GROUNDED: Living into the Season of Lent

This March 5, we begin the season of Lent with hearing the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Our mortality issues a wake-up call to the reality of our limits, and grounds us in the essentials of our faith as we move with Jesus from death to new life.

The season of Lent was the historic time of preparation for baptism. In this time the church would formally introduce new candidates to the community, and prepare them to enter the waters of baptism for the first time. For all of us, these 40 days offer an opportunity to "return to the Lord our God," and to formative acts of prayer, giving and fasting.

We gather on Sundays around five thick, rich texts which speak of the Gospel's transformative power. Each image is worth dwelling in for more than a day, asking how the Spirit might be calling us *this* year to receive the gifts of new life in Christ. I invite you to return to these stories outside of Sunday worship. Those who wish are invited to share open conversation about the Gospel with me over soup supper on Wednesdays.

At 6:30 each Wednesday night, we will gather in a simple service of Marty Haugen's Holden Vespers, and hear reflections from five members of St. John's about what grounds them in the reality of our humanity and the promises of God. So often, life determines for us what will ground us, but God's gift of grace is always enough to bring healing and life.

LENT IS BAPTISMAL PREPARATION TIME

This Lent, St. John's will offer an inquirer's group for those who are new to the Lutheran tradition, returning to church community, or new to the Christian faith altogether. How Stephen Ministers Care for Children and Teens

Stephen Ministers are trained to work with adults who are dealing with stresses or challenges, but not with children or teens. However, the well-being of children and teens may become an important concern for Stephen Ministers when they care for parents or grandparents struggling with family problems.

Here are the kinds of Stephen Ministry assignments that involve children and teens:

- —A mother of two has separated from the children's father and is overwhelmed by the tasks before her every day at home and at work.
- —A stay-at-home mother of five worries that she often speaks sharply to her children and to her husband; also that her children treat her disrespectfully.
- —The father of a toddler feels excluded by his wife from the care of their son and from decisions about the child's welfare.
- —A happily married woman eagerly awaiting the birth of their first child is full of anxiety about the birth itself and the changes a baby will bring into their lives.
- —A grandmother is distraught over a custody suit between her daughter and her estranged husband.
- —A widow on a small pension who lives with a chronic medical condition is drawn into her adult children's daily problems; she is often asked to provide child care or grocery money and to settle disputes between teens and parents.

Music and Worship Life at St. John's

FROM THE ORGAN BENCH...

I think there is a song that begins, "Spring will be a little late this year." In 2014 we could revise the lyrics to "Lent will be a little late this year." As I write these words on another cold, February morning, both texts seem appropriate.

So, tell me, what will be your Lenten discipline this year? Growing up I had a good friend who was Roman Catholic and this Swedish Baptist was curious about Lent since this season was ignored in my church. "So, Gary, I understand you are supposed to give up something for Lent, what will it be this year?" "Driving," was his quick reply. Since he was 14 and Ohio's legal age was 16, his Lenten discipline did not impress me all that much. The next year I asked again. "Watermelon," was his reply. Now in the 50ties, where in Ohio would one find watermelon in the middle of winter?! I asked about the driving and he explained that it had come to mean too much for him to give it up again.

Hmm — Lent is a challenging time for church staff. Instead of being a quieter time for stillness, reflection, self-examination, it is always more hectic and busy: extra services, extra sermons, extra rehearsals, Holy Week to plan, etc. But then, who is not too busy these days? When **do** we find time for that Lenten introspection, that "amending of our ways" which is part of a Lenten discipline?

My hope and prayer for us all is that we will find time for Lent, participate in the Wednesday soup suppers and the brief worship after. Rethink the schedule and carve out just a bit of time each day to be still, either as family or individually. One Lenten discipline that has been meaningful for me is to seek out a quiet place and open the Bible or the hymnal to the Psalms and let serendipity (or the Spirit) guide my finger to a particular Psalm. Then I read or chant it aloud – this slows the flow of the words, gives me time to savor them. Then, I'm just still for a few minutes. Many Christian brothers and sisters speak of "praying the Psalms" and in this spirit, after a time of silence, I say, "Amen."

