## **Ruth Legvold to Retire**

After 28 years of leadership of St. John's high school Laudate Choir, director Ruth Legvold will retire this spring. Under Ruth's direction, hundreds of St. John's youth have learned the pleasure of expressing their faith through music and leading the congregation in song. Ruth says, "The greatest blessing for me...has been to work with our high school aged singers. They have become very dear to me and I will miss seeing them every Wednesday evening and every other Sunday morning."

Ruth's service to St. John's has been a vital part of our music ministry here and a unique feature of this congregation's outreach over the years. This past Palm Sunday, a visitor to St. John's responded to our Laudate singers reading of the Gospel and anthem: "Wow! That (high school singers and readers in leadership) would *never* happen at my church." This is part of St. John's ministry that our congregational leadership is eager to nurture and see continued after Ruth's retirement.

It is a bittersweet thank you we say as we celebrate Ruth's ministry this month, for she has been a key link to so many of our students over the years. As she directs the choir for the last time in worship on Sunday, May 18, we hope to welcome back a number of former high school choir members. Please join us in thanking Ruth for her many years of service and thanking God for her gifts among us. We know, as is usually the case at St John's, that in retirement she will find new and vital ways to continue to bless us all.

# Stephen Ministers Learn about Caring for Families with Special Needs Children

St. John's Stephen Ministers meet regularly for continuing education classes to learn more about specific caregiving situations. At the April meeting, the group learned about ministering to families with special needs children and examined the following issues:

- · Grief When a child with special needs is born, parents often encounter feelings of grief because they had been looking forward to the birth of the child they thought they would have. Having a special needs child means parents need to adjust to a new reality. Feelings of grief are ongoing and emerge periodically as the child grows and is unable to experience the same milestones and opportunities as other children.
- · Anger Feelings of anger surface when dealing with the reality parents face raising special needs children. There is no map for dealing with such children so often times information must be passed along from parent to parent.
- · Frustration Parents encounter frustration in trying to deal with barriers the family and child encounter, involving education and social services for their child. Parents have the added stress that when their children are finished with high school and deserve to be out on their own as much as possible, there is no housing available. Group homes in our area are full and the state has put a moratorium on establishing new homes.

## **UPDATE FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE**

The Organist/Director of Music, Worship & Arts search has proceeded on schedule at a quick pace. The committee has worked long hours in a concentrated fashion since February 12, 2014. As of our April 7th deadline, we received 36 completed applications from candidates across the United States, Canada, South Korea, and the Ukraine. Additionally, a number of potential applicants wrote letters of inquiry about our church and/or our music position.

Two candidates have been invited to St. John's for final interviews and auditions Thursday through Saturday, May 8-10th. Interested congregation members are invited to sing along during the hymns and to listen to the live "mock church service/auditions" in the Sanctuary on Thursday evening, May 8th from 8:15-8:45 p.m. and Saturday morning, May 10th from 9:15-9:45 a.m. Immediately following each audition, there will be a short question and answer session with the candidate.

## Inquirers' Class An Experiment in Listening for Gods Call

In March, a dozen households began gathering together during Education hour on Sunday mornings. Families that have come to St. John's recently, many from traditions other than ELCA Lutheran, came together with sponsor families who have been members of St. John's for a while. Our gatherings have consisted of getting to know one another, sharing what's happening in life, and listening to the Sunday lectionary text with a process known as *lectio divina*. This process is an adaptation of the ancient catechumenate, the way the early church welcomed and formed those who were entering the Christian community.

In a world where we can no longer assume whether a person has a church background, much less an understanding of Lutheranism, the modern catechumenate is designed to be about *formation* instead of *information*. We are formed together, no matter what our background, into a body by our worship, fellowship and prayer together. In this interactive way of intentional welcoming, we expect that God is doing something in and through the newcomers among us as they become part of Christ's body here. In some parts of the country, this process has transformed dying "established" churches into lively communities of mission and welcome.

On May 4 we will mark one milestone in this process with the Rite of Welcome, a prayer and blessing for newcomers with the sign of the cross. Some of our inquirers' will be affirming their baptisms, or be baptized for the first time, on Pentecost Sunday, June 8.

How exciting it is to help welcome a new couple into life at St. John's! We look forward to this time where we get to learn more about each other in the context of reading a passage from that Sunday's bible passages. The ancient practice of "Lectio Divina" ("divine reading") in our small groups opens us up to hear where the Spirit is calling us. As we discuss our understanding of the Word as it applies to us personally we also have the precious opportunity to peek into each other's hearts and worlds. We feel drawn together through the experience and last Sunday, two in our group, a man and a woman, described how meaningful the Inquirers Class has been and a desire for it to continue.

