Stephen Ministry Q&A

How do I know whether I should request a Stephen Minister?

If you are looking for a caring, confidential friend with whom you can talk about the stresses of life, a Stephen Minister might be helpful to you. Common issues Stephen Ministers deal with include: the loss of a friend or loved one, illness, loneliness, moving, and a new baby.

How do I request a Stephen Minister?

To request a Stephen Minister, please contact one of the pastors at 645-4429 or Joan Halvorson at 645-8445.

How are Stephen Ministers assigned?

Assignments are based on who among Stephen Ministers without care receivers would be the best match for the individual.

Are women assigned to women Stephen Ministers and men assigned to men?

Yes. Care receivers are always assigned to a Stephen Minister of the same gender.

Do Stephen Ministers meet with couples?

No. Stephen Ministers are assigned to be a listening friend to one person. If both people in a relationship could benefit from a listening friend, both can request individual Stephen Ministers.

Can I request a Stephen Minister for my teenager?

Stephen Ministers are not assigned to teenagers. To explore resources for teenagers, contact one of the pastors.

Will I receive a Stephen Minister with expertise in my problem?

Possibly although not necessarily. What you will receive is a caring friend who will walk with you as you work through issues that are troubling you.

From our pastors ...

As many of you know, a new committee has been gathering regularly here at St. John's. You may know them as the Welcoming Task Force, or the Reconciling in Christ committee, or the Building an Inclusive Church group. Despite having a variety of names, the group has one purpose - to help us discern if St. John's is in a place to publicly welcome lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people. Another way to put it: do we want to become a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation. For those of you who don't know, an RIC congregation is one that creates an intentional welcome statement, reaching out to those who often feel alienated from the church. Creating a welcome statement is the first step in becoming Reconciling in Christ, and it specifically includes people from the LGBT community.

Although we as your pastors are both pretty new, we know that this conversation is not new at St. John's. Many times over the past decades St. John's has engaged conversations around welcome and sexuality, often at the same time as the larger church has studied and made decisions. The current RIC group has gathered as a response to conversations that began in 2013 around same-sex marriage. At that time the Church Council did listening sessions, and they heard that while we are not all in agreement on these issues, there was a willingness to keep talking. With the Church Council's blessing this spring, the RIC committee has been talking about how to continue these conversations in a life-giving way for our church.

You might be thinking, "All people are welcome at St. John's. Why do we need to single out those in the LGBT community?" The reality is that too often fear and misunderstanding dominate the public discussion about sexuality. As a result, many LGBT people will assume that they are not welcome in a church unless they hear otherwise.

There are plenty of questions for us to be asking...Who is welcome at St. John's and do they know and feel that they are welcomed? In light of recent changes to the marriage laws, will St. John's be a place where samegendered weddings are welcomed and celebrated? Who gets to decide - the pastors or the council or the congregation? If I don't agree with the recent decisions around sexuality - am I still welcome at St. John's? Faithful Christians reading the same Bible land on different sides of this topic - how does that work?

These are hard but good conversations for us to have. And we won't always be in agreement. But that's okay. In honest and respectful conversation about our differences, we will be challenged to return to the center of what makes us the body of Christ -- the grace we all are offered in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. God's grace will be sufficient to lead us through this unknown journey.

A couple of points of clarification:

We are at the beginning of a conversation, not the end. No decisions have been made, no votes have been taken. One primary recommendation of the Reconciling in Christ process is to move deliberately without forcing a particular timeline.

This is a congregational process. While some members are taking the lead in setting the table for conversations, the congregation will be included in the decision process along the way on whether we wish to make a public statement of welcome. The Church Council will guide the timing of decision points.

We want to hear from you. We want to know what you think. Are you joyful and proud that St. John's is having this conversation? Are you concerned and confused? Who do you feel should be welcome at St. John's? How would you feel if a pastor from St. John's presided over a same-gender wedding in our sanctuary? Please, come and speak with us. Your thoughts will be welcomed and respected.

Lastly, we invite you to attend the Sept. 27th adult forum, where members of the Reconciling In Christ committee will be introducing what it means to be RIC, and invite you to share your questions and thoughts in small groups.

Children, Come to the Table!