May your souls be warmed this Lenten season.



Typically, in such situations what the parents or grandparents need most is a listening ear to help them sort through these problems and come up with their own steps toward solution. But sometimes beneath the first issue lies a tangle of emotional problems or a deeply dysfunctional family. In those cases the Stephen Minister would help the care receiver get the needed professional care. The Stephen Minister might continue to walk with the care receiver, or the relationship might end by mutual agreement. Either way a Stephen Minister will have guided a care receiver (and one or more children or teens) out of a dark place and toward a place of light and hope.

If you or someone you know might benefit from talking about family problems with a SM, who will listen without judging and maintain strict confidentiality, please call one of the pastors (645-4429) or Pam Schwandt (645-6120).

Women of the Cannon River Conference at St. Johns

A **SPRING GATHERING** will be held at St. John's on Saturday, April 12, 2014 - - even if spring doesn't arrive in time. The women of the Cannon River Conference (one of the five 'river' conferences of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod of the ELCA) have invited several campus pastors to speak about their work. Pastor Corrine from Winona, Pastor Tammy from Mankato, Chaplain Brian from St. Peter and a representative from the congregation at St. Olaf will give us a picture of Lutheran Campus Ministry. It is a way in which our church has pastors on 180 state and private colleges and connects with 400 campuses nationwide through contact pastors. This ministry is on or near campuses and is for students, faculty and staff. It is a place where people can struggle together over questions and difficult events encountered in daily life. Just as we do within a congregation, people discuss, eat, serve and pray together, gaining strength from each other as followers of Jesus Christ . This gathering would be a good opportunity for both parents and students contemplating college to hear and to ask questions.

WELCA (Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) has been looking at the many ways generations can connect and interact, and this gathering of women from several Lutheran churches continues that emphasis with the speakers. It is also carried out in all the music for that day. The Northfield Youth Choir will sing, a Quintet of women from St. John's - - Kristen Partlo, Elizabeth Bade, Ruth Smestad Anglin, Ruth Legvold, and Nancy Ordahl Kmoch - - will sing, and Donna Paulson will lead us joyfully along with her piano playing.

Coffee and rolls will be served during registration, 8 – 9 AM, lunch will be served at 11:30 AM. People can preregister on forms in a packet on the WELCA board in the Commons, or on the day, April 12. Adults are \$12.00, students \$5.00 for lunch and program. An offering will be taken and given to the following: Crossroads Campus, Mankato; Gustavus Adolphus Campus, St. Peter; Lutheran Campus Ministry, Winona; and St. Olaf Campus Ministry, Northfield.

Recently, my husband and I were talking about Lenten practices in the congregations where we grew up. It was a fun conversation that brought to mind such things as the mid-week worship (mandatory for one of us during confirmation years), Lenten denial offering boxes, attending a performance of the Messiah during Holy Week, Good Friday when businesses and stores were closed from 12pm to 3pm, three-hour come-and-go worship services and being part of the high school choir that was present throughout the three hours and sang during each segment of the "seven last words," being a member of the high school choir which joined the adult choir during Lent and sitting next to your math teacher, seeing him in a whole different light. No doubt many can relate to some of these remembrances and add many more of their own which are now imbedded on the hard drives of our minds.

While Lenten observances have changed over the years in many places...and in some congregations they have been dropped altogether, at St. John's we are fortunate to have Lenten practices. We are able to come together to enjoy a soup supper and conversation and then gather for Evening Prayer. In addition, we can choose to participate in a book read and small group conversation about it. Each of these opportunities provides for us the added bonus of creating community and nurturing relationships...it's a good place to be.

Mission Statement:

To mobil ize women to act boldly

Women of the ELCA (WELCA) includes ALL women of St. Johns!

