

There is an old, cliché joke that gets thrown around the Church every once and awhile. I'm sure you've heard it before.

Q: How does a church get rid of its mice problem?

A: Simple. Just Confirm the mice and they'll go away.

This joke is rooted in another, more vulnerable question that the Church has been fearfully asking for quite sometime now: why do our youth get confirmed and then we don't see them again?

This is an important question, and we should be asking it. But I cannot help but wonder if part of the problem is our language around confirmation. So often, we will say things like,

"We confirmed 11 youth this past Sunday!"

"Paul was confirmed at this church"

"What does my child need to do to get confirmed?"

The problem with these statements is that they make the student passive recipients of something that the church decides to grant them, based on whether they have done enough sermon notes or service hours or sufficiently memorized parts of the catechism. And this greatly misses the point of Confirmation.

On Confirmation Sunday, the Church does not *confirm* youth. On Confirmation Sunday, youth *confirm* their faith. Or more accurately, the youth affirm their baptisms. It is the "Affirmation of Baptism" liturgy that is used that day, after all. This means that youth are not passive and powerless, but in fact, empowered to say yes to the promises of God proclaimed to them on their day of baptism. Promises like the unconditional love of God, grace, forgiveness, and belonging to the family of God.

If Confirmation, or Affirmation of Baptism, is people proclaiming their faith and saying yes to God's promises, then people can affirm their baptisms whenever and as often as they would like. The Church's role is to offer opportunities for growth, learning, and community that deepen this commitment. Really, the four years of Confirmation classes offered here at St. John's are simply the training ground, or the opportunities, youth use to prepare to affirm their baptisms.

This raises another problem with our language around Confirmation (think Affirmation of Baptism). We, the Church, have made Confirmation into an action that we do once in our life around the age of 15. In fact, however, saying yes to these promises that God has made to us is something we do and need to do over and over again throughout our lives. This is a lifelong part of faith, which is why we use the Affirmation of Baptism liturgy with those completing the Accompany program and to welcome new members to St. John's.

As we gather together this month to once again surround our Confirmands with promises of support and love in their faith, let us use this as an opportunity to reaffirm our own faith in a God who promises to be near to us in all seasons of life.

FAQ: Who Needs a Stephen Minister?


All of us suffer pain and loss and disappointment and sorrow. They are built into even the happiest life, the condition under which we live as fallible human beings.

Death. Family quarrels. Money problems. Job loss. Job promotion. Empty Nest. Divorce. Sickness. A terminal illness. Marital problems. Loneliness. Unexpected pregnancy. Long desired pregnancy. Dementia. An inheritance. Move to a new location within town or in another town. A wedding. Caregiver's fatigue. Loss of independence. Cooling of a friendship. Adoption.

All these things can happen in the course of normal life, and in addition there is our own sinfulness to face, our own daily wrong doing, no matter how hard we try to live according to Christ's law of love.

Nobody escapes difficulties, setbacks, sorrow, and we learn to deal with them. But sometimes they pile up, confuse us and threaten to overwhelm us. That's when it can be useful to talk to a Stephen Minister, who is trained to listen carefully without judging and without giving advice and to maintain strict confidentiality; who comes in the name of Christ, trusting in his ability to cure; who will pray with you or not, as you wish, and who will be a dependable companion, as long as you need and want a Stephen Minister. Some Stephen Minister relationships last for as little as two months - the care receiver might work out a solution to the problem in the course of talking and being listened to. Some relationships last for years, as new difficulties arise.





Fresh starts...New beginnings...

As we start this Fall with all of the "new"-ness it brings, I have a question for you -- what new thing(s) are you learning, trying, or doing? Are you learning a new job? Are you trying a new hobby? Are you doing something new to challenge yourself to stretch beyond your comfort zone? If you answered, "No" - why aren't you trying something new this year? Are you stuck in a rut or "comfortable" doing what you have always done? Are you afraid of new things? Are you too nervous to try something and possibly not have a 100% success rate at it, so you won't try it at all?

If you are like me, you do not like a lot of changes. I like my world comfortable and predictable. However, as I have learned this last year, our God is in the business of challenging us to learn new things, try what we wouldn't necessarily want to try, and do what he is calling us to do. If you doubt the Lord calls us to more than we think we can do, try reading about Noah, Moses, Esther, David, Daniel, and the list goes on.

I have another question for you...What is the Lord challenging you to learn, try or do here at St. John's? Is he challenging you to be a Sunday School teacher? A nursery worker? An usher? Accept a position on a committee / ministry / board? Join the choir? Help with homework on Wednesday nights? Bake or buy treats for Wednesday nights? Lead a confirmation group? Help with communion prep and cleanup? Make coffee? Run the dishwasher? Commit to a small group study? Greet people on Sunday mornings? Say yes to be an assisting minister? Serve communion? If any of these possibilities resonate with you, what is holding you back? Did you know you can ask questions, lots of questions about how to do something and people will be happy to answer your questions?

