Celebrating 100 Years in a Grace-Filled Space

2013 marks the 100th anniversary of the St. John's sanctuary and the church building that includes the narthex, belltower, sacristy and Fellowship Hall. The last worship service in the small, painted clapboard church on the corner of Washington and Fourth Streets was held on April 13, 1913. Three weeks later the big, new brick structure on Third and Poplar was dedicated. This church building has been a center for worship, learning and fellowship for a whole century. We will mark this anniversary with a special litany during worship on March 17 and with a special presentation on the history of the sanctuary and church building during St. John's Forum entitled "Our House at 100: An Evolving Vessel", presented by Joe Shaw and Steve Edwins. Historic photos of the building will be on display in St. John's Hall this spring. ... continued on page 3

Stephen Ministry FAQs:

What exactly is Stephen Ministry?

A: Stephen Ministry is a part of St. John's ministry in which trained and supervised lay persons, called Stephen Ministers, provide one-to-one Christian care to individuals facing life's challenges or difficulties.

What do Stephen Ministers do?

A: Stephen Ministers are caring Christian friends who listen, understand, accept, and pray for and with care receivers.

Who are Care Receivers?

A: Care receivers are the recipients of Stephen Ministers' care. They are people from St. John's or in the community who are facing difficulties such as grief, divorce, loss of job, loneliness, illness. Stephen Ministers usually meet with their care receivers or speak to them on the phone once a week, for as long as the care receiver will benefit from the relationship.

Our Lenten spiritual journey continues through March this year taking us to Easter, March 31. Lent is always a time to re-focus our hearts and minds, to be renewed in spirit as we reflect on the meaning of the Cross of Christ in our life of faith. Our Wednesday Lenten Series has invited us to relate that meaning to God's creation, and our place in it. As is said so well in an environmental Lenten worship series published by the ELCA; "Never has the need for renewal and restoration of God's world been more urgent than in this decade of the 21st century. The groans of creation, the cries of humankind, the warnings of scientists, the voices of today's 'eco-prophets' – all call to us and urge us to respond in faith that is active in love and hope, with actions of justice and compassion. Such is the fruit that can be born of our deep and earnest reflection this Lenten season."

Passion and Palm Sunday, March 24, bring us to Holy Week. We hear the shouts of praise as Jesus enters Jerusalem, only to soon be contradicted by shouts for crucifixion and Peter's denial. Maundy Thursday ("Maundy" is an English form of the Latin word for "commandment") recalls Jesus' new commandment "you shall love one another even as I have loved you". The Gospel for the day from John 13:1-35, tells of Jesus' last Passover meal with the disciples and his institution of the Lord's Supper, the deepest meaning of Jesus' love. The text from John also tells us of Jesus washing his disciples' feet, a demonstration of servanthood and humility. The ritual of footwashing in Maundy Thursday worship reminds us of our call to humble servanthood in Jesus name. On Good Friday we kneel before the cross, aware of our sinfulness and our forgiveness and hope in Christ's sacrifice. In Christ's journey to Golgatha and in his death on the cross we see God's love....totally self-giving, unconditional and complete! On the cross our sin is atoned for and our despair is shared by a God who lifts us up from the dust and from death, to newness of life. And three days later, Easter dawns! Alleluias return! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

From the Organ Bench...

Ruth and I have been members here for some 30 years but wow, have I learned a lot these past weeks about the depth, breadth and yes complexity of our lives together as the people of St. John's. I knew about the worship life and because of Ruth's long tenure as organist about the music ministry. I knew of the amazing dedication of our choir members who understand that their regular participation both at worship and in weekly rehearsals is essential if our music ministry is to flourish. Without this level of commitment worship at St. John's would be much less rich. But as someone whose "church" was more Boe Chapel at St. Olaf, these past weeks I have been learning about other dimensions of this community's life together and would like to share a few of my "discoveries."

1. The Staff:

We are truly blessed with a fine, creative and dedicated staff. As I come to know them better, discern their passion to serve St. John's, I realize what gifts we members are given through their service to us. They are a busy group, working well together and diligently to nurture the areas of our ministry for which they are responsible without losing sight of the big picture of the congregation as a whole.

2. Complex Schedule:

If you are not around much during the week, you would be amazed to discover how busy this place is, how many different events occur each week. Often our facilities are taxed to the max with barely enough space for the many simultaneous activities.

3. Wonderful, Gifted Members:

We are blessed with an extraordinarily rich and diversely talented membership. Two examples come to mind.

- (1) As I've wandered about the building I've discovered wonderful art, much of it the work of our members.
- (2) This Epiphany we sang *Go Tell It on the Mountain* as our sending song every week with stanzas written expressly for each week's themes. All I needed to do was ask one of our gifted members and it was done.

