogue services on Friday evenings. He often made the point, however, that he didn't really believe in God. And so it happened that one Friday evening when he returned from services, his children asked him, 'Dad, if you don't believe in God, why do you go to synagogue every Friday?' He answered, 'Garfinkel is my best friend. He goes to synagogue each week to visit with God. I go to visit with Garfinkel!'"

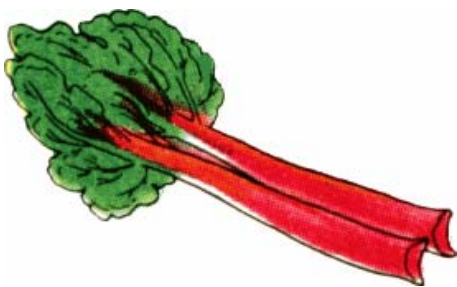
