Where do St. John's benevolence offerings go? Each month we will feature a mission partner. This month meet Lutheran Disaster Response, which receives a portion of our monthly gifts to the SE Minnesota Synod.

Lutheran Disaster Response brings God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, we stay to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

[In response to Typhoon Haiyan in 2013], Lutheran Disaster Response received an outpouring of prayers and financial support. More than \$2.5 million was collected to directly respond to Typhoon Haiyan. Together, we were able to provide immediate need to people and communities affected, and we continue to walk with our brothers and sisters in the Philippines who are still working to rebuild their lives and livelihoods.

Lutheran Disaster Response works with an extensive network of partners who are actively engaged with communities on the ground. Within days after the typhoon made landfall our trusted partner, Lutheran World Relief, was responding to those affected. And a year later, we are still there, continuing our work with Lutheran World Relief and working with the National Council of Churches in the Philippines.

Pastors' Page

Five years ago on my daughter's November birthday, I started one of those "line a day" 5 year journals. At the end of 2014 I have been reminded how much of my life at St. John's and in Northfield was still a mystery to me twelve months ago. I noted in that journal the day you called me as your pastor, the day we first saw the house we now live in, and meetings with staff members who are now people I see every day. It is more clear to me than ever that none of this work we call ministry even begins without faith that God is leading.

One year later, I'm excited that not everything in 2015 will be a "first." All of your faces —and most of your names — are familiar to me now, and behind those faces I now know many of your stories. We have been through some joys and sorrows together as a community, and both the gifts and challenges of this place are more familiar.

2015 will still have plenty of newness. This month we welcome a new staff member as Christy Hall-Holt begins work as our Shared Ministry Coordinator. Many of you will begin new tasks as you join boards or become new member sponsors. New faces will join us and we will celebrate new births. And, God willing, some time this year a new Associate Pastor will be called and installed at St. John's!

A pastor I know who spent over thirty years in the same parish once said, "I don't know why anyone feels the need to change calls. The church is always changing. Congregations never stay the same. There is always something new!" I'm not sure everyone can sustain his enthusiasm quite so well over decades, but it is an attitude I admire. God is indeed constantly making all things new.

If your spiritual life ever feels stale, I challenge you to do one thing new this month: say yes to a church task you haven't tried before; greet a person you've never met before; enter by a different doorway; go downstairs if you haven't witnessed our kids' programming, or check out an adult forum if you've never done that; come to a Wednesday night meal; pick up a daily devotional or read the texts for the coming Sunday. Within the circles of this congregation is a world of opportunity for growth, mission, and relationship. The Lord holds this new year in gracious hands.



Being a part of St. John's family is like coming home for me. I am a "grafted-in" Lutheran. Olaf, my husband, and his family of Norwegian (and a little Swedish!) descent have shared with me their nourishing cultural and spiritual heritage. After my birth in Kenya and a year in Idi Amin's Uganda (1972) I grew up in Ghana, West Africa, with multiple trips through Europe back to the States for furloughs. I feel like a "cultural mutt"! The years we've spent here in Northfield, with the warmth and welcome of St. John's, have been a source of continuity and stability.

One of the most significant ways I have grown to feel part of the St. John's community was through serving on the Children's Ministry board. Our daughters, Viveka (14) and Annelise (10) have been the beneficiaries of the solid education of our catechism and confirmation programs. I enjoy working with Julie Brehmer and the 4th and 5th graders on Wednesday afternoons with the DOG (Discovering Our Gifts) program. I joined the St. John's Chorale a year ago, and I enjoy taking a turn caring for little ones in the nursery during Sunday service. In July this year I attended the Women of the ELCA Triennial and came back excited to reach out to women of my generation at St. John's through the Women of the ELCA's Bold Café small group discussion and community (see www.boldcafe.org)

I have worked outside the home most recently as international student advisor at St. Olaf College (2010 - 2013). In earlier professional life, after graduating with a master's degree in international education, I worked as a management and employee development trainer in California at Hewlett-Packard (1998 - 2002). In the interim between working at St. Olaf and Hewlett-Packard, I focused on caring for our family during Olaf's two years as a research fellow in Stony Brook, NY, and as he transitioned into his career as a professor of computer science at St. Olaf.

I am so grateful for the opportunity to work with all of you as Shared Ministry Coordinator. One of my favorite things to do is meet new people, find out what is important to them, and help introduce them to others so they feel welcome. Another passion I have is to learn and grow spiritually alongside others. I am looking forward to putting these interests to use at St. John's. I invite you to share your ideas and vision for how our shared ministries can continue to thrive. Let's grow together!

From the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC) Annual Report

The 2014 session of the Minnesota Legislature was one of the most productive and most dramatic in JRLC history. Two key initiatives of JRLC's Family Economic Security agenda were passed into law: a healthy increase in the state's minimum wage, and an increase in the Working Family Credit and other targeted tax credits. Our interfaith coalition was one of three main sectors, along with non-profits and organized labor, that fueled the multi-year effort to gain the minimum wage increase. JRLC also led a strong effort to reform predatory payday lending.

JRLC also played a key role in securing over \$100 million in bonding authority for affordable housing and also helped secure \$1 million in bonding for human trafficking victim services.

N.B. Jennifer Nelson, Statewide Organizer for JRLC, will speak about JRLC, its 2015 legislative agenda and will take questions at the St. John's Forum on Sunday, January 25.

Evaluation of the Rice County Jail Library

Peace and Justice completed an evaluation of the Rice County Jail Library in November. We found that the jail library was seriously deficient in most subject areas. We found few if any texts in the following areas: biography, history or the sciences. The jail library does have 8 bibles but few religious or spiritual texts. It has some books of fiction: 9 science fiction, 4 military sci fi, 3 super hero fiction, 2 fantasy, 9 historical fiction, 9 military fiction, one juvenile fiction, and 16 mysteries. Its collection of ethnic materials is limited to three (one on an African American, one on a Native American and one regarding a Russian). There are only three small books in Spanish and believe it or not a German dictionary.

Keep in mind that we are talking about the county jail not the Minnesota Correctional Facility in Faribault which is the prison. Imprisonment can last from one year and a day to life, but incarceration in the county jail can last anywhere from a day or two to eight months. Jail is not like prison. It is far harder because there is so little to do. We believe that St. John's church can make a genuine contribution to the lives of those incarcerated or those who will be incarcerated in the future. We are in great need of Spanish language texts, African American stories, books by African American writers and some good literature. The jail administrator told us that they also need books about parenting and puzzles and games. These books need to be softbound for security reasons. Any book or puzzle donated can be placed in the box near the entrance to St. John's Hall. Peace and Justice appreciates your consideration of this request.

From Bread For the World

Throughout 2014, Bread has successfully been lobbying in Washington and in local districts on several food-aid reform initiatives and there have been significant gains in Congress. Among the gains is the farm bill authorizing \$80 million for purchases of food closer to the place of need and greater flexibility to use cash during emergencies. Another success is the introduction of the bipartisan Food for Peace Reform Act introduced in the Senate. Bread's goal remains to get the U.S. government to make hunger and poverty a priority by 2017 – a key step toward ending hunger in our country and worldwide by 2030.
