A *compassionate* friend is present with you, traveling with you through hard times. He or she listens calmly and affirms you as you work through your decisions. A skilled friend accepts your feelings and acknowledges your struggles. He or she has patience to support you through a slow process of discovery and rebirth. A trustworthy friend knows you well and respects your privacy. He or she is always discreet and keeps information

From our pastors . . .

Prayer and Healing

"Is any among you suffering? Let him pray. Is any cheerful? Let him sing praise. Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord..." James 5:13-14

This spring a group of St. John's members began meeting to learn more about prayers for healing - specifically the practice of prayer described in the book of James that includes anointing with oil and the laying on of hands offered in Jesus' name.

While the central meaning of Christ's ministry is found in the cross and empty tomb, the healings that Jesus performs throughout his ministry are signs of how God is breaking into the world to free people from sin, evil, and all that afflicts humanity. The Christian practice of praying for those who are sick or suffering began when Jesus sent out disciples to heal in his name and with his authority.

Throughout the centuries the Church has prayed for healing in all kinds of situations trusting that healing is a gift from God and that whether a cure comes or not, God's promise to heal and to give wholeness is offered to every person. The Church affirms that God's healing comes in different ways. It comes through the work of doctors, nurses, counselors, and other health professionals. God's healing also comes when the Gospel is preached, when baptism and holy communion are celebrated, when the sins are confessed and forgiveness is offered and it comes when Christians gather for fellowship and for prayer.

At St. John's, prayers for healing are offered during Sunday worship, through the prayer chain; in small

groups, in hospitals, care facilities, and in homes; by Stephen Ministers, pastors and staff, and individual members. This fall there will be new opportunities for prayers of healing. The newly formed Healing Prayer Ministry Team, in partnership with the Worship and Arts Board and the Faith and Health Board, will offer prayers for healing along with the laying on of hands and anointing with oil once a month during communion on Sunday mornings and every Wednesday from 12:15 p.m. -12:45 p.m. in the small chapel that has been created on the second floor of the education wing.

St. John's member Dick Beckmen, a retired pastor, has written extensively on prayer and healing. In an article entitled "The Church as Healing Community" Beckmen writes, "The heart of the Gospel reveals the gift of forgiveness that is the center of the healing work of God for us in Christ. The Word and sacraments proclaim this forgiveness that signals reconciliation, restoration, and transformation for those who live in God's justifying grace. Martin Luther pointed to the broad implications of forgiveness when he stated that, "Where there is forgiveness of sins there is life and salvation." [from the meaning to the Sacrament of Holy *Communion in the Small Catechism] Prayers for healing are an extension of that* conviction into the physical, psychological, and relational life of people."

from and around the greater Church

St. John's is a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, with nearly 5 million Lutherans across the United States and the Caribbean. There are 65 geographic synods within the ELCA, and St. John's is a part of the Southeast-ern Minnesota Synod. As baptized children of God in Christ, the congregation is also part of more than a billion Christians on earth. On this page each month news from our synod, from the churchwide organization, and beyond will be shared.



from the churchwide organization:

My name is Karleen Sherman and I have been a disciple at St. John's for two years. My husband, Mike, is St. John's Youth Director. I am 24 years old, which puts me in a minority group when considering the age of most disciples in our congregation. My perspective on life and faith has been shaped by different experiences than many of you, but I think we have much to learn about each other as we work together to fulfill God's mission. I am writing this newsletter article because I have taken on the role of Mission Interpreter. What does this mean? It is my job to make sure that I inform the disciples of St. John's about the mission of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod and the greater churchwide ELCA organization.

On June 16 and 17, I attended an ELCA Glocal Mission Gathering along with Julie Brehmer (Director of Children's Ministries), Jane Rinehart and Gretchen Colby. We spent a day and a half learning more about the mission of the ELCA and how to help our congregations fulfill this mission. I attended a workshop session entitled "New and Renewing Congregations." It was led by Marlys Waldo, a deaconess who currently serves as the director for Support Networks within the ELCA.

There are many disciples at St. John's who have concerns about our current financial standings. My Glocal

experience cemented my belief that the solution to these concerns goes beyond budget cuts or simply asking for more money. I believe St. John's needs a renewal. I believe that many of you feel the same way, and that is why our church body voted to form the Challenge Team. In order to renew ourselves, we need to center on our relationships with both God and our neighbors. We need to keep our eyes on Jesus and stay open to Christ's presence and guidance in our own lives. We need to discern our purpose. What is your role to play in God's mission of reconciling people to God? Are you living out your baptism covenant?

We are called to a higher purpose than simply attending church. We need St. John's to be a welcoming place where people of all ages and backgrounds can come and join in our effort to be Jesus in the lives of others. Do you know the people sitting next to you in the pew on Sunday? Have you invited anyone to church lately or told them about how God has worked in your life? Have you asked the youth about their faith, or a young family about how God is working in their lives, or an elderly couple about what they have learned through their many experiences?

We are not called to be complacent. We are called to look *outside* of ourselves to determine the needs of our everchanging community. I hope to share more information about the mission of our synod and the greater churchwide organization during a Sunday forum. I hope to see you there.

