Listening for God's Voice

We ask God for guidance. Then we receive counsel, through a friend or as an inspiration from within. How do we know that this counsel comes from God? Might it also come from some other source: family messages, cultural expectations, childhood patterns, personal willfulness, wrongful desire? Does this counsel represent God's way, or some other way? How do we discern the voice of God?

Although there is no easy answer to these questions, one thing is certain: we are more likely to discern the voice of God if we read Scripture regularly and if we are in the habit of listening for the voice of God as it speaks to us personally in the Word. Listening to other people is a skill that can be cultivated, and so is listening to God. Stephen Ministers, early in their training, study a lesson called "The Art of Listening." Its point is to learn how to quiet our unruly selves so that we can be entirely present for our care receiver, to listen to that person with the whole heart and soul and mind, to listen without judgment and with love and understanding. Of utmost importance for listening to another person is this quieting of the self, quieting the chatter of the tongue and the clamor of the mind.

Christ is our standard. In Philippians 2 Paul says: "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness." This habit, of emptying the self and quieting the voice and mind, helps all of us minister to others by listening to them, but it also helps us listen to God, to discern God's voice and accept God's counsel.

Dear Friends,

Who am I in this story? It's a question I often find myself asking as I read Scripture. A study on how people listen to sermons once revealed that clergy are more likely to identify with Jesus when they hear a biblical story, asking questions about how he healed and taught and led. In contrast, many lay people said they saw themselves as part of the crowd, or maybe one of the disciples – if they could identify with anyone.

It's a question that haunts me especially around this time of year, because one of the uglier sides of Christian history has been the way Gentile Christians have read the passion story as the story of how "they" crucified our Lord. "They," in this case, were the Jews (even though only Romans had authority to execute). Thus we turn the eternal story of the world's redemption into suspect history about a particular group of people. One of the great shames of the Lutheran tradition were Luther's hateful rants about the Jews written near the end of his life.

With him Interestingly, though, the best of our tradition has always said we were in that crowd calling "Crucify him!" In J. S Bach's St. John Passion, the composer follows the chief

max = 1 priests' mocking and beating of Jesus with this chorale:

Jale On Jichend

Who has struck you so,
my Salvation, and with torments
so badly beaten you?

So badly beaten you?

After all, you are no sinner like us and our offspring.

Of misdeeds you know nothing.

, , , I, I and my sins,

Certainly as countless as the grains of sand on the seashore, have brought down on you

the misery that strikes you, and this grievous host of agonies.

In Johann Heermann's great hymn Ah Holy Jesus (ELW 349), the question "who brought this upon thee?" – the answer comes "Twas I, Lord Jesus, I it was denied thee. I crucified thee."

These texts remind us that "all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." We are still complicit in sin and suffering today. But equally so, Jesus' death and resurrection are *for us* today as well.

This is no history lesson. We experience Holy Week and Easter anew each year, bringing our sins and our own wounds with us. At the empty tomb, we are invited to be the disciples – astonished, overjoyed, and invited to touch the risen Christ's wounded hands. Then we are invited to **be** the *living body of Christ*, trusting that his death and new life are *for us*.

P.S. This season is also a time of remembrance of the Holocaust. See page 9 for details about events at Carleton College on April 19.


"On the Road" Summer Camp (K-4), August 2-6, St. Peter's Lutheran Church

St. John's Group Visits the Capitol

High School Youth and Peace and Justice attend the JRLC "Day on the Hill"

Six St. John's members spent Tuesday, March 10th, at the Capitol in St. Paul for the JRLC (Joint Religious Legislative Coalition) "Day on the Hill". Two high school students, Nicholas Gonnerman and Viveka Hall-Holt, joined Paul Peterson, Judith Stoutland, Hayden Kvamme and Mike Skunes for a day of briefings on important issues affecting Minnesota and for meetings with our state representatives.

The Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC) is an interfaith group including Jewish, Muslim, and Catholic representatives that draw on the shared values of many religions and denominations to be public policy advocates for social justice. On issues where there is broad consensus among religious organizations, JRLC makes recommendations for faith groups to advocate these issues with our state representatives on behalf of our congregations.

