Times of Waiting

Advent is a time of waiting, a time when we prepare ourselves, our homes, and our cookie jars for the celebration of Jesus' birth. This time of waiting is mostly an anticipation—a good four weeks of planning, wishing, and preparing. We know what is ahead, whether our "peace of earth" will be quiet or raucous. We also know the end of The Story of Advent—the surprising little One, waited for as God and Savior. Even when this waiting time's shopping, baking, and decorating loom, they still carry a joyful anticipation. Even when a pregnancy feels too long and uncomfortable, the wait is good because it promises life.

But there are other kinds of waiting, the kinds that carry weight. Those waitings bring with them a dread, the better-than-

50%-chance that news will not be good and any scant reason for hope will disappear. Consider the wait for medical test results or a response to school applications; the wait for a decision from the bank or a potential employer; the wait for a phone call, an invitation, or a forgiving hug. Those waits can leave one lost and empty. Those weighty waits can make the future impossible to imagine, let alone live. Often the worst of those weighty waits is that they are faced alone.

Stephen Ministers, like those being trained right now at St. John's, are prepared to share weighty waits. A Stephen Minister's support offers the patience that can make waiting bearable. They honor the process of waiting, and appreciate the value of each step along any journey. They embrace the waiting and find hope in enduring because God is present. A Stephen Minister acts as a concrete reminder of God's presence, quietly helping to carry the weight of another.

Last Sunday the first candle on the Advent wreath was lit. I remember watching, with great anticipation, that first candle being lit, growing up in my home congregation. We had two great wreaths – one above the pulpit, and one above the lectern. And we all knew what was coming when we got past the fourth candle – but the waiting was so very hard. It seemed to take forever to get to candle number two. I also remember being told that Advent was a time of preparation: getting ready to receive the Good News of Christmas (of course, I was waiting for the gifts, too). But, at least, the preparations – decorating, and listening to stories - made the waiting more tolerable.

The interim period is somewhat of an Advent experience. It is a time of waiting, to be sure; but it is a time of much preparation. There are five basic tasks to be accomplished in intentional interim ministry. They are: 1) Coming to terms with history; 2) Discovering a new identity; 3) Enabling needed leadership change; 4) Renewing denominational linkages; 5) Commitment to new pastoral leadership and a new future.

St. John's is off to a great start due to the work of the Challenge Team. The Strategic Planning event has jump-started the effort to review our history, and begin to reflect on a new identity. But now comes a time of some waiting, as we seek the input of every member. These tasks are crucial, though, as move into the future; and contemplate the business of calling the next senior pastor. It is essential that we are clear about who we are, as a congregation. That will drive how we want to operate; and help to guide our decisions about how to make all of it happen. When our identity and mission and vision have been clearly established, the type of individual needed to lead St. John's, pastorally, will come into focus.

The "first candle" in the interim process has barely been lit. Oh, it is so very hard to wait for number two, let alone numbers three and four; because we all know about the good news to come. And come it will – but for now we wait...and we prepare.

Water Flows at lambi Lutheran Secondary School

In 2007, St. John's began a project to improve the water supply at Iambi Lutheran Secondary School in Tanzania, a residential school with about 150 students. What we thought would be a simple project became quite complicated. However, with the help of Outreach International, a non profit group in Iowa that does community projects in the Singida region where Iambi is located, a solution was found. After 3 years, the project is completed.

The initial phase of the project was to improve the well at the school. It was a short bore hole well, and the pipe did not extend deep enough into the water. A pipe extension and a chlorination system were installed. Phase two was to raise funds for a solar powered pump and water tank so that a water supply could be stored in a 5,000 liter tank. In July 2008, St. John's held a fund raiser and raised over \$3000. However, during the dry season, before the solar pump was purchased, the well with the new extensions went dry. It didn't make sense to invest thousands of dollars to improve a well that was dry for large portions of the year. Another complication was that a solar powered pump was stolen from a neighboring village, suggesting that a solar system would be

high risk. After inspecting several other potential water sources, Floyd Hammer, the director of Outreach International, and Mike Kitwaka, his Tanzanian manager, came up with a new plan.

The new plan was to use a deep bore hole located in the countryside a mile from the school. This bore hole well was not in use. It looked like a large pipe coming out of the ground with a cap on it. The cost to develop this well was expected to be about \$5000 more than had been raised in the July 2008 fundraiser. The St. John's Benevolence Board decided to use Stewards of Grace funds to meet this new expense. Floyd Hammer and Allan Kingu, the school headmaster, met with the Iambi village council. They gave Iambi School title to 4 acres of land at the bore hole so that a house could be built for a farmer to live and farm there and guard the new equipment. This past summer a Grundfos pump and generator were shipped. They are diesel, rather than solar powered. The house was built. One mile of pipe was delivered, and the students and villagers dug the mile long trench to lay the pipe. As might be expected with

A few years ago a friend of ours was involved in a head on collision on a snowy two lane highway in Canada. She was rushed to the hospital, her family rushed to her side, physicians rushed to save her life. No one expected her to live.