Here is my challenge for you, step out in faith. Listen to that small voice inside prompting you to try something new out of your comfort zone. Come in and shadow someone one Sunday morning or Wednesday evening to learn what a particular job is all about before you volunteer to do it. Don't wait around to be asked, take the initiative to volunteer first, and trust in the Lord to carry you through your fears. Joshua 1:9 says, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go."

Update on Reconciling in Christ Process

As many of you know, St. John's congregation decided to spend this 2016 year in intentional conversation around becoming a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) congregation.

Briefly stated, an RIC congregation is one that creates an intentional welcome statement, reaching out to those who often feel alienated from the church, which specifically includes welcoming people from the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) community.

This past spring, the Reconciling in Christ committee created three draft welcome statements based on information gathered from the congregation at an adult forum. A couple weeks later, the congregation was invited to give feedback on those three draft welcome statements.

Since then, the RIC committee has come up with two revised drafts that will be presented to the congregation at an adult forum this fall. The forums will also include information about what it means to be a Reconciling in Christ congregation and time for asking questions. Along with that, the St. John's church council is discerning the next steps in this process.

Holden Village in 2017?

Holden Village is a Lutheran retreat center in the Cascade mountains of Washington state. Originally a village for copper miners, it was gifted to the Lutheran church in the 1960's and has been operating as a unique year-round ministry for the renewal of the church for over 50 years. Pastor Fickenscher serves on the board of the village, and many Lutherans have visited either on their own family retreats or as part of college student groups on J-term.

The summer of 2017 will be a banner year for Holden Village. After nearly five years of disruption to programming because of a major environmental remediation on the old mine site, and enduring a major fire in the area in 2015, the village will (God-willing) be open for guests next summer. Holden offers stimula-



tion for the mind, body and spirit, and a unique sense of community that has renewed the faith lives of visitors time after time.

Pastor Fickenscher would love to have a group of St. John's members and friends join her for a week next July in the village. Registration may not be open for a while yet, but we need to be ready to say "we're going!" when it is. Lutheran Colombian Perspective on the Peace Agreements: Part One

The recent announcement of the final agreements between the government of Colombia and the FARC (Revolutionary Forces of Colombia) is exciting news. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO) and all affiliated organizations and ministries have been working for decades to build peace and look forward to the next stage in this long and arduous journey. What are the perspectives of Lutheran Colombians on the peace agreements and hopes for the future of their country?

The plebiscite, where the Colombian people will have the opportunity to vote "yes" or "no" the agreement, will be held on October 2nd. Between now and then we will be highlighting the voices of our Colombian Lutheran brothers and sisters and their perspectives on the agreement.

This week, Sara Lara, Coordinator of the Human Rights Program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia:

The hopes of Colombians have grown with the "final agreement for the end of the conflict and the construction of a stable and durable peace" to live without the war that has scourged the country for more than 50 years. The surrender of



weapons by the FARC also strengthens the possibility of realizing the right to peace, enshrined in Article 22 of Colombia's Constitution of 1991.

Multiple organizations have arisen during this long war, many of them to defend the human rights of the conflict's victims. These organizations have played an important role as protagonists of the social mobilization pushing for the peace agreements, as seen through the development of peace education, the diffusion of the agreements from Havana, and even the campaign for massive participation in the plebiscite which seeks to endorse the agreements on the 2nd of October.

Civil society organizations have taken on the tasks entrusted by the gov-

ernment of President Santos, demonstrating the need to build peace from the grassroots and for forgiveness and reconciliation to become a reality. In this vein, the work carried out by churches is essential for the promotion of justice and the proclamation of the Gospel. Also noteworthy is the undisputed support of the international community for this process; since the beginning phase of secret negotiations to the implementation of the final agreements.

The challenges ahead are concerned with the experience of peace in every-day life; it is well known that the FARC exiting the armed conflict does not necessarily mean the end of violence in the streets, homes, schools and other living spaces. Nor can we ignore the persistence of other guerrilla groups like the ELN and the EPL and the criminal and paramilitary gangs that keep the Colombian armed conflict alive.

It is also our call to make visible the more than 8,131,269 victims of the conflict whom are at the center of the agreement. They will need greater attention from the government to ensure the effective enjoyment of their rights.

We will move forward, step by step, with trust in God to heal this land and with great expectations of peace. At the same time though, we are cautious of the current economic model, as well as the difficulties concerning the integration of demobilized guerrillas into political and civil life and the constant struggle for the respect of the rights of all people in Colombia.
