A Ministry of Prayer

Stephen Ministers rely upon prayer in our work more than upon any of the skills we learn in training, valuable as these are. One of the first things we learn, and must learn again and again, is that we ourselves have no ability to cure emotional or spiritual maladies. Our task is rather to walk faithfully beside our care receivers, to listen to their pain and sorrow and joy, and to entrust their healing to the power of Christ, in his own time and way.

This sounds simple, even obvious, but to learn this lesson most of us have to make radical changes in our thinking. It is natural to want to relieve the pain of others, right now; it is natural to want to change things for the better, right now; it is natural to see things amiss and offer advice for setting them right. And these natural, merely human, responses in ourselves are what we strive to give up, for they would impede our ministry. When we give up the idea that we know what is best for our care receivers and how to bring this about, when we accept that we are helpless on our own to solve their

Last month, like every month at St. John's, the word of Christ was proclaimed at worship through scripture, preaching, liturgy and hymns. It was proclaimed in the sacraments of baptism and holy communion and it was proclaimed in the prayers we offered in Christ's name and in the Christian care and consolation we shared with one another. The word of Christ was proclaimed last month also in the conversations shared over a meal at the Night to Unite neighborhood event. The word was proclaimed in the late 1800s band music played by Newberry's Victorian Cornet Band during worship; in the Latin American songs and hymns we heard and sang accompanied by the El Milagro musicians and in songs from Tanzania led by the Stubbs family. It was proclaimed as the drywall was put up at the Habitat for Humanity house in Dundas. It could be heard in the voices of sixty children and their teachers and volunteers from different congregations and different denominations singing songs like "Gonna Dance" and "The Hippo Song" at Vacation Bible School held here at St. John's.

Pastor and author Eugene Peterson writes about how Christians are called to use words and ministry for communion not simply for communication because that is what God does. It is for the sake of communion that God sent Christ, the Word made flesh, into the world. It was not enough to tell the world something about love, God wanted to show that love and to share that love with the world. Through Christ God calls humanity and all creation deeper into a relationship, deeper into the wonder and gift of salvation. Peterson writes in his book, Subversive Spirituality, "[Holy Communion] uses words, the simplest of words, "this is my body, this is my blood," that plunge us into an act of revelation which staggers the imagination, which we never figure out, but we enter into. These words do not describe, they point, they reach, they embrace." (Subversive Spirituality, p. 137)

Through water and the simple words, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" - we are made members of the body of Christ and are joined to Christ's mission. As part of this mission we are called to proclaim our hope in Christ throughout our lives, no matter where we find ourselves. The ministry at St. John's provides a variety of opportunities and spaces for the word of Christ to be spoken and to be heard. The promise is that in the hearing of this word, God's Spirit is at work bringing healing, giving courage, and creating faith.

On the topic of hearing the word of Christ, the congregation council this summer approved the purchase of a new sound system in the sanctuary. Watch - and listen - for installation this fall. Not only will the new equipment and wiring improve sound in the sanctuary, including for those who use the hearing devices, but it will also improve our radio broadcast through KYMN and our ability to record worship services for broadcast on NTV, cable channel 12.

Music and Worship Life at St. John's

From the Choir Loft

It's that time of year again: back to school sales, Jesse James Days, State Fair, and the beat goes on... Things are beating at St. John's as well as we ramp up for the 2013-2014 program year. Please note the listing of first rehearsals for our choirs below. As I wrote last month, we need new singers in our adult choir, the Chorale, and the support of parents encouraging participation in our choirs for children and youth if the wonderful choral tradition at St. John's is to survive. As the old hymn goes, **Now Is the Hour**.

The beginning of the St. John's program year also marks the beginning of our year of the hymn which I wrote about in the June VOICE. Thanks to those who responded to my request for a list of 10 significant hymns. Many had a hard time limiting it to 10! There's still time to share your thoughts and list by email to ferg@stolaf.edu.

All of the respondents included delightful recollections of experiences singing and learning some of their favorites. "Almost all of these hymns I remember singing since childhood." or "My mother lived to be almost 99... she would lie in bed and softly sing her favorite hymns." or "I was blest in that my pastor had us memorize one hymn a week during my last year of confirmation."

A common thread in the texts of many of the hymns shared with me is an affirmation of God's continuing presence with us, God's love for us, God as ultimate source of "our hope for years to come."

And so for the first three of our hymns I've selected *Praise to the Lord, the Almighty*, *A Mighty Fortress* and *Now Thank We All Our God*. All three were listed by our respondents and I like to call them "Beefsteak Hymns" – strong texts with sturdy tunes – hymns that have endured over many generations. My hope is that we all will memorize (if we don't know them already) at least one stanza of each and that parents will sing these (or read them) with their kids – that cross generational thing.

