We wish Stephanie the best and pray for God's blessing to be upon her in her new adventure. Work has already begun to find her replacement and we may already have a new staff member by the time you read this.

Other staffing concerns include the need for a part-time Administrative Assistant who can oversee the finances of the congregation. Bernie Renander has been serving us in this capacity as a volunteer and has done a great job, but we need to begin thinking about how we will fill this important staff position. The other staffing need to be filled is our Youth Director position. Interim Director Tracie Peterson has been working with the transition team to give us a recommendation on the direction of our youth program sometime in May. This is a key position in addressing our vision for a stronger, growing youth and family ministry.

STEWARDSHIP RESPONSE

Along with the Unbind Us! mortgage reduction appeal, these staffing issues are our ministry challenge as a congregation. Presently, we are behind in meeting our income target for the year. We need the continuing, strong financial support of all of our members if we are to fill these ministry needs and accomplish our vision goals. God has blessed us as a congregation and has given to us the privilege of sharing the good news of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Thank you for your participation and on-going support. Through you and the ministry of this congregation, many people will come to experience the new life in Christ. Let your joy and gladness be seen by those around you. Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

Thrivent Choice Dollars Benefit St. John's Ministries

A total of \$6,887 was given to St. John's by Thrivent Financial members in 2011 through the Thrivent Choice Dollar program. From the Faith and Health Board:

The Faith and Health Board will have monthly articles in the Voice to bring information on a variety of healthrelated topics. April was Parkinson's Disease Awareness month. Many of us have friends, neighbors or family members with the diagnosis of Parkinson's Disease.

Parkinson's Disease is a chronic and progressive movement disorder of the nervous system, first described in 1817 by James Parkinson. It is caused by degeneration of neurons in a small region of the brain stem. Cells within this portion of the brain no longer produce adequate amounts of dopamine, a chemical that controls balance and movement. Without dopamine, the nerve cells cannot properly send messages. This results in loss of control with movements or tremors.

The first signs of Parkinson's disease may be very subtle and go unnoticed, typically affecting one side of the body more than the other. Symptoms may include tremors in a hand or foot at rest, shortened and shuffling steps, a feeling of dragging one leg or foot, stooped posture, softer or slowed speech. Parkinson symptoms tend to worsen as the disease progresses.

Along with the movement complications of Parkinson Disease, individuals may have non-movement complications such as depression, anxiety or sleep disorders. Recognizing these symptoms is critical in the effective treatment of Parkinson Disease. Though there is no cure, the goal of treatment in Parkinson's is the control of symptoms. This may include chemical replacement of the lacking dopamine. Individuals must work closely with their doctors as symptoms change requiring adjustment in medications and dosages.

It's important for family members and the church community to understand Parkinson's Disease and to lend support for individuals and family members of those affected by the disease. A Parkinson's diagnosis is a life-changing event. Dealing with the diagnosis ranges from denial, fear, anger and eventual acceptance as the individual manages the disease symptoms. Physical and emotional support from the faith community is critical. See the Faith and Health Bulletin board in the Commons or the following web sites for additional information.

St. John's member Dean shares with us his journey with Parkinson's Disease:

"It was about 12 years ago, while sitting at our kitchen table, that one of our children said, "Dad, why is your hand shaking?" After a visit to a neurologist the diagnosis was Parkinson's Disease. All of a sudden the future became uncertain, for I also had just been diagnosed with Prostrate Cancer. But I have been blessed, the cancer has been treated and the Parkinson's symptoms controlled. Parkinson's can show a range of symptoms and also develop at different rates. My symptoms have been, tremor on my right side, softening of my voice, loss of sense of smell, some problems with balance, and a problem being able to retrieve the words that I want to use on a moments notice. Thanks to an excellent neurologist and the availability of modern medications, I have been able to live a pretty normal life even with Parkinson's Disease."

Donations Sought to Commission New Paraments

The Chancel Guild has commissioned Judy Swanson to design and create a new set of white paraments for the sanctuary. The set will include hangings for the altar, the pulpit, the lectern, and two stoles, one for each pastor. The altar cloth will be two sided, with one side especially designed for Easter. Since the church does not budget for new paraments, members of St. John's are encouraged to make memorial donations to the Chancel Guild Memorial Fund. The cost is expected to be in the range of \$2500.

Why design new white paraments? St. John's older set of white cloths wore out and was retired several years ago. This means that the white Hardanger paraments are currently used for both the seasons of Easter and Christmas. This white set was commissioned in 1994 with a donation by Beulah Heiberg. The Norwegian Hardanger embroidery was done by Christine Stime and Jennifer Bothun. They are a work of art. Though they are still in beautiful condition after 18 years of use, it would be good to reduce the frequency of use to preserve them for years to come.

All are welcome! *summing up and Moving Forward*

At our May meeting we will take care of some organizational duties for this year as well as look at what we will focus on in the autumn and beyond. We need your voices to help make the work important in the life of our church. To get you thinking about things, topics that have been suggested so far are human trafficking, the power of nonviolence, sustainable peace, and criminal justice.

The latter is a topic that almost certainly will be part of our work. Throughout the years the Peace and Justice Group has brought the ELCA Social Statements before the congregation for discussion. Currently, a draft for the Social Document on Criminal Justice is ready. The Task Force asks that individuals and groups submit their comments and suggestions by October 31. We will look at the summary of the draft in May and consider how St. John's can study it and respond.

Let us know of your interest and your suggestions for a plan. If you cannot come to the meeting, you can email your ideas and comments to Judith Stoutland (as some people have done already). This is an important topic and you have a chance to be part of the work.

"And What Does God Require?"

from Deut. 10: 12-13, 17-18

On March 20, about 200 Lutherans joined 600 interfaith advocates at the state capitol for the annual Joint Religious Legislative Coalition Day on the Hill. Two of the participants were St. John's members, Trine Karlsen and Jane Rinehart. The coalition is made up of members of Protestant, Catholic, Islamic and Jewish faith. Advocacy focuses on social justice issues which these four religious groups agree on.

For the second year in a row, every senate district in the state was represented by at least one registered attendee. Trine and Jane joined others from our legislative district to visit Senator Dekruif and Rep. Woodard. JRLC had identified three issues to focus on: (1) protecting the safety net, (2) ending poverty by support for the Family Economic Security Act, (3) support for the \$40 million bonding bill for affordable housing.

The Lutheran Coalition for Public Policy in Minnesota (LCPPM) takes the approach of "faithful diligence" as the legislative session enters the home stretch. Mark

Peters, director of LCPPM says, "We fought hard to make sure the flurry of objectionable bills referred to as "Welfare Reform 2.0" did not make it into the House Health and Human Services (HHS) Omnibus Bill. The Senate Health and Human Services (HHS) Committee will introduce their Omnibus bill this week. LCPPM stands poised to provide testimony. On-going negotiations and potential committee or floor amendments keep alive the possibility that harmful aspects of these proposals might still find a path into the final legislation. We must not let down our guard or become complacent until the session is over."

Our core faith values are expressed in a letter signed last year by the six Minnesota ELCA bishops and the six bishops and archbishop of the Minnesota Catholic Conference. They declare, "The most telling measure of how well we care for each other is to consider how we treat those who are most vulnerable among us."

Goods For Good Rummage Sale May 4-5

The volunteer organization Fifth Bridge is organizing a community rummage sale again this year. Goods for Good will be held at various sites around Northfield on May 4-5.
