

Recognizing Those Who Need Care



St. John's is a caring congregation. As a caring congregation, we recognize when people around us are experiencing difficult times. Some people may need our prayers and support. Others may seek help from pastors or health care specialists. Some may find it helpful to have a Stephen Minister, a Christian friend who listens and cares.

In our role as a caring congregation, it is always important for us to recognize when others might benefit from help, wherever we might encounter them. For example, I was grocery shopping when I ran into a

St. John's member. I greeted her warmly but noticed immediately there was something different about her. I asked her, "Are you all right?" And she said, "Not really." She proceeded to share that she was feeling down after experiencing so many deaths of friends and family members. "I've been to ten funerals this month. It's too much." Realizing she was going through a difficult time, I told her about Stephen Ministry.

I became her Stephen Minister. Over the coming months we talked about these losses - a grandchild, a sister, close friends at St. John's. She shared that it was different talking with me, her Stephen Minister. When she talked about her losses with friends, they would change the subject and talk about their own losses. She could talk about and deal with each of these deaths comfortably with me because I was there to listen to and support her.

Sharing struggles with a Stephen Minister often lightens the load. If you or someone you know needs care and support at this time, please call one of the pastors or Joan Halvorson at 645-8445.



From our Pastors...

On May 6th and 7th, Pastor Davis and I, along with Brad Kmoch, Rob Quanbeck, and Suzanne Pfau, attended the Southeastern Minnesota Synod Assembly in Rochester. Every year, voting members from across the 125 congregations and ministry partners of the Synod gather for reports, Bible Study, worship, workshops, and deliberations.

The synod has named very clear foci for its work: building leaders, equipping congregations, and accompanying global partners. These foci shaped the whole assembly, with themes of eating in Jesus' presence and healing from Luke's Gospel.

There were just a few resolutions to consider this year. One resolution, passed overwhelmingly, encouraged congregations to engage in the "My Neighbor is Muslim" study and to engage with issues of welcome and refugee resettlement – efforts that are already underway at St. John's. Another dissolved the statewide campus ministry board, since those efforts are now guided and funded at the local level.

What does St. John's need to know? First of all, St. John's is a *vital* partner of our synod. Your mission support, which is built into our annual operating budget, constitutes nearly 5% of the total mission support the synod receives. In addition, we are actively and generously engaged in supporting our global partners in Tanzania and Colombia through the relationships our synod has worked hard to foster over many years. There is much work that the church does better when it does it together, and we are grateful for a synod that assists with these partnerships so capably.

Secondly, St. John's is a consistent, generous giver to special appeals. Because the funding for campus ministry is shifting to primarily local support, our Benevolence board sent our voting members to the assembly with a special gift for campus ministry in our synod. And again this year we won the "River of Giving" award, designated for congregations in each conference that give the most to ELCA World Hunger.

Finally, we come away with a sense that Lutherans are looking outward and forward. Although the year 2017 could easily become a mere history lesson of the Reformation, the Lutheran World Federation will be meeting in Namibia that year, where the Lutheran church is rapidly growing. "Accompaniment" is the theme of much of the church's engagement in global ministry, no longer seeking to control or direct every mission effort, but instead to see where God is moving and come alongside brothers and sisters who are giving witness to God's love in many places.

Thank you for being a church that knows we are part of a greater whole. We come back inspired and excited for ministry here in Northfield, knowing our ministry here is both leading and accompanying many others in our church.



What Jonathan is Reading...



Pastors Pam and Jonathan are taking turns writing the monthly missive for the Voice. So on alternate months they are adding a new feature: "what we're reading." Since so many of you share your reading lists with us, we will offer you a peek each month into something on our nightstands.

The City of Thorns, by Ben Rawlence

Ben Rawlence, a researcher for the Human Rights Watch, spent three years researching the experiences of people living in Dadaab, the world's largest refugee camp. As Rawlence puts it, "To

charity workers, Dadaab refugee camp is a humanitarian crisis; to the Kenyan Government, a 'nursery for terrorists'; to the Western media, a dangerous no-go area; but to its half a million residents, their last resort." In this book, Rawlence tells the story of nine people living in Dadaab. As I read, I find myself both heartbroken and haunted by these stories. Heartbroken because the suffering and the desperation in this place is unimaginable. I am constantly asking, "How can this be happening in the 21st Century?" I am also haunted because of how our government and many others are complicit in this nightmare.

Overall, this book has been the most accessible snapshot of what it can mean to live as a refugee. I leave you with a quote from Rawlence that convicted my mid-Western good Christian sensibilities - "At a time where there are more refugees than ever, the rich world has turned its back on them. Our myths and religions are steeped in the lore of exile and yet we fail to treat the living examples of that condition as fully human."

You will not regret reading this book.

From Nathan Proctor, Organist and Director of Worship, Music, & Arts

Friends,

Greetings from Montreat, North Carolina, in the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains. I am here for the next several weeks and will miss worshiping with you all at home at St. John's. While I am gone, I want to share a little bit about what Montreat is like and what I am doing here.

Montreat is a conference center supported by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) just outside of Asheville, NC. I first came to know Montreat back when I was a student at St. Olaf and Ferg (John Ferguson) recommended me for an internship in Asheville. Through that time and my years living in Raleigh, I became more involved in the many conferences and retreats here each year, doing everything from leading Sunday worship services, to conference planning teams, to leading music from the stage for conferences of youth and pastors.