In the morning, the group met for breakfast, prayer, briefings, and a keynote address put on by the JRLC. This year's focus was on four primary issues including: increasing funding for child-care subsidies for low-income families, restoring voting rights to those being released from prison, advocating on behalf of victims of sextrafficking, and increasing funding for families in welfare-to-work programs. After being informed about these issues and being given time to discuss them with other residents from MN District 20, our group headed up to the Hill. We had very productive meetings with Senator Kevin Dahle and Representative David Bly as our group got to engage them in discussions around these issues and hear about what progress our representation was making in St. Paul.

Overall, it was a wonderful opportunity for our group (especially our students) to learn about issues of justice in our state, ways that we can put our faith into action, and to learn about the importance of flexing our democratic rights to be engaged with our government representation.

Yom HaShoah: The Annual Remembrance of the Holocaust

Yom HaShoah, the annual remembrance of the Holocaust, is marked this year by an event at Carleton College's chapel on Sunday, April 19 at 5 p.m. The speaker will be author Peter Grose, who has just published a new book on the amazing story of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon, "A Good Place to Hide: How One French Community Saved Thousands of Lives During WWII".

Church Council Approves Policy for Benevolence Grants

Upon recommendation of the Business Management Board and the Benevolence and Social Concerns Board, the Church Council has approved a policy for benevolence grants from St John's. The purpose of the policy is to ensure that St. John's is in compliance with government law and that projects supported have responsible management. Benevolence grants will be given only to domestic and international projects that have charitable 501-C3 status or are supported by the Southeastern Minnesota Synod or the ELCA churchwide. Exceptions to this policy will be reviewed by the Benevolence and Social Concerns Board and recommended to the Church Council for approval.

Bishop Steve Delzer Guest Preacher Visits St. John's on Sunday April 26th

On Sunday, April 26, Bishop Steve Delzer will be our guest preacher and lead the adult forum. This will be an opportunity to meet Steve, learn more about new initiatives, and get updates on continuing ministries in our synod.

Ending food insecurity in our Southeastern Minnesota Synod is the major synod-wide benevolence effort Steve has promoted. Last September he led a run to raise funds for this cause, and churches throughout the synod

have been sharing ideas and resources for eliminating hunger. Though St. John's has long contributed to the CAC food shelf and hosted the community Christmas Day Dinner, perhaps we can be inspired to find new ways to promote enough food for all.


The New Ministries Fund was started in the synod several years ago to support new churches. One of the more recent is a South Sudanese ethnic Dinka group in Rochester that developed a relationship with Rochester's Zumbro Lutheran Church and the synod. The Dinka came to the relationship with a history of a resilient faith that stood up to the horrors of civil war. Zumbro Lutheran brought some expertise on how to be a congregation in America. The Southeastern Minnesota Synod was able to connect the Dinka with five other South Sudanese worshipping communities throughout the synod (in Austin, Faribault, Owatonna, and Rochester) among three different tribes (Dinka, Nuer, and Anyuak).

The Southeastern Minnesota Synod and the ELCA have partnered together to provide financial support for this ministry. The monies for the synod's portion have come from a designated New Ministry Fund that exists outside the normal synodical budget. St. John's has designated \$5000 in our budget for New Ministries, and since our relationship with El Milagro in Minneapolis ended several years ago, this money has supported this synod fund.

In addition to the South Sudanese ministries, the New Ministry Fund underwrites a portion of a new **House Church ministry** that is emerging from Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Rochester. Many people in this day and age don't feel comfortable walking through the front doors of a church building. This ministry will take 'the church' out of the walls of a building and into people's homes.

FROM THE CALL COMMITTEE ...

On March 18, the congregation in meeting voted 191-1-0 to call Jonathan Davis as Associate Pastor.

The Call Committee's statement:

The Call Committee unanimously endorses the recommendation of Pr. Jonathan Davis for many reasons. High on the list are his gifts for preaching, teaching, and leadership in worship. In addition, his personal strengths of connectivity, collaboration and communication will be a great fit with Pastor Pam in moving our congregation forward. One of Jonathan's references who also knows Pam and her high caliber of preaching stated that the two together would make for a "lively pulpit".

