Compromise Has Promise

Promise is right there in the word *compromise*. We have heard a lot about compromise in the world of politics lately, but we have not seen it in operation there. On a smaller scale, many individuals face what appear to be unresolvable conflicts with family, with friends, and with coworkers. Some are convinced that they and they alone hold the answer to a problem. Others insist that their voices are not being heard. Has genuine, healthy compromise seemed hard to find in your personal life, too?

Both compromise and promise assume a conversation, a dialogue in which two participants, representing different positions, are heard and affirmed. One voice may be weaker and one stronger, but both are legitimate and deserve a fair hearing, whether they are governments or families. Compromise means each side

gives up a piece of an issue; but it does not mean that one or both sides give up a piece of themselves. A fresh, open, and respectful look can help both weak and strong recognize that mutuality is the basis of the *promise* in compromise.

The *com* in *compromise* means *together*, *jointly*. True compromise and promise carry within them the trust and hope that are the basis of every positive relationship. Real compromise and promise allow individuals to smooth out tensions by standing together on shared concerns. Through healthy compromise, people can feel anxiety ease and outright conflict move to peaceful resolution. The key is genuine give and take that is grounded in mutual respect.

From our pastors . . .

The call committee is now busy discerning the appropriate candidates to interview from the pool they have been given. They have a difficult task because they have been asked to locate the perfect pastor for St. John's Lutheran Church. The following is a recipe which, if followed closely, should result in a "perfect" choice:

The perfect pastor preaches exactly 12 minutes. He frequently condemns sin but never upsets anyone. He works from 8 a.m. until midnight and is also a janitor. He makes \$60 a week, wears good clothes, buys good books, drives a good <u>car</u>, and gives about \$80 a week to the poor. He is 28 years of age, but he's been preaching for 30 years. *He is wonderfully gentle and handsome. He* smiles all the time with a straight face because he has a sense of humor that keeps him seriously dedicated to his work. He gives himself completely but never gets too close to anyone to avoid criticism. He speaks boldly on social issues, but must never become politically involved. He has a burning desire to work with teenagers, but he spends all his time with senior citizens. He makes 15 daily calls to parish families, visits shut-ins and the hospitalized, spends all his time evangelizing the unchurched, and is always in his office when needed.

We all know that, after time, perfection can begin to fade. Therefore, here are further instructions for keeping things perfect with the pastor: *If your pastor does not measure up, simply send this notice to six other churches that are tired of their pastor too. Then bundle up your pastor and send him to the church at the top of your list. If everyone cooperates, in one week you will receive 1,643 pastors. One of them should be perfect. Have faith in this letter. One church broke the chain and got its' old pastor back in less than three months.*

Seriously, the call committee is hard at work, diligently seeking the best possible candidate to be the next senior pastor at SJLC. Please continue to keep all concerned in your prayers. And, when you happen to meet a member of that committee, please offer them a word of encouragement and thanks for their dedication and service.

As we head into the fall, a significant change is ahead: the second worship service has been moved to 11:00 a.m. This move was prompted by a request from small group ministry regarding a need for some additional time between services to accommodate additional group offerings. It will also help the education forums, as they are most often pressed for time.

Any change in worship time, however slight, is a significant thing. As we plan our worship into the fall we will continue to remain aware of time considerations. Also, it should be mentioned that this time change is being taken on for a one-year period of study. At that point, the Congregation Council will receive comments and evidence of benefits and drawbacks of the move.

We all look forward to the resumption of programming for children, youth, and adults, alike. The hope is that a renewed and refreshed spirit will accompany all program and worship efforts this fall.

Being Unbound

Our congregation is surely in the process of 'being unbound' because so many of you have been so generous in giving money toward paying down our mortgage debt through the Debt Reduction Appeal. As Pastor Bob has pointed out, many good things are already happening. We have reduced the mortgage from nearly \$800,000 to \$230,000 just one third of the way into the two-year appeal. We have hired a part-time interim Youth Director, Tracie Peterson, who, along with the Youth Board, will focus on the goal stated in the Strategic Planning report to create a family ministry focus around faith formation. Because the early and generous response in giving has saved us the extra amount in interest payments. We have reduced the cash outflow for debt service by \$30,000 which is the same as \$30,000 in additional income. In addition this will reduce our annual payments in all future years by over \$50,000. Being 'unbound' has enabled us to

make timely payments to our benevolence and outreach partners such as the ELCA, Lutheran Social Services, El Milagro Lutheran Church, Lutheran World Relief and others.

Thank you to all who have given and are giving. For those whose circumstances may have changed making it possible to give now, or even in future months, your gifts will enlarge our congregational good health and influence.

Chicago Mission Trip, 2011

Thirteen members of St. John's travelled to Chicago in July to participate in a week-long mission trip organized through Center for Student Missions. Youth and chaperones assisted teachers in a summer school program run by an organization called Casa Central; served at a homeless shelter called A Safe Haven and helped to serve a free meal called "Breaking Bread" at the LaSalle Street Church. Other activities included walking tours of city neighborhoods and meals at neighborhood restaurants. In the coming months, trip participants will share reflections of their week in Chicago, in the Voice. Thank you, St. John's for helping to make this trip possible through your prayers and support of youth fundraising efforts.

From Bjorn Bade: "During our mission trip to Chicago I saw God in all the homeless people that we helped at the Breaking Bread meal and Safe Haven facilities. I was impressed by the courage and strength they had, to get up every day even though they may not know what they are going to eat for dinner or where they are going to get that food. It takes a lot of belief in having a better life, getting a job and being positive to keep going in the conditions that are not always the best to be living in. I only got to talk with two or three homeless people but they showed me their strength through their positive attitudes and the willingness to face each day without complaining. I also saw God in the facilities helping those who are homeless. I was really impressed with A Safe Haven and how nice their building