But she did.

It is a miracle that she is alive and well, walking, talking, laughing and living. I chose that word carefully and intentionally. Her survival is miraculous and it is God alone who saved her life. When I begin to doubt that God is still at work in the world she often comes to mind, a subtle reminder from the Spirit that God is indeed still at work.

This is the season in which we mark and celebrate the greatest of God's miracles – God's own incarnation in the form of Jesus Christ. We spend the weeks of Advent preparing and anticipating the celebration of Jesus' birth. We spend Christmas morning tearing open gifts in remembrance of the great gift humanity has been given. At Christmas we celebrate the miraculous work of God. Some people question whether miracles still happen. I think they do. Once a year we see our living, breathing, laughing friend and Terrence and I are reminded of God's continued miraculous presence among us.

Her miracle is a once-in-a-lifetime one but there are more mundane miracles too (if, in fact, miracles can be mundane). Sometimes we are those miracles to one and other. Every year members of St. John's become the tangible, miraculous presence of Christ to members of our community as we serve them a hot meal at the Community Christmas Dinner. Ten of our community spent a recent Saturday afternoon packing meals to be shipped to starving children, who, I am willing to wager, will see those meals as manna from heaven.

Is God still at work in the world? It appears that God is and in miraculous ways. In the birth of Jesus the kingdom of God burst forth into the world in a dramatically new way. That is the particular miracle we celebrate at Christmas. A few months from now we'll celebrate Easter, the time the Christian church remembers the resurrection of Christ and the fact that Jesus gave us one to another to continue to be the tangible body of Christ.

What began at the original Christmas continues still today, the miraculous reality of God with us. We were once dead in sin but have been given new life in Jesus Christ. The miraculous work of God continues as we extend the love of God to those around us.

Our friend is a living, breathing miracle in a unique way but we are each invited to be living, breathing miracles. The presence of God with us began at Christmas but as we serve others God with us continues on.

This is, in part, why we serve: so that years from now others will be able to say I have experienced the miraculous works of God in my own life, in the service of those who loved me in the name of Jesus Christ.

From the Faith and Health Board:

The holiday season often brings unwelcome guests; stress, anxiety and depression. In an effort to have a perfect holiday, you might find yourself facing overwhelming added demandsparties, shopping, baking and entertaining- to an already stressful life.

With some practical tips from the Mayo Foundation for Medical Education and Research (MFMER), you can minimize the stress, anxiety and depression that often accompany the holidays. You may even end up enjoying the holidays more than you thought you would.

Learn to recognize holiday triggers, so you can avoid them.

- · Relationships can cause conflict or stress at any time, but tensions are often increased during the holidays. Family misunderstandings and conflicts can intensify, especially if you're together for several days. On the other hand, facing the holidays without a loved one can be tough and leave you feeling lonely and sad.
- · With the added expenses of gifts, travel, food and entertainment, the holidays can put a strain on your budget. Overspending can mean financial worries for later months.
- · The extra shopping and socializing can leave you tired. Being exhausted increases your stress. Exercise and sleep may be ignored. These added physical demands make you more susceptible to colds and illnesses.

When stress is at its peak, it is hard to stop and regroup. Try to prevent stress and anxiety with these suggestions.

- · If someone close to you has recently died or you cannot be with loved ones over the holidays, realize that it is normal to feel sad. Take time to acknowledge your feelings.
- · If you feel lonely, find support and companionship at church, in your community or other social events.
- · Be realistic. As families change and grow, traditions often change as well. Choose traditions to carry on and create new ones with the changes in your family.
- · Set aside differences. Accept family members and friends as they are. Save the disagreements for a more appropriate time for discussion.
- Don't try to do everything! Learn to say no to things when you begin to feel overwhelmed.
- · Don't let the holidays affect your healthy habits. Continue to eat healthy, get your sleep and continue your physical activities. Make some time daily for your self to reduce stress-just 15 minutes alone, without distractions.
- · Seek professional help if you need it. Even with best intentions, you may find you are always sad or anxious, unable to sleep or lack the energy to face the holiday events. Talk to your doctor if you are having these feelings.

lengthy projects, costs ran up. The pipe and house cost more than expected. The Benevolence Board decided to use what was left in the Stewards of Grace fund to complete the project. The total cost came to \$13, 447. The well should be sustainable, as villagers will pay a small fee to use the water, to cover the costs of diesel and repairs. The well will benefit the whole village, not just the school.