Our members rise to fiscal challenges as well and a noteworthy example is the recent successful campaign to raise sufficient funds to pay off one of our two mortgages thus freeing financial resources that can be utilized to enrich our ministries.

It is a privilege to be a part of St. John's in a more all-encompassing way and I am grateful that circumstances permit me to serve as Interim Music Director. And...based upon the contents of this month's little essay, perhaps its title should not be *From the Organ Bench* but *From the Busy Place Called St. John's*.

March Food Share Campaign!

Northfield Community Action Center has its annual March Minnesota Food Share Campaign. During the month of March, more than 300 food shelves across Minnesota turn to their local communities and talk about hunger and food insecurity within the community and seek donations to augment supplies and run the program. Last year, the CAC raise \$104, 439 and collected 39,983 pounds of food during the campaign. 28% of the monetary donations came from 16 area churches.

The CAC has the ability to purchase food items at a much lower cost per pound than the average consumer can, so monetary donations are preferred. Please indicate that your donation is for the FoodShare Campaign. St. John's 4th and 5th grade Wednesday "DOG" kids will be helping track our congregation's monetary donations with a display in the Commons. Our goal is to reach \$10,000.

If you prefer to donate food items, these are the items most needed: Cooking oil, peanut butter, canned fruit, canned meat, meal helper, pasta, rice, soup, canned beans, dry beans, spaghetti sauce, and healthy snacks.

Thoughtful Film Club





Two decades later he and his wife Rosella will reveal the truth about his struggles and share how he maintains meaning and joy in his life. Their account offers encouragement, hope, and insight to fellow stroke survivors, their families, and friends, as well as relevant information about strokes.

Christ's ministry was holistic; He ministered to the "whole" person—physically, emotionally and spiritually. As Jesus says in John 10:10, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly."

Following Christ's example, health professionals and the church increasingly began to see the possibilities and potential for a healthcare-based ministry. That realization caused parish nursing programs to be developed.

Parish nurses *do not* provide home healthcare nursing. Rather, they work in partnership with clergy and other healthcare organizations to advocate for the health and well-being of the faith community.

As your Parish Nurse, I would like to meet with other St. John's nursing and health professionals for a brain-storming session. We will discuss and consider ways we might better develop and integrate the parish nursing concept within our congregation.

From the Peace and Justice GrouP . . .

Continuing Our Study of the US Criminal Justice System . . .

"I was in prison and you visited me."

For some members of St. John's, our study of the ELCA draft statement on Criminal Justice this fall raised the questions: "How can I make a difference?" and "How can we make a difference?"

At our February meeting, Cindy Robinson of Northfield explained the structure of the Alternatives to Violence program which is used at the State Prison in Faribault. Cindy has participated in this program for more than 15 years.

At our upcoming March 4^{th} meeting, Ruth Anderson of Barron, WI, will add to our understanding of ways to respond to the challenges as she tells of her 28 years of prison ministry.

Ruth began her Jail Ministry through Calvary Lutheran Church (Golden Valley, MN) in the early 1980s. With the leadership of Fern Hanwick, a teacher at Augsburg College, women in her WELCA circle went in groups of three to the Hennepin County Adult Correction Facility for Women in Plymouth, MN.

In 1988, she moved to Barron, WI, where the County Jail is located. Now a member of First Lutheran Church there, she played a role in beginning a ministry to the jail. With the approval of the First Lutheran Evangelism Committee and the Barron Ministerial Association, a program was begun. Currently the group from First Lutheran has 7 members who take turns, two or three going together each Tuesday evening. They meet with the women and men separately, bringing Sunday bulletins, reading texts, and doing lots of singing. An average of 100 a month, 25 each week, attend.

Ruth, a sister of Dorothy Ostlie, is eager to share her story. For more details of their work and program, come on March 4^{th} to hear Ruth talk about her experiences and answer your questions.

As the time for the distribution of the second draft approaches, think about the issues that are most important to you.

Reflect on how your religious commitment enters into your thinking about these things.

There will be opportunities to share concerns and faith.

Perhaps you have noticed it as well.

During the past weeks, as the flu season hit hard and spread so rapidly, a decision was made at St. John's to refrain from shaking hands during the sharing of the peace. During the years when I commuted long distances to my work, there were occasions when the car seemed to be on auto-pilot as suddenly I would come to the realization that I couldn't recall the past 15 minutes of my drive.

Perhaps it is a good thing to move from the routine and familiar from time to time in order to jar us awake to what we are doing and saying. Change, which may simply bring new life to the familiar, has the potential for leading us to refreshing understandings and insights.

What changes might the One who makes all things new be calling you, me, our congregation to during this season of Lent? May we be alive, aware and awake to the wooing of the God's Spirit.
