Barnabas and Mark – A Stephen Ministry Story?

Barnabas proclaimed the Gospel of Christ throughout the Roman Empire at the same time Paul did. Barnabas' name means "the son of encouragement." And while the martyr Stephen might be called the first Stephen Minister, Barnabas could be considered the second Stephen Minister. Perhaps Barnabas' biggest contribution to the Christian church was his encouragement and care for his young cousin Mark. Acts 15:36-41 recounts the planning of Paul's second missionary journey. It begins with a sharp disagreement between Paul and Barnabas over whether to take Mark on the journey. Paul is against it, citing an earlier journey in which Mark had abandoned the group. The details are sketchy but the incident was enough for Paul to lose trust in Mark as a companion in ministry. Barnabas, though, had confidence in Mark and assertively stood up for Mark. Paul and Barnabas resolve the disagreement by going on separate missionary journeys - Paul and Silas to Syria and Cilicia and Barnabas and Mark to Cyprus. Barnabas' encouragement for and

patience with Mark likely had a great impact on Mark and his future as an apostle. Later we hear that Mark earned his way back into Paul's favor (2 Timothy 4:11) What would have happened to Mark had Barnabas not stood by his side despite an earlier failing? What we know is that because Barnabas had faith that a young man could overcome an earlier mistake or misjudgment, the church was blessed with two missionary journeys instead of one. Have you had a Barnabas in your life? Did someone encourage you and show faith in you when others doubted? Stephen Ministry is a ministry of encouragement. Grief Support Ministry

From our pastors . . .

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for^{*} you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' (1Cor.11:23-25)



The distribution and reception of the sacrament of Holy Communion is central to our worship lives. At St. John's we are fortunate to offer the sacrament on a weekly basis. In recent months the Worship and Arts Board has been discussing various forms of distribution for Holy Communion. While the current method of pouring the individual cups has been the practice for a number of years, there has been a wide variety of forms used over the years.

In thinking about making a change – even for a season – a number of things were considered. Not least among these was whether the means of distribution was in keeping with our Lutheran faith. For that we rely on what our own ELCA says about distribution: "The Eucharist or Holy *Communion is above all a meal. And it is* not mere bread and wine. We actually eat the Lord's body, and we drink the Lord's blood. It is an eschatological feast, that is, a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. These facts shape how the elements are distributed. There are several possible modes of distribution. All of them assume that the elements are always handled with reverence and dignity, for they are the living Christ (Apology of the Augsburg Confession, article XXIV). Lutherans call the elements the means of grace, for through the eating and drinking we receive nothing less than the absolute presence of Jesus Christ. And we become what we eat. little Christs.

The most basic question to ask of any method of distribution is how well it responds to Christ's command to "take and eat" and to "drink from this, all of you…." At Christ's Last Supper, it is likely that he took a piece of bread, blessed the bread by giving thanks to God (as we do in the eucharistic prayer), broke the bread and gave it to his disciples as they were together at table. It is also likely that he took a cup of wine, blessed it by giving thanks to God, and gave it for the disciples to share by drinking from the cup." As far as distribution of the wine goes, the means of common cup, intinction (dipping into the cup), pouring from a common cup, and the use of pre-poured cups (from the common source) are all seen as keeping with our beliefs.

With that in mind, the Board made the recommendation that we try a different means of distribution for the season of Lent. During the season we will communion using pre-filled glasses of wine or grape juice. This seasonal change will allow us to do a number of things. First, we will reduce the number of people needed to serve communion (some have commented on the "wall of people" blocking the altar area. Along those same lines, we will have less chancel furniture, as the two tables currently used for glasses will be removed. Second, we will be free to use the altar railing, if the occasion calls for it. Third, we believe the chance for spillage will be greatly reduced. Finally, we believe this change will expedite this portion of the worship service.

Please know that this shift in distribution is only for the season of Lent. But we do want to be open to trying things that will enhance our worship lives, without diminishing its integrity. Down the road, there could be other things that are recommended that may be of value.

As you continue to receive the sacrament, please know that it is being offered prayerfully, rightly, and in a proper fashion.

The next step in the process is for the SPC to meet with the congregation council, March 22, to report on findings, and make recommendations necessary to effectively achieve the desired hopes and dreams discovered. A full report will be made to the congregation in the April *Voice*.

Following council actions and recommendations, the next course of action will be to elect a call committee, to begin the work necessary for the call of our next senior pastor. We anticipate this process will be underway this spring.

Art Show in St. John's Fireside Room

Have you peeked into the Fireside Room lately? Did you feel the warmth of the artwork on the walls?

All of the artwork on the walls is that of John Maakestad, professor emeritus of art, St. Olaf College. John and Bobbie have generously made the dozen pieces of art in the room and another dozen on display at the Northfield Senior Center available for purchase, with all of the proceeds going to the Debt Reduction Appeal. This is an excellent opportunity to purchase a wonderful piece of art work from a well known Northfield artist and St John's member.

This show comes to us from the Owatonna Arts Center where it was until the end of January. When I first entered the room, I felt the warmth of the rich, colorful oil pastels dancing with their movement. They reached out and drew me in. Sylvan Durban, OAC director, said in an article about the exhibit, "What I think is exciting about his work is he really loves color. They're bright, intense and vivacious.bring all of these colors together to sing and sparkle and glow. I think they would translate into a stunning stain glass window because of how he plays warm colors against cool colors and also the movement of the lines and shapes."

As I walked around the room, I felt the movement of the pieces, flowing one into another, like waves on Lake Superior or the melody of a symphony. The room is alive with a

Remember Me: Voices of the Silenced

Remember Me: Voices of the Silenced is an exhibit of original art that brings to life the decades-long conflict in Colombia. The exhibit will run Feb. 28-March 11 in Buntrock Commons at St. Olaf. Visitors will have the opportunity to experience the long-standing violence in Colombia in a new and deeply personal way. Visitors to the traveling exhibit will be able to see, hear, and touch artifacts, recordings and other items associated with Colombian violence including video testimonies of mothers who have lost their children to war, the pictures and an account of the life of a slain church leader, and a quilt made by a mother of clothes belonging to her missing daughters who were abducted by the Colombian paramilitary. Visitors will also have a chance to take action in support of the people of Colombia. The exhibit is brought to the US by Lutheran World Relief and has been showing across the US since last March. The Southeastern Minnesota Synod of the ELCA is a companion synod with the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia.

Exploring and planning together reminds us of the many ways our peaceful acts can lead to a greater power to change what needs to be changed, to do what needs to be done.

Egypt: Another Step Towards Mainstreaming Non-Violence

The pro-democracy group earned international gratitude for such a strong example of the power of a careful strategy and a determined, disciplined nonviolent process to create the space for renewing a culture of opportunity and human rights within a large nation.

The planning followed the principles for nonviolent actions, based on ideas of the American peacemaker, Gene Sharp. As more is learned about the history of the April 6 Youth Movement and other groups who cooperated with each other we will make an opportunity to discuss these steps and the power of nonviolence.

The peace such actions achieve is, the poet Denise Levertov asserts, "an energy field more intense than war."