When is my child ready to take Holy Communion? When is anyone really *ready?* As Lutherans we believe that the sacraments are gifts of God not dependent on our understanding or preparation to be effective as gifts of grace. At St. John's we urge parents to bring their children to the table every week, whether they receive a blessing or the bread and wine. Parents may use discretion based on their own piety and family situation as to when a child receives the bread and wine, but *there is no minimum age*.

Age appropriate materials are available for discussing communion with your child from age 4 and up. Contact Pastor Fickenscher or Pastor Davis if you are interested in having your child commune for the first time.



Here are some snapshots of the journey from April through July:

- · Hospitality Groups 1, 2, 3, and 4 have served over 250 hospitality roles on 17 Sunday mornings (an average of 35 people per group served out of an average of 65 total members per group);
- · Fruit Sundays (Rhubarb in May, Strawberry in June, and "Red, White, & Blue" Sunday in July) were supported by monthly hospitality group members;
- Each group has had an average of 3 Co-leaders who have helped to place members in hospitality roles for each Sunday.

Here are some things we are working on:

- · Letting each household who does not have an email address on file with St John's know which group they are in by a paper letter in the mail.
- Finding ways to help each person at St. John's know how important it is to volunteer for Sunday hospitality. Why? Getting to know each other by working together and sharing in the welcome of all through hospitality.

Devotional Practices By Bishop Steven Delzer

What devotional or prayer practices do you use to nurture your spirit? If you'd be interested in sharing, email me at: delzer@semnsynod.org. With a sense of humility let me share with you my devotional and prayer practices.

Morning works best for me. I usually get up around 5:00 a.m., a practice I began when my children were little. As I settle into my favorite chair in my favorite room (our sunroom) it almost feels like settling into the lap of God. For several years I have followed the practice of reading through the entire Bible over a two year period. I will admit that I tend to skim over the genealogies and detailed descriptions of the tabernacle (and temple) and all of its accoutrements. But I love the stories in both the Old and New Testaments. One of the delightful things about this practice is that every time I read through the Bible again I see something new, or I see something in a new light. I guess that's what makes it such a timeless book.

Prayer is the other part of my morning devotional time. I find it helpful to maintain a prayer list as a reminder to me of the people who have asked me to pray for them, and the people for whom I have said I will pray. The list also keeps before me the events, plans, concerns, etc. about which I want to pray. From time to time I like to add something new or different to my devotional time. For the past few months I have been using two little books that I have grown to appreciate and even love: *The Quiet Eye—A Way of Looking at Pictures*, by Sylvia Shaw Judson; and *99 Blessings—An Invitation to Life*, by Brother David Steindl-Rast. *The Quiet Eye* is a collection of 33 pictures that cover a wide spectrum of both ancient and modern subjects and styles, accompanied by quotations from a variety of writers, poets, playwrights, and philosophers. You are invited to simply reflect on what you see and read. *99 Blessings* is a "patchwork quilt of blessings (intended to) sharpen your taste for the gift of life in its innumerable facets."

One of the delightful things about using these two little books together is that sometimes the picture, the quotation, and the blessing coincide in a beautiful way. Here is one example: on this particular day the picture in The Quiet Eye was the "Meeting of St. Anthony and St. Paul," by the Italian painter Sassetta. St. Anthony and St. Paul are embracing. The quote is "May the Lord bless thee and keep thee," from the Bible (Numbers 6:24). When looking at the picture it is hard to tell whether they are embracing as they say "Hello," or as they say "Goodbye." On this same day the blessing (#13) in 99 Blessings was this:

SOURCE OF ALL BLESSINGS, you bless us with departures—for they are a necessary part of our journey, necessary for arriving. May I be always ready to take leave, always aware that every arrival is a prelude to departure, every birth a step toward dying, and may I thus taste the blessing of being fully present where I am.

As I sat that morning reflecting on the picture, the quote, and the blessing, I began to think about all of the arrivals and departures in my life, and the ways in which both the "hellos" and the "goodbyes" were often times filled with blessing. I also reflected on all of the times during my ministry that I have had the privilege of saying to others, "May the Lord bless thee and keep thee." In whatever ways you practice your devotional and prayer life, "May the Lord bless thee and keep thee."