Pr. Davis graduated from St. Olaf College in Northfield, MN in 2004 with a B.A. in religious studies. From 2003-2007, Pr. Davis served as Middle School Ministry Coordinator for Zumbro Lutheran Church in Rochester, MN. In 2011, he earned a Master of Divinity from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN and was ordained into parish ministry in June of 2011. Currently, Pr. Davis is serving as full time pastor of the two-point rural parish of Aurora and Trinity Lutheran churches in Owatonna, MN.

Strong passions for preaching and relationship building guide Pr. Davis throughout his ministry. He was awarded the Sheldon Tostengard Preaching Award and the Senior Preaching Award through Luther Seminary, and he continues to develop thought-provoking sermons. One of Pr. Davis' references commented that "he is an excellent communicator, preacher, and teacher. His preaching is based both in biblical text and world context. He is a strategic thinker who wants to make a difference in the world".

In his role as pastor, Jonathan believes one of his greatest gifts is in making connections with people and in connecting others. He seeks relationship in ministry opportunities through confirmation classes, small group/Bible study, inter-generational gatherings, and other forms of lay-person and pastoral congregational member care. Pr. Davis demonstrated his strength in relationship building at a broader level with his current two-point Parish where the churches were previously unconnected relationally. Jonathan helped to foster relationships between the members of both congregations and engaged them in a visioning process that resulted in a united parish that is moving forward together in mission through one mission statement shared by both churches. One student member of his current congregation emphasized that "this leader helped save my church and my sister church". She continued, "Pr. Davis goes above and beyond expectations, and is always willing to help".

Pr. Davis' gifts fit with the mission and ministry of St. John's as his strengths include: being welcoming, helping people to develop their spiritual life, building a sense of community (inter-generational), and being creative/innovative about his tasks. He has proficiencies and skills in speaking Spanish as well as in music performance (e.g. studied trumpet, sang in choir, and took voice lessons while at St. Olaf College).

Pr. Davis is married to Lauren, also a graduate of St. Olaf College and a pastor in Owatonna. They have a son, Elliot, and another child on the way. In his free time, Jonathan loves spending time with his family. He is an avid reader and also enjoys soccer, ultimate frisbee, rock climbing and musical theater. Their home is currently in the parsonage in Owatonna, but if called to St. John's, they plan to move to Northfield in the near future.

Climate Change for Making Peace

How can we work for peace? How can we choose which programs to take on? What can we do that makes a difference?

During the month of March, the justice calendar of Minnesota was full and challenging:

Thousands participated in the Noble Peace Prize Forum on March 6 to 8 in Minneapolis, hearing speakers and leaders from around the world who are—and have been for years—involved in understanding the critical issues and causes of conflict, and working to resolve them. Rallied by the JRLC, about a thousand gathered in St. Paul March 10 to focus concern on topics needing attention in this year's legislative session to alleviate hunger, housing, joblessness, and other debilitating conditions that prevent the goal of 'dignity for all' and to lobby their elected legislators for action. Here in Northfield there were meetings concerning alarming changes in the global climate, energy sources, causes of gender violence, actions of groups large and small in perpetrating injustice on others, persons lacking basic food and shelter.

In all of these situations, participants learned the details, were drawn to one great need or another, considered what they might as individuals or groups of individuals of varying sizes, do about it. The significance and numbers of issues could make one feel it was all beyond what any of us could do.

From the research for her book, *A Strategy for Peace*, the ethicist Sissela Bok suggests that a sustainable peace in communities from very small to global requires the absence of violence, the presence of honesty and truthfulness, dependability of one's word and action, the absence of excessive secrecy.

This four-part formula establishes a climate that can restore health to our globe and to our immediate environment. It is a climate change within us as individuals for our own deepest motivations and efforts. Everyone can participate in this important work without leaving home or hometown and it is a guide for those who go near and far to heal the wounds in our societies on all levels.

"I see all those who strive to reduce distrust as working for peace," Bok asserts. "Whether in government offices or at the negotiating table, with children or with adults, in religious or in political groups, in private or public life, the men and women who work to diminish the sway of violence, of deception, of breaches of faith, and of excessive secrecy are all doing the work of peace."

Furthermore, "They show that the opportunities for such work, should one so choose, are everywhere—and that change can begin, should one so choose, right away."

The choices and possibilities offered in the many meetings in March are important. But also important are the seemingly small choices we make in the routines of each day which can make a big difference in the climate of our towns and world.