Allan Kingu has sent us photos of the project, which are on the mission bulletin board in the Commons. We, along with the Iambi students and villagers, give thanks that water now flows into the tank at the school. Allan's last letter, which is on the bulletin board, says, "I am happy to send you some more pictures of water project in fact there is no more problem of water flow. We can now pump for more than two hours without any problem." Iambi Secondary School is now "enjoying a new era of running water." Thanks be to God!

Debt Reduction Appeal

"Happy Easter!" No, I'm not confused for I, too, am getting ready for Christmas. However, I am part of a growing group of St. John's members who hopes for an 'Easter in January'. For in January, each member of St. John's will be asked to be part of an enormous two-year effort to pay down on the principal of one of our mortgage loans, thus rapidly reducing the size of monthly debt payments and the amount of interest over the life of the loan.

This idea began early in 2010 when the Congregational Council appointed a Challenge Committee to focus on the \$46,000 deficit. The deficit has meant the people we elect to represent us have periodically been tied up in the very difficult task of trying to determine how to carry out what we perceive to be God's work among us. The Challenge Committee divided into two groups, one to concentrate on planning, the other to focus on the financial challenge.

Those who were entrusted with the task of solving the deficit quickly reached the conclusion the most responsible thing to do to meet the problem of too much money going out in loan payments was to pay down the principal of the second loan, allowing us the possibility to pay the \$800,000 loan in two years rather than in 16 years. The committee decided to have a debt reduction appeal and asked Bill and Char Carlson and David and Genevieve Quarberg to co-chair the appeal.

We co-chairs chose the story of the raising of Lazarus as a reminder and a hope for the appeal. You recall Jesus arrived too late to the home of his friends Mary, Martha and Lazarus, for Lazarus had died. With others, Jesus went to the tomb and must have

startled everyone by his words, "Lazarus, come out!" And the dead man walked out, bound in burial clothes. Then Jesus said, "Unbind him!" It is our prayer that we, too, will be unbound - - from too much debt, the waste of money being paid for interest, and the inaction that results.

The Fund-raising Committee, the co-chairs, the Challenge Committee, and the Congregational Council have all made our pledges, as well as have a few others. At this writing, we have over \$150,00 toward our two-year goal of \$800,000.

Your turn is next. In January, you will be invited to attend one of three meetings to learn more about the debt reduction process and appeal. Each of you will be asked to give over and above what you have already pledged to St. John's. It will take that kind of leap-of-action on the part of every member of our congregation, for it is we who have taken on that debt to build our church building. We do this believing that Jesus' command will unbind us and be realized in our actions.

Strategic Planning Event Update

...Email from Mike Berthelsen, Chair, Challenge Team

November 8, 2010

To: Members and Visitors of St. John's Lutheran Church

The last two days (Nov. 5-6), 60 of our members spent over 10 hours together talking, thinking and dreaming about the future of St. John's. This process began at the last Annual meeting as we struggled with how to best solve our budget challenge and was re-emphasized when Pastor Crippen resigned. Our Congregation is at a place where we both need and have the opportunity to reflect on who we are today and what we want to become. A Strategic Planning Process was launched to help guide the Call Process for new leadership and give direction to the Congregation as it reviews and directs our programmatic and budget plans. The outcomes of the process will be Mission Statement, Vision Statement, Core Values, and several strategic initiatives to work toward our Vision. This weekend was only the beginning of this process.

We began our time with a review of our past and present, by making lists of:

- * Accomplishments at St. John's we are proud of
- * Strengths and weaknesses of St. Johns as a congregation
- * Opportunities and threats from outside the congregation that we need to understand

Next, we focused on identifying our understanding of the Core Values that exist at St. Johns and developing a Mission Statement to articulate our purpose as a community. Finally we turned toward the future, drafting a Vision Statement and ideas for what will become more targeted strategic initiatives.

Out of this work, we are now calling out to all of you for your ideas and dreams. We are providing for your review all the material from the Strategic Planning weekend. This will be available several ways:

- * All material will be available on the Church web-site
- * This letter and abridged content will be:
 - o Inserted into bulletin
 - o Emailed to all members for whom we have email addresses
 - o Inserted into the Voice
- * Copies of key components available at the Welcome Desk
- * Presented and discussed:
 - o during the education hour in the Sanctuary between services November 14th
 - o after supper in St. John's Hall from 6-7 p.m. Nov. 17th

We want to emphasize that meaningful definition of a congregation's mission, vision, core values and initiatives will take time and lots of discussion leading us through multiple drafts and revisions. We begin with more questions than answers, including but not limited to:

- * What should our worship be like?
- * What characteristics do we want in our next Pastor?
 - * How will we solve our budget gap?
- * Do we strive to be 'one' congregation or can we be many small groups sharing a community together?
- * How should we deal with perceptions in the community that we are 'elitist'; academic; only for those with ties to St. Olaf; and overwhelmed by Norwegian sweaters?
- * How do generational differences impact our congregational life?