I would like to end this article with a prayer in the form of a song we sang at the Glocal gathering, *Enviado soy de Dios (The Lord now sends us Forth).*

"The Lord now sends us forth with hands to serve and give, to make of all the earth a better place to live. The angels were not sent into our world of pain to do what we were meant to do in Jesus' name; that falls to you and me and all who are made free. Help us, O Lord, we pray, to do your will today." *ELW* no. 538

Mission Outreach

School Kit Donations

What does it mean to a child to own his/her very own school supplies? For children in Peru, it could mean the difference between receiving an education or not. Although public education is free in Peru, families are expected to provide the necessary school supplies for their children. If a family can't afford basic supplies, their children can't attend classes. Last year, Lutheran World Relief (LWR) sent 14,000 school kits to Peru, and 194,825 school kits to 17 countries. Alica, in Peru, said of the kit she received, "It's everything my mother could not buy me." "I have enough pencils for more than two years!" said Jorge.

Each year St. John's members send 60 - 90 school kits to LWR. You can help by purchasing items from the school supply list, sewing a bag, or contributing cash (make checks to Women of the ELCA and put in the offering plate or leave in the Church Office). You can find the fabric and patterns for the bags, and turn in purchased supplies at the school kit display in the Commons.

School Supply list:

- Spiral notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" x 10 1/2"
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- Six new, unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers
- One pencil sharpener
- One eraser approximately 2 1/2" long
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons

From the Faith and Health Board: Visiting your Doctor

Many of us have had the experience of coming back from an appointment and realizing we forgot to ask one key question, or perhaps still be wondering about something we were worried about before we went. Here are some ideas to try and make your doctor visits as usefull as possible.

1. Make a list. Most doctors like it, especially if it is brought out early. Lists can help us avoid forgetting a concern until the last minute. Seeing all the issues can help the doctor look for patterns.

2. Prioritize. List the problems in order. The doctor may have more concern about a certain topic than you do, but together, you can figure out how to use the time most productively.

3. Bring a list of all the medications, including over-the-counter. If that is difficult, just bring the bottles.

4. Ask questions. Don't be afraid to say, "I don't understand" or "could you explain that again?" It

is far better to get the answers face to face than to have to call back later.

5. Don't keep secrets. Let the doctor know about the article you read, or what your neighbor told you, or what you are lying in bed worrying about. Believe it or not, most doctors can't read your mind! If you say what you are most concerned about, the doctor can address it much more effectively.

6. Know the plan. Be sure to understand what to expect next. If you need tests, how should you schedule them? When is the next appointment? What kinds of symptoms should lead to a phone call?

7. Get it in writing. It is too easy to forget details, so written instructions are best.

Planning for an appointment is worth the effort. You'll be much more likely to get your questoins answered.

Lutheran Volunteer Corps (LVC) is a national volunteer service program for people who want to explore their spirituality while working for social justice. Volunteers serve for a period of one year and receive a monthly stipend to cover living expenses. Volunteers live with other several other volunteers, and practice sustainability in all aspects of their lives.

Placements include schools, environmental organizations, shelters, programs for women and youth, medical and legal

clinics, refugee services, public policy organizations, community organizers, senior service providers, food banks, and general social services.

LVC was founded in 1979 by Luther Place Memorial Church (Washington, DC). Since its beginning, Lutheran Volunteer Corps has matched over 1,800 volunteers with social service organizations in sixteen cities across the country.

From the Peace and Justice group . . .

In August, sunflowers brighten local gardens and spread their gold on fields in many parts of our state. Their beauty includes a striking design of green around the petals, all supported by a sturdy, fuzzy stem. Beautiful now, and through this month, they will ripen into sources of seeds enjoyed by birds and people, plus being ingredients we are not aware of in products we use or consume.

In addition to its beauty, the sunflower has become an international symbol of peace. Following the development of the atomic bomb in 1945 and other nuclear weapons in the years that followed, the United States and the USSR controlled the development and production of nuclear arsenals with unimaginable destructive power. The atmosphere of threats and fears continued until, through many efforts to diminish the toxic weapons race, the two nations agreed to destroy a portion of the arsenals.

When Ukraine disassembled its nuclear missiles in 1995, sunflower seeds were planted by Ukrainian and U.S. generals in the missile silos. We are told that the sunflower is popular there for its beauty, its products, and as a symbol of peace, much like the lily is in our culture. So the sunflowers in the silos were a symbol of beauty and peace replacing a destructive device. Since then the sunflower has been adopted as a symbol of Abolition 2000, the global movement for nuclear disarmament.

Sunflowers have become a popular flower in bouquets and flower arrangements in recent years. They are used on many products. Cheerful and upbeat!

When you see sunflowers, remember their role in a significant step for peace.

On Aug. 6, 1945, the USA exploded an atomic bomb consequent fatal effects of the blast, we have on Hiroshima, Japan. On Aug. 9 a second bomb was the story of the origami cranes that are now a dropped on Nagasaki. Both events caused an extraordinary number of deaths and extraordinary suffering that continues to this day in civilian survivors. Not all consequences of the blasts were anticipated or known.

In September 2006 many Northfielders heard the urgent message of peace from four Hibakusha, survivors of the Hiroshima blast. Through the experience of Sakako, the young girl who suffered
