MUSIC SEARCH ANNOUNCEMENT

The St. John's Lutheran Church Music Search Committee is pleased to announce the appointment of Nathan Proctor to the full-time position of Organist/Director of Music, Worship & Arts.

Nathan has been serving as the Associate Director of Music at White Memorial Presbyterian Church in Raleigh, North Carolina since 2009 and also as the Music Leader at the Montreat Conference Center in Montreat, North Carolina since 2010. During his time in his full-time position at White Memorial, Nathan has worked with all ages of singers from first graders through adults. Additionally, he has served as organist, pianist, cantor, directed a children's handbell choir, and shared the responsibility of directing an adult handbell choir. (Nathan's colleague at White Memorial is a respected handbell authority. Nathan took advantage of this opportunity by playing in the adult handbell choir under this person's direction for a year and half before taking over part of the handbell program himself).

Nathan received a Master of Music Degree in Organ Performance from Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana in 2008. His organ professor at Indiana was Larry Smith, a legendary fine organ teacher. In 2006 Nathan graduated from St. Olaf College with a Bachelor of Music Degree in Church Music. While at St. Olaf, he studied organ with John Ferguson; choral conducting from Anton Armstrong and Robert Scholz; and he sang in the Viking Chorus, the St. Olaf Cantorei, and the St. Olaf Choir.

Some of you might recognize Nathan, as he served as a summer organist here in 2006 and was the Assistant Director for the Troubadours Choir of the Northfield Youth Choirs from 2004-2006.

Passionate about worship, Nathan Proctor promises to energize the congregation through his music ministry. He plans to move to Northfield and join our congregation in August.

Part of being a member of St. John's is caring for members of our church family. Because God in Christ cares for us, we care for one another, in many different ways.

Through prayer we bring the needs and concerns of people in our congregation before God. This may happen through the prayer chain or in the prayers at Sunday morning worship. And of course, many of us remember one another in our own prayers.

Another way we take care of one another is through small group ministries. These groups meet regularly and often allow us to become more closely acquainted with one another's joys and sorrows. Every small group at St. John's can form a circle of care around its members, whether it is a church board, a circle, a choir, or a small group ministry.

We also care for one another by reaching out through notes, visits, and telephone calls. We employ these when we learn that a member of the congregation is sick or hospitalized or bereaved. It is especially important to reach out in these ways when we notice that people usually at church services are no longer attending. A statement like, "We miss seeing you at church," tells them that they are important members of our church family.

We remain on track as we began interviewing candidates the week of May 19.




Letters will go out to parents three to four weeks in advance detailing specific times, cost, and if any specific clothing is necessary for the event. We hope you join us!



Special Offering in May for Lutheran World Relief

The special giving envelope in May is designated for Lutheran World Relief (LWR). The goal for St. John's is to raise a minimum of \$4,000 for LWR. Last year St. John's members donated \$8,703! The total amount is sent to LWR. LWR coordinates relief and development projects around the world on behalf of Lutherans in the United States. In 2013 LWR reached out to 7.7 million people in 35 countries through 185 projects in the areas of agriculture, emergency response aid, wa-



ter access and quality, the environment, and health care including malaria eradication. Apart from emergency relief, LWR development projects try to focus on the root causes of poverty – in an effort to follow Christ's call to love our neighbor and to care for the least of these. Letter from El Cocuy

April 11, 2014 - El Cocuy Boyacá

St. John's Lutheran Church, Minnesota

May the Resurrected Lord continue filling you with his grace and an abundant life in Him.

We greet you with a fraternal embrace in Christ, thankful for the brotherhood that you have maintained with us during these past years, we constantly remember you in our prayers and give thanks to God for the blessing it has been to us.

We wish to inform you that we received the economic resources that you sent from the estate of our sister Val Hallen of \$42,000, which in Colombian pesos is \$76,440.00 and with these resources we are now beginning to develop the project of repair and improvement of Celco Cocuy (i.e. the school), at this time we are reinforcing the security of the school by: installing a metal grating in the ceiling over the technology room of 3.50 by 7.00 meters, we are reinforcing the doors of the classrooms and the entrance to the main patio by putting in new panels and metal pins, also in the office of the school, they installed two metal grates, one in the library and the other in the rectory. In total 7 sheets of good quality have been installed.