To give you a feel for even more questions, below are highlights of our review of St. John's Strengths; Weaknesses; Threats and Opportunities.

 - o Rich heritage
 - o Worship and Music
- o Leadership: staff; current pastors; laity

 - o Vital youth program: connect with models here
 - o Strategic Planning provides opportunity for change

First Drafts of Vision Statement and Core Values

NOVEMBER 8, 2010

Mission Statement

A "mission statement" is nothing less than a way for the congregation to define itself. The mission answers the question, "What is this organization attempting to accomplish?" Mission provides the major standard against which all the activities, services, programs, policies, and decisions are evaluated. Mission is the preserver of congregational integrity.

A mission statement should be Clear, Concise and Compelling. Put another way:

- 1) The statement is no more than a single sentence long
- 2) The statement is easily understood
- 3) The statement can be recited from memory

Draft Mission Statement for St. John's: As followers of Jesus Christ, St. John's welcomes all to celebrate God's grace, to nurture their faith, and to reach out in love and service.

Vision Statement

A vision is how the congregation will live out its mission in the future. A common vision provides an image of a chosen future. It is an expression of hope. A vision captures people's imagination, mobilizes people's energy, and connects them with one another. Vision is what a congregation wants to become, what it cares about, and what it can be.

Draft Vision Statement for St. John's:

St. John's aspires to become a visible community of faith:

- Celebrating through joyful and music filled worship
- Connecting children, youth and adults in faith;
- Calling us to each use and share our gifts;
- · Committing to each other through our faith journeys, and
 - Caring though acts of compassion and kindness

Core Values

The term "values" refers to the guiding principles and behaviors that embody how your organization and its people are expected to operate. Values reflect and reinforce the desired culture of an organization. Values support and guide the decision making of every workforce member, helping the organization accomplish its mission and attain it vision in an appropriate manner.

SJLC member, Ed Youngquist, recommends a video (available at http://www.ELCA.org/itgetsbetter) where ELCA Bishop, Mark Hanson, offers reassurance to young people who are gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender, saying, "You are a beloved child of God."

Ed writes: Presiding Bishop Hanson's message is affirming to me. He says what I have been wishing that someone with more theological acumen than mine would say regarding what we believe about Holy Baptism and what it means. The Bible itself is but paper, ink, and binding. Luther teaches that the treasure which the Bible makes known is Christ. He is the Word! God's Word! "The Bible is the cradle, the manger, in which the Christ is laid" (so Luther teaches). It is by Christ that the Spirit

makes all things new. By Him, and all his gifts, the Kingdom for which we pray comes. These are victories of the Spirit. The Spirit who ever so patiently calls, gathers, and enlightens us. Hence, I am proud of my church. It has allowed the Spirit to "grow" us, to teach and inform us. It's a sign that God is still at work among us. His victories are in process -- both here now and not yet. A Spirit enlightened mind, often quoted: says, "God isn't finished with me yet." You are encouraged to check out Bishop Hanson's video.

As a young girl in grade school, I could not wait for Christmas. The days seemed to take an eternity to count down...and I simply could not wait that long. And so it was one year I went searching and found my Christmas gift...a brand new pair of figure skates...under the bed in my parents' room and then had to pretend to be surprised when I opened them. In the days following my great discovery, I learned that waiting was part of the joy. My mother would have said that I was never good at waiting for anything, except maybe a trip to the dentist.

Waiting is so much a part of our lives. We wait for the child to be born and she is two weeks late on top of it. We wait in line to wait in line to register for classes or to get in to see the King Tut exhibit. We wait restlessly for our family to come home and we wait anxiously to hear the word from the doctor.

Today we seem to be more impatient with waiting than in the days of my youth. Waiting a few minutes for the traffic light to change, the files to download on the computer, the checkout person to change the tape in the cash register or for the cfl light bulbs to brighten doesn't work well in an age of "instant on".

Yet waiting is a part of our lives; it is not something merely to be endured, but can often be helpful to our health and well being. Waiting can give us time to calm down; it is needed for the healing of our bodies; and sometimes it provides time for us to think more clearly or to prepare for what is ahead.

With the coming of Advent we wait—perhaps impatiently at times but always with anticipation—to celebrate the birth of the One who came long ago, comes to us now, and will come again, offering peace to our hearts and light to a world that is weary and afraid. This is the gift of God's grace...and it is always worth waiting for.

I wait for the LORD, my soul waits, and in his word I hope; my soul waits for the Lord more than those who watch for the morning, more than those who watch for the morning.
