## Your Children in Worship

My two children, Theodore and Lucy, have to be at church every Sunday. When both my kids were babies, I had a crib in my office and a curtain installed on my office window so I could nurse in private. On Easter Sunday, my kids are there the entire time. When it comes to worshiping with children, I've seen it all. Theodore has run clear across the sanctuary crying in the middle of Bishop Hanson praying. Temper tantrums and head bonks always seem to occur in the worst times of worship, especially when I am wearing my clerical collar.

Therefore, it is with authority that I tell young families to worship every single Sunday with their children. We have a generation of young families who are exhausted from the week and often naptime interferes with worship. Parents don't always want to drop their child off at another nursery. And most parents admit they aren't getting anything out of worship because they are policing their child the entire time. So they aren't coming. And in twenty years we will be the worse for it. Yet, I have seen the benefit in a mere five years of worshiping with my children. Theodore builds pipe organs out of Legos and understands that the basic things needed to play worship are a cross, bread and wine, candles, and yes – an organ. Lucy surprised me a few Sundays ago when she chanted "The

Lord be with you" right along with my colleague Dave Beckstrom during Holy Communion. She is not even three years old.

If we want to pass this amazing faith on to the next generation, it begins with worship. It begins with teaching families that it is okay to have children in worship. It is hard, it is exhausting, and it is a sacrifice parents are making on behalf of their children. We do not always get out of worship what we want, but there are so many other benefits we may not see, such as exposure to the Lord's Prayer, Holy Communion, hymns, real musicians, and Confession and Forgiveness. We need to teach our families this value and our congregations, too. When we all sacrifice together by bringing children to worship, we are planting seeds of faith beyond what we may ever see.

## A Sacred Space

Not long ago several of us Stephen Ministers learned about a powerful phrase used by another Christian care giving group in Northfield: sacred space. Any place of meeting between a care giver and care receiver is a sacred space. It is sacred because a third party is always present to do the healing—Christ. This space is sacred whether the meeting comes through an official assignment or through everyday life.

A few days later I found myself in a sacred space, which happened to be in a grocery store late on Friday afternoon. I had just checked out my groceries when a friend stepped up to greet me in her bright, chipper way. I hadn't seen her for months, not since the funeral of her husband. I told her I had been thinking of her husband just the day before, and I explained what had occasioned my thoughts. She responded with a circumstantial account of his illness and death. She described the last two days of his life, offering intimate, poignant, funny, and heart-rending details. She apologized several times for keeping me there so long—it was only recently that she had felt a need to talk about these things.

In the midst of this noise and movement, we two stood on a quiet island, a sacred space, speaking of holy things. Christ was vividly present for her and her family before, during, and after the dying, and Christ was there with us in the grocery store as she spoke and I listened.

## From our pastors . . .

As I write this the call committee has been elected – but I cannot tell you who is serving on it, because my deadline preceded the congregational meeting.\*\* However, I can tell you that, by this time, they have most likely met with Larry Iverson, from our Southeast Minnesota Synod office. He has laid out a plan of operation for them; and they are beginning work on putting together our ministry site profile. I am certain that this committee will be updating you regularly on their progress. As I have stated before, the information shared by the Strategic Planning committee will be most helpful in their work.

I'd like to reflect on the two key findings of the committee, and some of the things that are currently happening with regard to them. The first value lifted up was the value of **youth**, **children**, **and family**. This value emerged at the top of virtually every list of every search for congregational response.

Early this year we cut the full time position of Director of Youth Ministry. While this seems to be a contradictory move, our intention was to replace it with a ½ time interim director. The purpose of interim was to study our situation, and try to discover how best to approach and grow this important ministry. Beginning this summer, we are engaging a ministry called "Interserve." They specialize in interim youth ministry. Along with maintaining and ongoing youth ministry program, they also help guide the congregation through the process of examination – leading to a plan and direction for the hiring of the next permanent staff person.

St. John's has done some significant reflection about congregational life and direction over the past several months. This has set the stage for a well-informed call committee. In the same way, working with Interserve will allow us to reflect on the important value of youth, family, and children – and our response to that value.

The second thing pointed out by the Strategic committee was a call to **revisit the entire ministry area of being a "welcoming congregation."** In May we had a "hospitality audit" conducted. The results were interesting. Our signage, our official greeters, our worship bulletins and service, all received more than passing grades. However, two area of concern arose: one was the way in which visitors were invited to attend upcoming events - even our morning fellowship time. The second was noted as the most important thing the congregation could do to enhance hospitality: "Teach their members how to greet guests and extend hospitality; and remind them of the role they play in making guests feel welcome."

Each of these important congregational values is lifted up, now, at every gathering of Boards, and meeting of Church Council; as a reminder to keep them at the forefront of thought as ministry and mission are being considered.

The response to all the work of the Strategic Planning Committee has begun, in earnest. But, it is up to each one of us to do our part as we move forward together in ministry.

## Coming Soon to the Sanctuary: Pew Bibles

A seminary colleague of mine recently opined in her book *Salvation on the Small Screen* that we as Lutherans sometimes "seem less like a People of the Book and more like a People of the Bulletin Insert."<sup>1</sup> If we print the scripture lessons in the worship folders from week to week, does that imply that the Word is somehow disposable? Does this diminish our view of the importance of scripture's timelessness and place in our daily lives and our worship life as a community? (You know – *sola scriptura*, etc.) Very good questions, indeed.