This year I am co-directing the first two weeks of conferences for high school youth. I started work on this project eighteen months ago and the time is finally here! Our theme this year is A World of Difference. After a week of travel and final details, thousands of youth will be arriving at Montreat starting on June 5th for the conferences, which will happen in two back-to-back weeks. They will start each morning with music, energizers of dancing and silly movement to song, and keynote speakers to unpack scripture in new and creative ways. They will spend two sessions each day in their small groups, which are randomly assigned groups of 30 people from all different churches. There will be fun recreation events each afternoon and night, for time to play and have fellowship with each other, and explore the beauty of our mountain setting.

My favorite part of each day is when we all gather together in the evening for worship. I have worked with an amazing team of musicians, artists, liturgists and preachers to craft really interesting and creative worship services. It's powerful to hear all those young voices raised in song and proclaiming scripture. It's a beautiful picture of not the future of the church, but the church *right now*.

I am so thankful to the staff and congregation of St John's for supporting me through these long eighteen months of planning and for sparing me these coming weeks, to go be in service to the larger church. I can't wait to come home and share photos and stories of my time here. Thank you for your prayers and support.

Study Opportunity: What does the Bible say about sexuality?

This year, St. John's has committed to intentionally study the topic of human sexuality, as we consider adopting a welcome statement that includes people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. At the center of faith-based conversations on the topic of homosexuality is the Bible. There are typically seven scripture passages that are referenced in conversations about homosexuality and the Bible.

Through these scripture texts, many people think

the Bible explicitly condemns homosexual behavior. Others, however, think the Bible is not speaking about homosexuality as we know it today.

Because the Bible plays an important role in our community of faith, and because sexuality plays an important role in everyone's life, it can be significant for us to explore these scriptures both closely and within the broader context of the Bible. It is also important to hear how people can read them faithfully and come to different conclusions. Pastors Pam and Jonathan are considering a study on the Bible and sexuality this summer.

Excerpted from How Much is Enough? Hungering for God in an Affluent Culture by Arthur Simon, founder of Bread for the World

For many, God is the God of our personal life, but not of economics and government, which supposedly isn't God's turf. That puts much of life off-limits to God and denies the truth that Jesus Christ is the Lord of a believer's whole life, not just selected parts of it. Christians often behave like believers when it comes to private morality, but not when it comes to public justice. They are then far more apt to judge economic and political policies by how their pocketbooks are affected, not by how these policies affect others.

... we can make a telling intervention for others. I have seen it again and again each year at Bread for the World, as thousands of ordinary citizens write letters and contact members of Congress on a few key issues. Their efforts have leveraged benefits to hungry people in dollar value alone of a hundred times more than the amount contributed, not to count the far more important benefit of lives saved, suffering lessened, and opportunities opened.

As individuals and groups, we are distinguished both by the generation in which we were born and grew up as well as by life changes we pass through. Our identities are further defined by the geographic and demographic boundaries that stake out our claims. "Builders" (born between 1925 and 45) still remember roller skates and favorite radio programs, "boomers" (born from 1946 to 64) recall the joy of roller blades and the entry and rapid popularization of television, beginning with the black and white set, many of Generation X (1965-79), while clad in torn jeans, watched the Berlin Wall come down, Generation Y (1980-94) got turned on to the Internet and baseball caps, and members of Generation X (those born since 1995) are patrons of Facebook and Twitter. We're quite a mix! And while we cling to our preferences and dislikes, God doesn't work that way. He invites us to be radically more open.

As proven on the cross, God's love embraces all of us - infants, toddlers, preteens, high-schoolers, young and older singles, married and unmarried couples, parents, those in middle age, seniors, grandparents, uncles and aunts and cousins, people of all colors and sexual orientations, rich and poor alike. The whole spectrum, all of creation, is under God's care. Jesus charged us to care for one another and not limit our embrace only to those who are like us. Humanity is created in God's image and is not defined by or limited to a reflection of our own selves (as in a mirror). God doesn't play favorites with a particular generation, group, or class of individuals. As the Apostle Paul declared, "We see ourselves and others as in a glass darkly." Despite our imperfect vision, we are called to see and love and serve others as if each were lesus himself, our model to follow.

As we pass through one generation to the next, from youth to old age, we are called to bridge any divides and relate to oth-

ers of a generation that we have either yet to experience or are now remote from. What ties us all together is that we are a family, all children of God. It's the ultimate extended family, one in which we are all adopted and steered to grace through baptism and faith. In the stewardship of our planet's inhabitants, in allocating our love and care, we do not fulfill God's vision when we separate ourselves from those we see as different. The divine plan is that we come together and stick together through love that transcends differences and overcomes what is clearly the easiest and most natural course - surrounding ourselves only with others who are like-minded and resemble us. The challenge for us is to be compassionate and to embrace all people regardless of where and how they live and what categories appear to define them as different from us, even if we feel like writing them off as a lost cause. Jesus writes nobody off. Nor should we.

New Coordinator for the Human Rights Program, by Curtis

This May, the IELCO hired a new coordinator and my counterpart in the human rights program. Sara Lara has recently graduated with her degree in law, has been involved advising projects such as ASIVIDA (IELCO's project which accompanies people living with HIV/AIDS in protecting their rights) and the Indigenous Kogi Community. She has also assisted in projects for the United Nations Human Rights office in Colombia and projects with victims of Colombia's armed conflict through the Jesuit Refugee Services

The expertise she brings to the coordination of the program is exciting and will no doubt bring new possibilities to the Lutheran Church of Colombia to involve itself in the implementation of the peace process. We are currently defining together how I can best accompany her in this new position and mutually create a vision for a successful program. We recently led some workshops together in the Boyacá region of Colombia with groups of *campesinos* (rural farmers) about their rights and focusing on the issue of food sovereignty. Based on those workshops, I think I can say we will work together well, and be a good team!