To be honest, it was hard for us when we walked through the doors of St. John's over 10 years ago. We were drawn to the deep liturgical tradition, the incredible music and strong preaching. But it was hard getting to know people, hard to find our place in the community. Over the past 7 weeks, as part of the Inquirers Class, we've gathered around the Word with several who are exploring St. John's as a their church home, returning to the faith, exploring baptism for their children or looking to affirm their own baptism. It was a bit of a risk for us at first, and certainly felt a bit intimidating wondering what we might have to offer to others. Far from being intimidating, it has been an absolute joy. In these gatherings we have gone past the ordinary small talk of strangers getting to know each other and, using the Gospel texts of the week as a catalyst for sharing thoughts, wonderment, and knowledge, we've built a deeper and stronger connection with each other – an intimacy developed that allowed for the opening of our hearts, deepened our inquiry and nurtured our souls. What a delight it has been to witness the intelligent (and sometimes delightfully irreverent and humorous) way the Word is discussed in this group. It has made us realize how much we have taken for granted - how little effort we've made in the past to truly understand what we believe, to relate it to our own lives, to reach out to others. Through the Inquirers group we have found ourselves listening more deeply. We have witnessed that as others have opened up and shared their journeys, we have found the courage, motivation and inspiration to share ours...to realize we are all wrestling with similar questions and on similar paths of exploration. Walking with other Inquirers we have discovered a warm and welcoming environment that we hope we can extend to others who knock on St. John's door. Nancy Ordahl Kmoch and Brad Kmoch

Please join us for this fun filled celebration which closes out our youth choir season. Everyone is welcome!


# New Facilities Manager to Begin this Month

This month St. John's welcomes Tim Byers as our new Facilities Manager. Tim, a long-time resident of Faribault, comes to us with a wealth of experience in building management as well as construction. He will be responsible for regular cleaning and maintenance of our building and will work with the Properties and Grounds Committees on ongoing projects. Don Thompson, our former Facilities Manager, will continue to contract with St. John's overseeing our restoration project.

## **Tuckpointing Update**

Good progress is being made on the Tuckpointing project at St. John's! At times there will be dust and noise during the weekdays around the sanctuary - this is a sign of progress. Building Restoration has now been working a couple of weeks and have been working tearing down the old damaged bricks and concrete. They will then go through a phase of rebuilding what they have torn down. This will be happening repeatedly as they work around the oldest parts of the church. They will be replacing damaged bricks as well as larger pieces of preformed block. The bricks are now on site, but the pre-cast blocks will be taken offsite, formed, and replaced as the new ones are created.

There will be times where entrances to the sanctuary will be closed. Please read the signs and do not exit or enter those closed areas. Your cooperation is much appreciated.

# Mission Outreach

## Special Offering in May for Lutheran World Relief

The special giving envelope in May is designated for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). The goal for St. John's is to raise a minimum of \$4000 for LWR. Last year St. John's members donated \$8,703! The total amount is sent to LWR. LWR coordinates relief and development projects around the world on behalf of Lutherans in the United States. In 2013 LWR reached out to 7.7 million people in 35 countries through 185 projects in the areas of agriculture, emergency response aid, water access and quality, the environment, and health care including malaria eradication. Apart from emergency relief, LWR development projects try to focus on the root causes of

Waiting in line to get into the concert hall, we struck up a conversation with another person standing there. One topic led to another, first about what drew us to the concert we came to hear, then to where we each lived and eventually to the realization that we had some common acquaintances. It was a lively conversation that took place over the course of about 10 minutes, and eventually it began to develop into a new friendship.

Perhaps the most valuable lesson from that chance meeting is the reminder that everyone has a story. When, in conversation, we begin to share our story, even bits and pieces in a ten-minute exchange, we begin to discover the common humanity which ties us to one another. I remember a time when a young mother shared what she thought was a unique problem she was having with a toddler, only to find out that several others in the group had experienced the same thing. At that moment she realized she was not alone in her feelings but was part of a community of understanding and support.

A congregation is a community of relationships uniquely woven by the events and life passages which bring us together. We gather to worship, share a meal, learn and serve. We surround one another for a baptism and at the time of death. In and through such experiences we get to know one another and receive strength, support, and encouragement for each day. ## From the Peace and Justice group

*Development Works* is a project of Bread for the World Institute that can help us to understand the realities of global hunger and poverty and the efforts of the U.S. and allies among developed countries to lift millions out of misery and deprivation. Here is another selection from the project's list of "Myths and Realities."

Myth: The U.S. provides more than its fair share of development assistance.

**Reality:** Multilateral programs are supported financially by a variety of donors. For example, the L'Aquila global agriculture initiative includes not only pledges of \$3.5 billion over three years from the U.S. and \$3 billion each from Germany and Japan, but also \$2 billion from the Netherlands (population 16.7 million) and \$1 billion from Canada (population 34.7 million).

The U.S. saves millions of lives every year with programs like child immunizations, PEPFAR, and food aid. There is no doubt that our efforts make a big difference. But the amount the U.S. gives per person is less than average for donors and far less than Scandinavian countries. Preliminary data for 2011 indicate that Sweden and Denmark devoted more than 1 percent of their national income to development assistance. The U.K. gave 0.56 percent, the average for 23 donor countries was 0.46 percent, and the U.S. was near the bottom of the list at 0.2 percent.