The Worship and Arts Board would therefore like to implement the

purchase of pew Bibles in the coming months. This will have at least two advantages. The first, and most important, is that the presence of Bibles in our Sanctuary will be an outward sign that we are, indeed, a "People of the Book" – a tangible sign that God's Word is truly alive and present in our worship. This will also cut down tremendously on the amount of paper needed to print the weekly worship folders so that we can be good stewards of our resources.

## From the Benevolence and Social Concerns Board:

#### Voices, hands and feet in walking our faith: A Day on the Hill in Saint Paul.

On February 17<sup>th</sup>, 2011, Judith Stoutland, as district leader and twelve other members of District 25B from many different faiths lobbied our legislative representatives "On the Hill" under the direction of the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition. Every district in the state sent JRLC representatives to lobby their respective representatives. The JRLC mission statement reads "Guided by God's vision of the common good as reflected in Jewish, Christian, and Islamic traditions, JRLC mobilizes religious communities to influence public policy in Minnesota."

It was truly exciting to be engaged with a group of people whom concentrate on what they have in common and work together to be advocates for those whom are voiceless at the highest levels of our government. We were to tell our leglislative representatives that WE were advocates for the voiceless: children, the hungry, the homeless, the mentally or physically disabled, and senior citizens. Here in Minnesota the voiceless HAVE voices.

Three themes were presented to Senator Al DeKruif and Representative Kelby Woodard by our group. The first theme was taxes. Specifically, given the reality of the budgetary crisis, that if the most vulnerable citizenry were to be adversely affected, we would reluctantly accept and actually embrace new taxes if the budgetary cuts did not land on the backs of the vulnerable.

Secondly, we wanted to emphasize that the vulnerable DO have advocates. We were there to advocate for those whom are unable to advocate for themselves. The short sighted cutting of the programs in health care, social services, food programs, housing, education and preventive programs would have significant long term and far reaching consequences to our communities and its members.

Thirdly the theme was of decreasing politicization of the judiciary and the resulting decisions from the courts. To ensure equal justice for all, that Judges be vetted and then appointed by the Governor, as opposed to running for the position during elections. The citizenry would be able to vote a Judge out but not onto the bench.

During these last days of the budgetary decisions being made on the Hill <u>please</u> have your voice be heard on these issues. Call, write or email your representatives.

#### Justice Calendar

The Peace and Justice Group does not schedule reqular meetings in June and July. Special events will be announced as they come up. **A season of prayer with the People of Sudan - Now until July 9.** Prayers are always in order, particularly as July 9 approaches when South Sudan will become an independent nation. These are days we suggest a focus on the situation of the people of Sudan. Our sisters and brothers in Sudan and around the world are in prayer now. They are praying for peace and self-determination and will continue in prayer until, and after, independence for South Sudan is realized.

Remembering the role prayer played in the days before the January 2011 referendum on self-determination for South Sudan, a number of faith communities will again come together in a Season of Prayer with the people of Sudan in this time. Specifically, we are invited to pray for thirty minutes on: Each day from May 20 through 26 when a delegation of Member States of the UN Security Council will visit Africa and spend time in Sudan; and each Friday until July 9 (May 28, June 4, June 11, June 18, June 25, July 2, and July 9).

In Minnesota, we are called to pray at 10:00 a.m.(CDT). And we have invited our sisters and brothers in Sudan to pray with us at 7:00 p.m. in their country. Pray at these times or whatever time works for you; pray wherever you are; pray individually or gather with others; pray in any manner you feel comfortable praying. The theme of this year's observance is "Home," highlighting the plight of the world's refugees, more than three-quarters of them in the developing world, who have been uprooted from their homes by conflict or persecution.

**International Day in Support of Victims of Torture.** June 27. This day is an occasion to underscore the internationally recognized right of all men and women to live free from torture. It is an opportunity to reaffirm our collective commitment to prohibit torture and all cruel, inhuman and degrading treatment or punishment," says *Ban Ki-moon*.

My dad was an avid fisherman and each summer during my growing up years our family would head to Minnesota for a two-week vacation where the days were filled with fishing, eating, swimming, and playing games. As a young girl I didn't care much for fishing...too much sitting still and waiting. But I did go out in the boat often enough to have my own rod and reel, to learn some of the basics of trolling for Walleye and to remember the day I brought in the first fish by myself–after wrapping my line around the anchor rope. And I can still hear my dad call the fish: on days when the fish did not seem to be biting on anything, my dad would resort to calling, "Here fish, come fish, come fish, fish, fish". Of course, the fish didn't heed, but that sing-song call and those summer vacations are among my fondest memories.

What a treasure it is to recall the people who have blessed us throughout our lives. For one thing it makes our hearts warm as we remember them. And, in the remembering we also realize how those people have impacted our lives and helped to form who we are. And finally, with these memories we are reminded that life is all about relationships. It is in relationships that we find meaning and purpose in our lives.

This past Lent almost 60 people of St. John's gathered in small groups to join in conversation about the book *An Altar in the World*. At the conclusion of the four weeks, many of the participants expressed appreciation and gratitude for the relationships that were formed among those in their small group. Those comments were good to hear as relationships are certainly at the heart of a small group experience. The Small Group Ministry Team is currently talking about the possibility of a summer reading option; if you are interested, please let us know.

The psalmist also recalls how God has blessed us:

Bless the LORD, O my soul,

and do not forget all his benefits-

who *forgives* all your iniquity,