School Kit Donations

Each year St. John's members send about 60 school kits to Lutheran World Relief for distribution in third world counties. Why is this important? To the children who receive School Kits, **these supplies mean the difference between getting an education or not.** Public school is usually free, but in the places where LWR works, even a



few required supplies, like pens and paper, may be more than many families can afford. And when parents can only afford to send one of their children to school, girls rarely get priority...yet **the education level of mothers has the biggest impact on development.** Last year LWR sent 261,580 school kits to 16 counties.

School supplies are on sale now. You can help by purchasing items from the school supply list, or contributing cash. Make checks to St. John's WELCA, write school kits on the memo line, and put in the offering plate, or leave in the church office. You can find school supply lists and turn in purchased supplies at the school kit display in the Commons. You do not need to sort the items into packages. We will have a kit assembly forum on Sunday, September 13th where all are invited to help assemble the kits. **Suggestion to parents:** bring the list along when you take your kids shopping for school supplies, and let them be part of the project.

School Supply list for one school kit:

Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately

8" X 101/2"; no loose-leaf paper

One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with cm on one side and inches on the other

One pencil sharpener

One blunt Fiskar scissors (must be the Fiskar brand as the other ones break easily)

Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers

Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink)

One box of 16 or 24 crayons

One 2 1/2" eraser (no erasers needed this year; we have 100 left from last year!)

Mission News

Curtis and Katie Kline, Our New Missionaries in Colombia

St. John's has begun a missionary sponsorship of Curtis and Katie Kline in Colombia. The mission bulletin board next to the church office has their photos and information about their work. Bishop Steve Delzer met them when he was in Colombia for the annual assembly of the Colombian Lutheran Church last spring. He spoke highly of the work that Curtis and Katie are doing.

If you would like to send financial support for Klines, as well as the Stubbs in Tanzania, please write a check to St. John's and write Missions on the memo line. So far this year, our church has raised \$3,265 for missionary sponsorship of the Klines and the Stubbs. It costs the ELCA about \$80,000 annually to support one missionary.

The Klines recently sent this email to St. John's:

Thank you! Curtis and I just received notification from the ELCA-GM that your congregation has started sponsoring us, thank you!

I would like to take a moment to introduce ourselves to you: Curtis and I are missionaries serving for the ELCA, with the companion Lutheran Church in Colombia (IELCO). We are relatively new missionaries, and will complete our first year of service in August. Curtis works with the Human Rights program and I work with the Christian Formation ministries and a little with the Integrated Health/Prevention Programs. The Friendship Family Program at St. Olaf

Dear members of Northfield area church congregations,

Greetings from St. Olaf College! This fall St. Olaf will welcome approximately 65 first-year international students to campus from over 30 countries, and I invite you and your family to be a part of the welcoming committee.

The Friendship Family program at St. Olaf is a cross-cultural exchange program connecting St. Olaf international students with families in the Northfield and surrounding communities to share friendship and culture. Friendship families come in all shapes and sizes: young, old, or in between; single person or with spouse/partner; with or without children - all are great Friendship families. Students live on campus, and generally get together with their families several times during the school year to share a meal, attend a concert or sporting event, attend a family gathering, go hiking, etc.

Columbarium Update

Have you visited the courtyard and Columbarium recently? It is a quiet, peaceful place with lovely plantings all around. For me, it is very special to know that my wife Ruth's ashes are in a niche in the Columbarium at St. John's, the church she loved and served for some 25 years.

Our Columbarium was created to provide a permanent place on the church grounds for the inurnment of the cremated remains of members and their families. The word *columbarium* comes from Latin and translates as a comparmented house for doves, gentle birds universally known as symbols of peace. Placing the Columbarium in the courtyard allows family members and friends to pay their respects during regular church visits. In a very real way, it replaces the cemeteries often found surrounding historic churches, especially in rural America.

There are 80 niches divided between two bays and as we are into the second bay, it is time to prepare to add the next two bays. After reviewing cost estimates for new construction, the committee recommended to Church Council that the cost of the right to use a niche be increased from \$700 to \$900 and the voluntary suggested contribution (tax deductable) be increased from \$300 to \$400 effective September 1, 2015. Council approved this recommendation. If you are interested in or considering the purchase of the right to use a niche, now would be a good time to do so. Cardinal Walter Kasper, author of the book *Mercy: the Essence of the Gospel and the Key to the Christian Life* explains in an interview that "...the Latin term *misericordia* means mercy. 
