Stephen Ministry Training Class Begins in January

We all find ourselves in the role of caregiver at some point in our lives - when a friend is going through a divorce, after a co-worker loses his job, when a spouse gets sick, or when someone you know is struggling after the death of a loved one. Stephen Ministers are trained Christian caregivers who provide care, in addition to what St. John's pastors provide, to those experiencing life's challenges.

St. John's Stephen Ministers will offer care giving training beginning in January. The training is open to those interested in being commissioned as Stephen Ministers and those who do not wish to be commissioned as a Stephen Minister but who would like to receive training in care giving skills. The training session includes fifty hours of class time for learning and practicing skills in areas such as listening, assertiveness training, confidentiality, crisis theory and the use of scripture and prayer. On November 17 at 7:00 p.m. in the Fireside Room, Stephen Ministers will offer a short class on assertiveness; all members of the congregation are invited to attend.

Grief Support Ministry

From our pastors ...

"Come you thankful people, come, raise the song of harvest home.
All are safely gathered in, 'ere the winter storms begin.

In the church year, November is a time of remembrance. We begin with the long view, the celebration of all the saints gone before us and our own entry into that company through our baptisms. In our Scripture lessons, we edge into Advent as we hear parables and prophecies of God's final harvest of righteousness.

This is also a month of "harvest" both literal and figurative as we give thanks for the fruits of the earth, as we gather in financial pledges for the next year of our life together, and as we welcome new members into our fellowship. Many months of preparation go into all of these harvests, including a lot of unseen growth that is God's work alone.

Sometimes we hear people assess the church's "harvest" by the balance of our rites. How's attendance? People look at the number of funerals St. John's conducts and say, "Isn't that a bad sign? Are we a dying church?"

The world sees "death" as a sign of failure, and so we are tempted to speak in whispered tones about funerals and ministry to the dying. But in Christian theology, dying is the gateway to eternal life. We die to sin at our baptisms, and die continually to all that might pull us away from God's grace. And at our deaths we enter "the company of all the saints in light." This attitude toward death was a particularly strong witness in the early years of the church; Christian communities were unique in the care they offered to anyone – rich or poor – as they were accompanied to their final resting place.

This All Saints Day we will give special thanks for the quiet and faithful work of our funeral team, many people who month after month provide hospitality at a moment's notice. We should be proud of this work, for it is one of the most public places of witness we have as a church, an opportunity to "be church" for many people who do not enter our doors on a regular basis. This is true ministry, neither an afterthought nor a necessary evil.

I am thankful for all of you, for the fruitful fields of Northfield and the opportunity to work in God's mission in this place. May all we do give witness to the promise of the resurrection, when God will bring a fruitful harvest from all our joys and sorrows.





- · Communion Preparers & Servers 2 people to prepare & clean up communion, 1 or 2 communion servers per service
- · Coffee Service Treats (4 people provide 4 dozen each), set up and serve (4 people from 8:00-10:00 a.m.), dishwashers and clean up (4 people from 9:30 a.m. complete)

If you are physically unable to perform the services listed above, please communicate with Christy. Each season of our lives provides different ways to contribute to our community.

If you enjoy helping coordinate hospitality, please consider being a co-leader for your group. Let Christy know as soon as possible if you would like to serve as a co-leader.

Reflections

St. John's Funeral Hospitality Group from Jane Gelle's Perspective...

St. John's has many long-time members and several families who have been in the congregation for three or more generations. According to our church archivist, Barbara Walters, so far in the year that has passed since All Saints Day, St. John's has hosted 34 funerals.

Jane Gelle became a leader of the St. John's funeral hospitality group shortly after retiring from her teaching career. As Jane is making a transition out of leading funeral hospitality, we wanted to learn about her experience. Here is an interview so you can hear from Jane in her own words.

How long have you been involved in providing hospitality for funerals?

About 20 years. I retired in 1993 from teaching and the first written records I have of the funeral hospitality group are from 1995. I started a little before then.

Who are some of the people you worked with at the beginning of your time with the funeral hospitality group?

First of all, Judy Smith. She was there in the beginning. And Elsie Nelsen and Ruth Hansen. Sue Rudser and I were co-chairs together for both service groups and funerals, and then Sue continued with service groups, and I started working solely on funerals.

How have the menu options changed over the years?

There were only afternoon funerals when I started, so we didn't have funeral lunches. At that time the refreshments were egg salad and ham salad sandwiches, cake, and coffee. The funerals were usually at 2:00 or 3:00 p.m. and so we would have "a little lunch." We started adding an option to simply serve nuts and mints fairly recently.

When did you start making the hot lunches?

Maybe around 2003. This was because people started having funerals in the mornings. It was a gradual change.

What is your favorite part of working on funeral receptions?

My favorite part is working with so many different people and learning about their gifts. There are just so many who are so willing. I've had calls from people saying "Don't forget me. I'm perfectly happy to help."

Some churches provide sandwiches and bars and coffee exclusively and do not have a hot main course. What do you forsee as the future of St. John's funeral ministry?

That's a good question, a very good question. I really can't answer that. It would be what the wishes of the people following us would want. It is more and more of a complex situation than when we started. The family wishes are greater. We honor that. We've had some unusual meals and situations and we've always honored that because it has been so important to the families.