The study theme for 2013-2014 is "In Good Company: Stories of Biblical Women" by Kay Ward.

When the women of the church gather together in small groups for Bible study, we concentrate on stories and words that have come to us from the past, about people who are essentially like us living in times very different from ours. When we gather together in a large group we often hear from people living now, with issues and problems unique to our complicated and complex culture. Both times are ways of making us aware of the possibilities of ways we can live as Christians. On Thursday, March 6, we will hear from **Tammy Filzen** as she tells us about "**Whispers of Hope**." This is both an idea and a place, a residential and non-residential facility where young women who have suffered abuse, depression, or unwanted pregnancy can gain self-control and self-respect. A 22-week residential program for ages 16 – 21 will include life-skills training, biblical teaching, mentoring, chores and self-reflection; non-residential counseling will be available to girls/young women ages 14 – 25. Tammy has already come a long way toward realizing the dream she has had of such a facility, for it will be on a beautiful farm near Faribault. Much has been done to be able to begin this ministry this summer. We expect her excitement will be contagious. Our program begins at **1:00 PM on Thursday, March 6**. Lydia Circle will serve refreshments.

Women at St. John's have responded to the continuing need in countries facing war, starvation, floods or earthquakes with quilts, baby care kits, and health kits. The last **quilts** delivered to the warehouse in the cities were quickly packaged into plastic-wrapped bales and loaded into ocean freight containers - - 40 quilts in a bale, 280 bales in a container with 5 containers (about 56,000 quilts!) being shipped to the east coast, intended for ocean shipping to Africa. This kind of Lutherans-working-together started during WWI, increased in WWII and continues today.

Our **April** program will be held on Saturday, April 12, not on our regular first Thursday of the month. Women from Lutheran churches all around us are invited to be part of a full morning of hearing from campus pastors, music and having lunch. (See article on p.) In **May**, we will hear from Sister Judy from Rochester on her involvement with countering human trafficking. We will also be electing new officers at that meeting.

Action and Advocacy

At our February 3 Peace & Justice meeting Angela Brewer mentioned the following possible projects for us as we consider action and advocacy for the needs of our criminal justice system. They will be the focus of our meeting at 7:00 p.m., March 3, in the Fireside Room.

- —Community Impact Panel
- —Drug Court
- —Truancy project
- —Legislative effort to expand diversion, to take cases involving 16 and 17 year olds out of public hearing and making them confidential again.
- —Partnering with the Northfield Alternative Education Center
- —Rice County Community Corrections workforce group that helps felons about to be released from prison with clothing and/or job interview assistance.

Ms Brewer identified the biggest needs as employment and/or employment training, apprenticeships, and on the job training.

Greg Colby, who has been a leader in our 2 year study, suggests that the workforce group would be a good place for us to start. He says, "It calls for limited assistance, concrete and defineable effort and limited contact. [which would make it easier for individuals or groups to render assistance and aid] However, we also need to consider proactive steps in helping troubled youth. I am a strong believer in prevention and working to avoid major problems."

Please join us for this continuing discussion. Everyone is welcome to participate, whether or not they have been at any other meeting.

Day on the Hill

The Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC) **Day on the Hill** is a day when clergy and laypersons, community leaders and congregation members gather in St. Paul to learn about social justice issues being debated and voted upon by the Minnesota Legislature.

This year more than 800 participants are expected to assemble at **8:30 a.m.** in the St. Paul RiverCentre on Thursday, March 13. A keynote address will be given by Rabbi David Saperstein of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, Washington, DC, and briefings on legislation will be given by JRLC Executive Director Brian Rusche. Following table discussions organized by legislative district, participants will be bussed to the Capitol for a brief program in the Rotunda and scheduled meetings with senators and representatives. JRLC regards Day on the Hill as a "cornerstone to our collective commitment to social justice …as informed, active, hope-filled advocates" visit with legislators about "laws and policies that protect human dignity, especially among the vulnerable and powerless."
