
# Tenth Graders to affirm their baptism October 14

St. John's gives thanks to God that the following young people in our congregation have indicated their desire to publicly affirm their baptism by participating in the Rite of Confirmation on Sunday, October 14, at the 11:00 a.m. service: Kelsey Bull, McKenna Boyum, Katelyn Canedy, Nicholas Gonnerman, Dylan Matson and Nicholas Pelletier.

When they affirm their baptism, these young people will renounce all evil, profess their faith in the Triune God, and commit themselves more fully to participate in the life of the congregation, and to live out their faith in the world. This rite follows a six-year education and reflection program at St. John's beginning with Catechism (CAT) classes in grades three, four, five, and six; weekday and Sunday classes in grades seven and eight; and classes, retreats, and a mentor relationship in grade nine. The program concluded with a retreat at Gustavus on Saturday, September 22.

Those being confirmed and their parents will meet in the Fireside Room on Saturday, October 13, at 8:30 a.m. After rehearsal, breakfast with students, families and mentors will be at 10:00 a.m.

Please pray for these young people and their faith and life as they make this commitment and affirmation.

# **Bringing Comfort to the** Grieving

You see a friend in church who has recently lost a spouse, or relative, or close friend. You know you should say something, but what do you say?

In class sessions, Stephen Ministers learn how to respond in a meaningful way to those who are grieving the loss of loved ones or friends. We also explore what not to say. Perhaps some of these suggestions will be helpful to you.

- Go to those who are bereaved as soon as possible. Those in grief need to see and feel the concern and the love you have for them. Statements like "You have my sympathy" or "I'm sorry" let the grieving person know you are fully present with
- 2. Often we feel at a loss for words when expressing sentiments to a grieving person. Simply stating, "You've had such a great loss and I'm sorry," sends a powerful message. You can also express yourself through a loving hug, a handshake, or even simply being there as a listener.

- 3. Avoid saying clichés such as "I know just how you feel" or "Time heals all wounds." While these statements are not meant to be insensitive, they can be perceived that way and they can actually make the grieving person feel worse.
- 4. Remember important dates to the person who is grieving, such as holidays, birthdays. anniversaries. Contact the grieving person on these important dates. In this way, you convey your continued concern at times that are special for them.

Working through grief is a process that requires the support of others. If you know someone who would benefit from a Stephen Minister as they move through the grief process, contact Joan Halvorson at 645-8445 or Pastor Johnson at 645-4429.

# Update from the Council . . .

The Council is pleased to announce that Pastor Orlin Mandsager has accepted a Letter of Agreement to become the Interim Senior Pastor at St. John's beginning on Monday, October 1st!

Since the last congregational update, members of the Executive Committee and Council interviewed two candidates provided by the Synod, who have training and experience working with congregations who have had a pastor resign under circumstances similar to ours. After the process was complete, one candidate clearly stood out as a good fit for St. John's. Pastor Mandsager's energy, enthusiasm for the Word, and willingness to help us work through the interim period offer a great opportunity for our congregation to build for the future and continue its mission.

Orlin Mandsager's past experience includes three formal interim positions, being the Coordinating Pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church in Owatonna for seven years, Contextual Education faculty positions at Luther Seminary and Wartburg Seminary, Vice President, Dean of Student Life and Assistant Professor of Religion at Luther College and College Pastor and Assistant Professor of Religion at Augsburg College. Pastor Mandsager is familiar with St. John's and the Northfield community as he is a St. Olaf College graduate and has family living in the area.

Currently living in Burnsville, Orlin is married to VaLois. Together they have 8 children and 12 grandchildren.

If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? Something I never thought I would do when I left my employment at St. John's, would be to come back to work at St. John's. Don't get me wrong, I enjoyed my job and the folks that I worked with, but I figured I had turned that chapter, and I was excited to be diving head first into a new one in my career. God had other plans, clearly. As a member of St. John's, I'm asking you to step up and do the same. Serve in ways you didn't expect, to give fully and freely to the church that you love. That's why we are all here, right? To worship together, to sing together, to pray together and to SERVE together? Shared Ministry - it' is at the core of this church. We can all stand in church on Sunday and sing and pray, but if there are not actions to those words, what good are we doing? I'm asking you to Serve your Lord.

I understand busy family lives; I understand balancing work, kids, activities, and homework; I understand if you feel you've 'done your job', but I am still going to ask you for more. I am asking for two hours on a Sunday morning to help in the nursery; two hours on a Wednesday night to help clean up after a meal that you've been served; one hour on a Sunday to help serve communion. It's the small, little things that have a HUGE impact on the ministries that we do here. We have a very, very faithful core set of volunteers - but they need help too. We need YOU. The goal is this - to create a volunteer list that is rotational and assigned much like our assisting ministers or greeters. Every Wednesday Meal takes 10-15 volunteers to make, serve, and clean up. We serve about 180 people each Wednesday night; if every family that uses this ministry volunteered their time, you'd have to serve once every 2-3 months. That's it—it's that simple.

I hope and I pray that you will consider coming together as a congregation, as we feel our way through yet another change, challenge, and opportunity to grow.I pray that you will put actions to your words and BE St. John's. Join in and serve and love your Lord through your actions.

The ELCA Malaria Campaign partners with 11 churches in Africa to provide lifesaving medication and healthcare, educate people about the disease and prevent the spread by distributing mosquito nets and supporting water treatment projects to control the environments where mosquitoes breed. 


### .....Small Group Option Coming Soon.....

### From Bread for the World

Each year, churches and private charities provide thousands of tons of food to hungry people around the world. Here in the United States, thousands of soup kitchens staffed by church volunteers serve hot meals to hungry families. However, only 5 per cent of the food provided to hungry people comes from these private sector efforts.

Every day, nearly 16,000 children die from hunger-related causes. That's one child every five seconds. In the U.S. nearly one in five children lives in a family that struggles to put food on the table.

We have the knowledge and resources to end wide-spread hunger both in the U.S. and abroad. But our nation's decision makers must be persuaded to lead the way in changing policies and allocating resources to end hunger. Sixty-two percent of the \$5.3 trillion in cuts in the House's FY13 budget are to programs vital to poor and hungry people. By making our voices heard in Congress, we can make our nation's laws more fair and compassionate to people in need.

Hunger is not a partisan issue and Bread for the World works with a network of thousands of individual members, churches and denominations to ensure a presence in all congressional districts. Bread inspires its members to meet with, call, and write personal letters and emails to their members of Congress.

These communications urge congress to:

- Create a circle of protection around funding for programs vital to hungry and poor people in the U.S. and abroad:
- Increase U.S. investment in global agricultural productivity in a way that improves nutrition for mothers and young children;
- Increase the efficiency and effectiveness of U.S. foreign assistance so it is clearly focused on poverty reduction and helps hungry people to feed themselves;
- Assure that federal programs like SNAP (formerly Food Stamps) continue to provide for the basic nutritional needs of families facing economic hardship;
- Support policies for low-income working families, such as the Earned Income Tax Credit, proven effective at enabling families to move out of poverty.

On October 21, **Bread for the World Sunday**, we at St. John's are invited to join with other churches across the country to participate in an **Offering of Letters**. Members of the Peace and Justice Group will be at tables in St. John's Hall from 9:30 to 12:30 with paper, pens and a sample letter. You can take a few minutes to write brief letters to our Senators and Representative there, or write at home and mail the letters during the week.