The upgrade of the two bathrooms we will accomplish during the vacation period at the end of the year, the end of June and beginning of the month of July.

In another communication we will try to send a photographic report.

From Bread for the World Development Works Series...

Development Works from Bread for the World Institute is a series of messages and reports supplying information about global hunger and poverty issues. The intent is to equip us with knowledge and understanding, separating myth from reality, as we advocate with elected representatives as individuals, congregations and synods for policies that will reduce hunger and poverty.

Myth: U.S. leadership on development isn't really essential.

Reality: U.S. leadership leverages additional funding from other donors. Conversely, U.S. withdrawal from development initiatives sends a signal that often leads to a decrease in support from other donors as well. At the end of the 1980s the U.S. cut back its support for agricultural development leading to a decline in support from other developed countries. Recently USAID told Congress that it is increasing its contributions to multilateral funds to combat AIDS, tuberculosis and malaria knowing that each U.S. dollar will generate \$2, \$3, or \$4 from other sources.

In opening our memory boxes we usually find that the real treasure there is people-the people we have met and known and the relationships we have formed and shared. Each of us has stories to tell-stories which in some way have shaped and informed who we are even

"Two are better than one" is an idea that stands behind the strong leadership among women in St. John's WELCA. At the May meeting, new women were added to the group of officers who will continue serving the next year. Jane Gelle and Genevieve Quarberg moved from vice-president into president's position while Shirley Keltto and Jo Franklin went off the board after 2 years of loyal service. Carol James will continue as secretary and Barbara Walters will continue as treasurer. Anita Hellie and Mary Hoff will be co-vice-presidents. There are three mission positions which really do much of the work within the women's group. (Since the national office has just changed the name designations I will include both old and new names.) Debbie Becker will be going off as Mission Growth/Justice co-chair after two years of helping produce wonderful programs while Solveig Zempel will continue along with Mary Beth Beck. For Mission Community/Discipleship chair, Carol Benson will stay on, adding Jo Dahlin, while Anita Hellie became co-vice president. Norma Gilbertson and Judy Pinc will continue serving as co-chairs of Mission Action Stewardship.

The May program was about the increasing crime of human trafficking. The WELCA board, meeting with circle chairs, voted to send \$500 from Thrivent gifts to Mission 21 for its work on behalf of young women who are rescued from this criminal world. Many of this past year's programs have been concerned about women and children, about education, in Rice County and the world. This theme was part of the idea behind 'mission growth/justice.'

Next year, the women planning the programs are focusing on "immigration." St. John's started out as immigrants, which we will look at by going to the immigrant rural churches Holden, Valley Grove, and Vang. We are so fortunate that we will be led by our own church historian Joe Shaw. Put that on your calendar for October 2. We will also look at the significant efforts on the part of St. John's members working with refugees and immigrants, especially after WWII. And again we will call on one of our own, De Ane Lagerquist, Professor of Religion at St. Olaf to lead us. Put that on your calendar for September 4.

But first, there's the summer. Two women from St. John's, **Jane Rinehart** and **Christy Hall-Holt**, will be attending the WELCA Triennial Convention July 24 – 27, in Charlotte, North Carolina. The Thrivent gift also made it possible for us to send two women. We wish them God-speed and a thrilling experience to be with so many other Lutheran women from all over the country.

Summer means schedules for women's groups stop - - - except for quilting! Those busy fingers will continue on the third Monday and Thursday of each month. Some circles will meet for lunch or picnics. If you have a group of friends who would like to be a part of a circle Bible study, WELCA will help you start a new one!

At the synod assembly on May 2-3, our churches were given the challenge to partner together to end food insecurity in southeastern Minnesota by 2020. As people of faith, God calls us to work together to feed the hungry.

In our synod, 62,750 people (9.8%) are food insecure. Bishop Delzer and other speakers urged us to work together as a synod, so we can truly cause a decline in hunger rates throughout our region.

By educating one another about the depth of the issue, creating realistic action plans, strengthening existing networks, and sharing stories of success, **we can truly impact change!** This endeavor will be an area of primary focus over the next six years.