What kinds of people can expect to find fulfillment in providing funeral hospitality?

Sometimes when we have extreme circumstances, like 3 funerals in 8 days, we do reach out to more people in the congregation. I asked someone I had never asked before if she would bring a cake. Her face just lit up. I think it helps people feel like we are saying, "Yes, you are one of us." I know they are working outside the home, but in an emergency, people are so willing to help. We have a nice group of people who provide cakes regularly.

What else would you like to say about your experience with the funeral hospitality group?

"There are a staggering number of people who have been involved." Bob Gelle, who has also been involved for many years said, "Don't forget the men." Jane continues, "This is new-- when I started I don't think there were any men who were involved in the kitchen. But now there are a lot of them--serving, bussing, and working the dishwasher."



Did you know that St. John's has an online giving program? Through online giving, you may choose to have your offering contributions to St. John's automatically paid from your checking account, savings account or credit/debit card. You can specify the amount of your contribution as well as the frequency (one time, weekly or monthly).

What are the advantages of online giving?

Advantages of online giving for you include:

- · You no longer need to write checks and prepare envelopes every week.
- · You'll never miss a Sunday offering because you forgot your checkbook.
- · Your offering in support of the important ministries and programs at St. John's will continue to be received on a regular basis, even when you are unable to attend Sunday worship due to travel, work or other circumstances.

Advantages of online giving for St. John's include:

- · Reduces the amount of work and cost to process your contribution.
- · St. John's, like most churches, experiences a decline in contributions during the summer months (the "summer slump"), which can make bill paying challenging during this time. Online giving can help to maintain a more level cash flow.
- · Saves the cost of envelopes for those who contribute exclusively via online giving.

Thank you to all of you for your help with the Meals on Wheels program from September 27-October 17. We were responsible for 92 spots for meal delivery and filled all of them because of your willingness to be a part of this program. We truly appreciate all of you for all that you do! We also extend a big thank you to Nancy Kluver and Chuck Jacobson for managing the volunteer sign-up.

We were able to donate funds to an important program in our community. We wanted to introduce it to you so that you are aware of it, as one of the many local programs we have in Northfield that help our area. The program is "Northfield Area Learning Center Backpack Food Program" and is operated out of the Area Learning Center (ALC) located at Longfellow School. Because of the high percentage of students qualifying for free and reduced lunches, the ALC students recognized the need for food on the weekends for those families. In the "thank you" letter we received, they told us that each week bags are filled with food and delivered by the students to social workers in our local schools and Three Links Apartments. The food is then given to families in need. Last year almost 500 bags of food were delivered. Our donation was truly appreciated!

ELCA World Hunger Appeal

Do you remember when?

When you could not sleep because of hunger pains in your stomach? When you could not concentrate or give adequate attention to your responsibility because of a headache from lack of food?

No? That's because we are a privileged people in the world. We have good access to food and clean water. But there are millions of people on this planet who live in poverty and do not have adequate food and water. Experts tell us that nearly 1 billion people - one in eight people in our world today - live in poverty. Futurists tell us that the rising world population and the shortage of food and pure water could become a critical destabilizing factor in world politics.

The ELCA World Hunger Appeal is a program of the church that attempts to deal with this need by fighting hunger and poverty in nearly 60 countries around the world. The program supports hunger relief projects in education, maintains health clinics, promotes a Malaria Campaign at work through 13 Lutheran partners in Africa, gives aid for family and communities to develop businesses in poor areas, works to improve farming practices to increase food production, provides farm animals to help people to improve their standard of living, gives assistance through Lutheran Disaster Response to victims of nature disasters around the world, builds new water wells, and helps develop innovative solutions that get at the root causes of hunger. The goal of the World Hunger Appeal in 2015 is to raise \$22.5 million to support anti-poverty programs in the United States and world.

Jesus calls us to do what we can to help those suffering in poverty. He identifies with them so closely that he said that whenever we give to those in need, it is as if we do it to Jesus himself. In the final judgment scene in Matthew 25 he says to the righteous, "I was hungry and you gave me something to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. . . . I needed clothes and you clothed meI tell you the truths, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it to me." And to the unrighteous he says, "Whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me."

In the Letter of James we are admonished to take action on behalf of the poor. James 2 reads, "Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to him,'Go, I wish you well: keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about his physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead."

We at St. John's are having special offering in November for the World Hunger Appeal. There are special envelopes in your offering boxes for this offering. However you give, be sure to mark your offering for World Hunger. Please write checks to St. John's, and note World Hunger on the memo line.

FROM BREAD FOR THE WORLD

An overwhelming number of people leaving prison or with felony convictions are at serious risk of hunger because employers don't want to hire them. Licensing prohibitions mean many can't work in certain fields. And even when they can get jobs, they earn much less than individuals without criminal records.

In addition, laws ban individuals with felony convictions from getting some types of federal assistance. Many can't receive SNAP (food stamps), TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) or housing assistance. With no job, no shelter, and no help, many individuals with criminal records are denied a second chance.



But there is an opportunity to change this. Conversations are happening right now in Congress to develop and pass legislation that reforms our criminal justice system. Bread for the World asks us to contact our representative and senators urging them to be sure that lifting the SNAP and TANF ban is included in any criminal justice reform legislation.