We will begin with *Praise to the Lord*. Are beefsteak hymns too sophisticated for children? Do we expect children to understand all the theological implications of Holy Communion before they may participate in the sacrament? A little bit of protein in our hymnic diet is good for all. Perhaps pondering one of these texts as a family could provide a wonderful teaching, bonding in the faith moment for a family.

So, let's begin:

*Let all who hear, now to God's temple draw near,
Joining in glad adoration*

Listening Session on Sunday, September 29th

Same-sex marriage became legal in Minnesota on August 1, 2013. Earlier this summer Pastors Johnson and Mandsager came to the council and asked for congregational direction, should they be asked to perform a same-sex marriage. The council wanted to give immediate guidance to the pastors so they could respond to any questions they might receive. In doing so, the council reviewed the constitution and by-laws and said that the pastors should act within the guidelines of the constitution. **What does this mean?** This means that pastors are to assess readiness and officiate at a wedding as they would with any couple, including pre-marital counseling and preparation for entering marriage.

The council also felt it was important to understand the will of the congregation and is seeking member input on this policy. A listening session was held in June and another listening session will be held Sunday, September 29 at 9:50 a.m. in St. John's Hall. We encourage all congregation members to attend this listening session so we can hear from the congregation.

Direct Debit Giving: Direct debit giving is an electronic transfer of funds (EFT) that is fast, secure and a convenient way to give donations directly to St. John's Lutheran Church. With your authorization, your bank will automatically withdraw your contributions from either your checking account or your savings account. You can download an EFT Authorization Form and return it to the Church Office. Whether you wish to give at regular intervals or as a one-time gift, you can decide how much and how often to give. You will need to provide the bank routing number and account number as they appear at the bottom of your check or savings deposit slip. A voided check or slip can be attached to the registration form you get from the Church Office.

Online Giving: The online giving program has some new and exciting features. By having your own profile you will be able to manage your account at any time and any day. No waiting for someone in the office during normal office hours. Treasurers Update

June envelope giving totaled \$68,794, raising year-to-date receipts to \$370,690. This puts us slightly behind our targeted half-year goal for envelope offerings of \$380,000.

GOOD STEWARDSHIP OF GOD'S PEOPLE IN THE FACE OF DISASTER

Emergencies can happen without warning, even at St. John's! Being prepared physically and psychologically to handle accidents or disasters is an individual and a church responsibility. Your safety is of primary importance!

The Faith & Health Board has developed emergency procedures in the event of weather, medical, or fire emergencies. In addition, maps have been produced which contain pertinent information for each floor at St. John's, identifying the location of fire extinguishers, first aid kits, the defibrillator, emergency exits, etc., as well as identification as to the specific area in which you may be located.

Each room at St. John's has both the emergency plan and the appropriate maps posted. Weather radios and flash lights have also been strategically placed throughout the building.

Please take a moment to familiarize yourself with the postings so you too may be prepared should a disaster occur. And be sure to notice that a **storm shelter** is identified as an evacuation area in the halls on the lower level.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE SOCIAL STATEMENT PASSES AT ASSEMBLY

On August 16, at the 2013 Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA in Pittsburg, the proposed social statement "The Church and Criminal Justice: Hearing the Cries" was adopted by a vote of 882 to 25. The vote was the culmination of work begun in 2008, by authorization of the 2007 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

Cynthia Osbourne, chair of the task force that developed the study materials and subsequent drafts of the statement, said that "a deep concern among ELCA members over the massive levels of incarceration in the United States" led to the statement.

The statement commends positive aspects of the US system while recognizing the urgency of reform needed in some areas. Osborne cites the high incarceration rates in the US as one such area. The US ranks among the top 2 or 3 countries in the world in percentage of people under control of a criminal justice system—one out of 31 adults and, for people of color, as high as one out of 11, she said. The statistics come from harsh sentencing and persistent inequalities based on class and race.

Due process of law and the presumption of legal innocence are among the fundamental principles of the US system that the statement supports.

An important part of the statement is its call to ELCA members to respond to the current conditions: to hear with compassion the cries of those affected (both victims and perpetrators suffer), to advocate for restorative justice, to offer accompaniment and hospitality to overcome the prejudices communities hold toward those affected, to work to correct the flaws in the system.

"Our nation's struggle with the question of how to respond to crime is lively," according to Osbourne. "The criminal justice system needs to be remade new."

At the September 22 St. John's Forum Greg Colby will review major points in the document and Chuck Jacobson will lead a discussion of ways we can respond to the challenges in the current system.


